Y COMMITTEE NOW READY TO LAUNCH DRIVE

Luncheon at Rogerson Cafe Results in Naming of Officers and Adoption of Initial Plans

Organization of the Y. M. C. A. building campaign was completed yesterday at a luncheon at the Rogerson cafe where the following officers were elected by the executive committee: L. L. Brockbridge, chairman; C. E. Hanson, vice-chairman; E. L. Ashton, secretary; J. M. Maxwell, treasurer.

The executive committee includes other members as follows: W. J. Ostrander, L. F. White, T. H. Irwin, W. H. Irvine, H. G. Hines, E. L. McViear, L. G. Kirkman, V. H. Decker and J. S. Unruh.

The committee on quarters was instructed to investigate the feasibility of erecting on a downtown vacant lot a suitable Y. M. C. A. building where all the various activities of the drive and campaign will take place. It was decided to make the drive for \$125,000 and to split the pledge into four equal parts, payable July 1, 1915, Dec. 1, 1915, March 1, 1916 and July 1, 1916, thus giving a year in which to make full payment.

The executive committee was unanimous in deciding that the amount of five drive should not be less than \$125,000.

The campaign will open with a big banquet on Monday evening, May 19 and will close at midnight Tuesday night, May 27. FALLS MEMORIAL BOARD IS NAMED

Campaign Will Rest for the Present and Goal Will Be Reached by Gradual Stages, is Announcement Made by the Chairman

"The Shoshone Falls memorial will keep us busy all of this year and next," declared C. B. Thomas, chairman of the memorial committee, today. "We have \$25,000 in our fund and will be taking out \$10,000 this year. Next year we will take out \$15,000 and keep building on as we are able until the memorial is complete. Another state appropriation should be available next year."

For the present, until the Y. M. C. A. building campaign is taken care of, the memorial committee will rest Mr. Thomas said. Later in the summer it will be pushed and the return of soldiers and sailors this fall should give it additional impetus, he believes.

At a meeting of the memorial committee yesterday, Mr. Thomas was elected chairman, Mrs. M. G. Ripley secretary and Carl J. Lahn treasurer. Other members of the executive committee are: J. J. Sweeney, president; Harper White, P. L. Brecken and H. H. Stevenson.

Next Sunday afternoon the directors will visit the proposed park grounds and inspect the route of the proposed scenic roadway from the lakeside boulevard along the canyon rim. Part of the ground needed by the memorial is in the hands of the Y. M. C. A. committee. The board will be necessary although an effort will be made to purchase the land from the Y. M. C. A. Certificate of membership in the memorial association, suitable framing and bearing the names of the bereaved, may be considered.
