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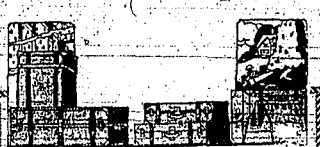

Directed by the spot they hurried down the cliffs to the edge of the scuttling sea. Again a cry—then more cries rang out.

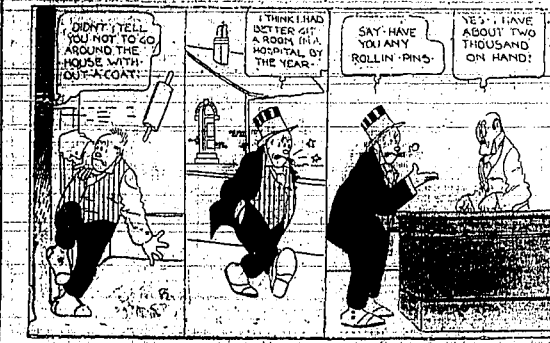

OLD FOLKS HATE SMALL CHANCE IN LABOR LINE

U. S. S. Staff Correspondent

DELINIA, (by mail).—Old folks have little chance "in the working line" in the United States, according to the statement of Mrs. Richard Davis, of Brooklyn, who has just been granted permission by the public charity committee to sell accipiters of a trust fund amounting to about \$7,000.

Mrs. Davis is seventy years old and her husband older. She says the price of living is so high that she is not able to maintain herself and her husband, who is "old and rheumatic." She asked permission for the trustee to sell about \$5,000 worth of property for the income of the said trust property, amounting to only about \$300 a year, from which income tax is deducted by the government, and the support of my husband and myself."

Mrs. Davis goes on to say that her three married children had their own support to look after and, however willing they might be, they could not materially assist her, though they and her son \$200 each had means generally agreed to the proposed arrangement to make provision referred to for her husband and herself and to settle the debts out of the portion of the trust fund appointed to them.

Mrs. Davis had lived with her son several years, and had continued largely to her support, but his means of doing so were limited and uncertain.

STRIKE INSURANCE IN OREGON IS CALLED 'DIRTY'

SALEM, Ore., April 22.—In reply to inquiries from a legislator, a spokesman of the Oregon Insurance Commission has announced that any kind of insurance may be written in Oregon if the laws of the state are complied with.

This announcement was made in response to inquiries concerning a new kind of insurance now being tried in eastern states and which is designed to be introduced in Oregon. The new insurance provides an indemnity covering a loss occurring by reason of complete or partial fitness during the time a strike affects the business, and is intended to reimburse those who have certain fixed charges and the usual cost of livelihood. The design is to protect and stabilize the interest between employer and employee, and to be constructive in all its activities. It has been termed "Strike Insurance."

ILLINOIS 'GUY' CALLS HENRY STEWELL AND BERRY

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 29.—German officers were "dirty and villainous," according to Lieutenant Howard C. Knolls, only downstate Illinois "guy" who recently returned from overseas service. Speaking of his most interesting experiences, he refers to them as "stunts."

Lieutenant Knolls, now at United States District Attorney R. C. Leggett's office here, was made a prisoner by the Germans when he was notified to land behind the German lines owing to engine trouble in his aeroplane motor.

"I was subject to every kind of indignity and insult," he said in referring to his capture. "The first thing the larks did was to take my boots, my watch and everything that they thought they could use. They were hooked, however, a hundred feet away. I had in my little watch pocket, which was very careless of them.

"I never saw a prisoner treated better. But they did worse than that. They just neglected them. Every manner possible to display their contempt. For breakfast we had a piece of bread which by chemical analysis showed twelve per cent sand and a cup of rotten coffee. For supper they gave us the same with the exception they put a cabbage and a potato in a kettle of water about two dozen feet, so the water would not overflow when they put the cabbage in.

"The lark never allowed a prisoner to sit in the wounded, so long as they could walk. They would then send them to a hospital and this is the last we would hear of them. When captured I had a very slight wound which could have been easily treated and would have caused me no trouble, but owing to neglect the wound became very nasty and gave me untold pain."

YANK WAS 'CLINICAL' BUT EVIDENTLY TRUTHFUL

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 29.—The officers can be rather cynical while flirting with danger on the western front. France is given in a story of the world war told by Captain Elmer E. Hager, Springfield's war hero, who has just returned from "over there," in an address before the Optimist club here.

"We were captured abroad from this country really half trained," he said. "Our destination was Chateau-Thierry. The Germans had made their big spring offensive and were pushing forward. Our allies were crying for aid and we had been sent to the rescue. "Our outfit had been assigned to a French command. On taking on its duty of the complement we found we had an extra battalion. It was enclosed when all the other units had been placed and this one remained unassigned. No one seemed to know where it belonged. Both the American and French commanders could give no explanation. It was left to shift for itself momentarily. During this period the officers of the battalion began arguing with one another about its location. But no action could be found. During the heat of the debate a tall, angular looking man, flopped down on a stone seat to rest. Talking disrespectfully to a brother officer he blurted out:

"Say, call up the Germans; they probably know more about where we belong than anybody else."

KILLS 125 BOBCATS AND 200 COYOTES IN 3 YEARS

NORTH YANMA, Wash., April 29.—With a record of 125 bobcats and 200 coyotes to the credit of W. H. Gunnoe, a government trapper operating in the mountains and valleys of this region, it is estimated by ranchers that he has saved them 2,500 head of sheep and 20,000 head of cattle in the last three years. Having their estimate on the known destructiveness of these wild pests, the number value of the stock saved is computed by them at \$140,000.

"The fur of the bobcat" and trapped by Gunnoe was worth \$1000.

NEW MERCHANT SHIPS

CAMDEN, N. J., April 29.—The New York Shipbuilding corporation is building the largest merchant ship now being constructed in the country. Three bulk cargoes which were awarded by the Emergency Fleet Corporation, are for vessels of 225 feet in length, with a displacement of 21,000 tons each and a speed of eighteen knots an hour. Their normal capacity in cargo and stowage passengers is 3,500 and, used as transports, they can carry 3,000 troops. Their freight capacity is 2,000 tons.

CHANGES NAME TO PLEASE WIDOW, THEN WEDS HER

WAUKESHA, Ill., April 29.—When Claude Hates, twenty-five, recently proposed marriage to Mrs. Charles Babcock, thirty-three, she told him that "the memory of my late husband I will never change my name."

This didn't bother Claude in the least. He filed himself to the Waukesha county court, had his name changed to Babcock, proposed again and married the widow the next day.

STUDENTS SHINE SHOES

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 29.—Foot-shining is part of the training in the manual training class at the Central Junior high school here. But it is not public bootblackening. It is for the students themselves. It had for its plan to encourage the boys in neatness of appearance. The instructor has had erected a complete shoe shining department. The students shine each other's shoes at an average cost of a half cent.
