

CONFERENCE ADOPTS LEAGUE OF NATIONS COVENANT

PARIS, April 25.—With less than three hours discussion most of which was consumed in speech making, the plenary session of the peace conference late this afternoon adopted the covenant of the league of nations.

KAISER TO BE TRIED BEFORE FIVE JUDGES FOR SUPREME CRIMES

WASHINGTON, April 25.—Whether the kaiser shall be tried, "not for an offense against criminal law, but for a supreme offense against international morality and the sanctity of treaties," will be decided at the plenary session of the peace conference at Paris today.

This was revealed here today when the state department made public the text of proposed article which will be submitted to the conference. The articles propose that a special tribunal composed of five judges, one from each of the five powers, be formed to try the former emperor, and that the government of The Netherlands be requested to surrender him.

The articles also provide that all others who have been responsible for plunging the world into war be brought before this tribunal, and that in cases where there has been an offense against an individual nation, trials shall be conducted by that nation.

The German government, if the articles are adopted, will be called upon to surrender all such persons, and also to produce any documents in its possession that may have any bearing on the case.

Those on trial will have the right of selecting counsel, and the tribunal will be instructed to base its decision on the "highest motives of international policy with a view of vindicating the solemn obligations of international undertakings and the validity of international morality" and to fix the punishment which it considers should be imposed.

Following are the proposed articles to be considered:

Article 1.—The allied and associated powers hereby agree that the German government, former German emperor, Kaiser Wilhelm II, shall be held responsible for the crime of having caused the outbreak of the world war, and for the violation of international morality and the sanctity of treaties.

BREITLIN, Apr. 27 (Associated Press)—To save the Kaiser from the vengeance of the people of the one hand and the wrath of anti-monotheistic Germany on the other is the object of a first international organization boasting a country-wide following and a membership exceeding one million. These champions of the Kaiser's personal safety are doing business under the firm name of "League of German Men and Women for the protection of the personal liberty and life of William II."

I requested Lieberman to furnish the league's program. He replied: "Our aim is to prevent the trial of Wilhelm II in an ostentatious court of justice on the charges of being responsible for the war. We are also opposed to the holding trial by any international tribunal unless such a tribunal is composed of representatives of the nations who constituted the German cabinet in the 'dark days' of the war."

"We will work against the former Kaiser's trial by the courts through the German government. But if the German government declines to represent our cause we shall make direct

representations to the various governments.

"We further hold that the Kaiser is entitled to live in tranquility. He is a citizen of his own country and should be allowed to enjoy all the privileges of a citizen. The new Kaiser, however, has granted their former ruler the right of asylum in Holland."

"There are many members in the league for reasons, Wilhelm II to the throne," I asked.

"The league is absolutely non-political," declared Lieberman, "but it is quite possible that many of our members, like myself, are of the opinion that the restoration of the old emperor would be the best thing that could happen for the German. Our members are drawn from all walks of life. Many working men are members of the league."

"Any socialist?"

"No, no socialists. At least, I don't believe so." As a matter of fact some socialists are working against us. The sparrows are our out-spoken enemies. Only two days ago I received a very hostile letter from a socialist club in Berlin. They threaten us with all sorts of violence if we succeed in bringing Wilhelm II back to Germany.

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WEEK'S EVENTS AND SPECULATIONS

Perhaps the most noteworthy development of the week was the withdrawal of the Italian delegates from the peace conference, but the disclosure of the camouflage of the real intent and purpose behind that move. Premier Orlando contended that the statement of President Wilson furnished the reason for Italy's withdrawal, whereas it has been shown satisfactorily that he had applied for his passports and they had been vised several days before the president spoke. So that the statement equates about the same place in peace conference history as the murder of the Archduke Ferdinand at Sarajevo does in the history of the beginning of the war—it furnishes a good excuse.

It is evident that Italy has tried to camouflage her intents and purposes, which are, plainly, territorial expansion and national aggrandizement. In this ambition she has had almost universal support, whose statements are animated by the same aspirations, directly opposed to the fourteen principles under which America entered the war, and under which the war was won. As Italy bluffs Italy, so the coalition with Italy and with Germany. It is hardly necessary to say that the central empire after quitting them in the midst of war, under popular pressure in her own country and political pressure of the allies, Italy needs food, fuel and raw materials to reconstruct her almost dead industries, and she can hardly get those from Germany. Economically she seems to be dependent upon the allies, but opposed to this very practical consideration is the long-cherished dream of empire, of dominion over the Mediterranean; of control of world markets, as in the days of the Caesars, when the world paid tribute to Rome.

Demonstrations showing popular approval of the withdrawal of the Italian delegates were held wherever Premier Orlando appeared in Italy, and communications from one end of the peninsula to another tended to show that the people of Italy are behind the government, if the embargo dispatches coming out of Italy speak the truth. If the gains shall amount to a shoredown, with the allies' hand on the above of the Italian government, it will be the playing of that card upon the plan of empire. In either event, the situation is fraught with grave possibilities. The Italian people, like the people of every other nation, are very human. Their government must eventually reflect the popular opinion or go down before revolution. What effect the Italians' holding of the conference may have upon signing of the treaty by the German delegates is problematical. Decision of the allies is reported to be that they will point out the dotted line, and tell the Germans to sign. Opposed to this is the report that the Germans will insist upon submission of the provisions to the German government, and the suggestion has been made that the Germans might demand that the proposal be ratified in a plebiscite, thus permitting the people to decide their own destiny. This proposal seems to be carrying world democracy to limits hardly acceptable to the several allied governments. Self-determination applies to small nations, not to Germany.

Italy's presence is not necessary to the formal acceptance or rejection of the treaty by the German delegates. In case of refusal, doubtless economic pressure, applied by America, Great Britain and France, amounting to removal of the blockade and shutting off of raw supplies, will hasten action by the German government or hasten dissolution of that government by the onward march of socialism.

Germany, like Italy and every other nation, must have a government responsive to the will of the people. What that will is may be indicated by popular demonstrations, or it may be camouflaged by congresses. Dispatches from Berlin indicate that the delegates likely will make a detour to Berlin for maintenance of Wilson's fourteen points, application of which to Germany as well as to the allies opponents of the central empire, will be insisted upon. If alliance of purpose is animating the allied nations over the Wilson program, how expressed in Germany that such insistence may be entering wedge whereby the allies will be split is without foundation.

During the present week it seems likely that the crisis will be signed and negotiations will be reached. Either then Germany to submit the proposal to the people for ratification or rejection, with probabilities pointing to acceptance of the terms by the plenipotentiaries.

Italy likely will return to the conference unless she is determined to carry her bluff to the point of open break and further warfare. The latter decision likely will result in dissolution of the Italian empire, leaving Italy a free nation without and within, for both within and without, wherever governments fail to respond to the popular will.

SENATOR PONDREXTER'S ARRAIGNMENT

Senator Pondrextor does not admire the American president in insisting upon the principle which he enunciated as a basis for the armistice. He says it is quite presumptuous for us to step in and undertake to dictate the terms of peace, because the allies, not the United States alone, won the victory.

But the allies accepted the Wilson ideals, and the American army went to Europe to fight for those ideals. The allied nations, with the exception of Italy and Japan, all accept those ideals. What advantage it would be if in the negotiations the idealism which was back of the American nation only a few months ago should be harnessed away for territory and resources and commercial advantages.

It may be justifiable to stand up for one's ideals, but it requires a high degree of wisdom to do that with the yehing materialistic and selfishness of our own ears and, if attention is paid to it, replying to them on equal terms and fill one's mind with doubt.

It is indeed a grave test for the president to have not only the opposition of the Senate, but also the opposition of the people, and to have some of his allies' officers crying out aspersions upon his administration and the integrity of his every act.

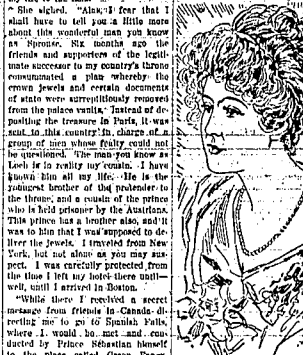

Under the contract with the Dixie Athletic club, he will be staged for the night of July 26 at the ball park.

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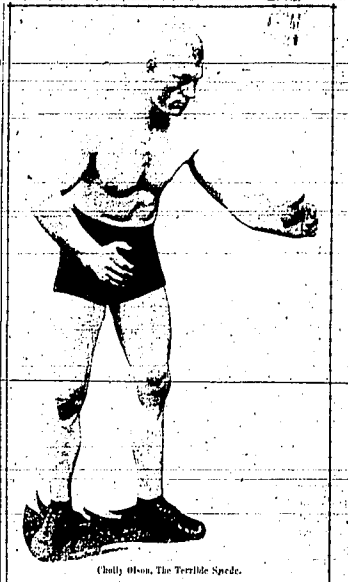
