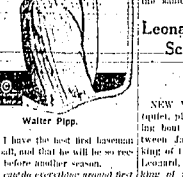

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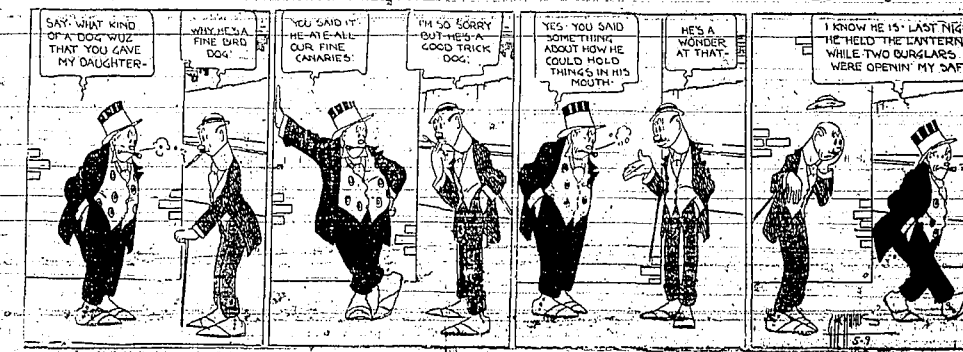

BORAH'S BRAVE STAND

Borah indubitably is right for once in his life. Not that in his attitude toward the League of Nations, or even on the question of ratification of the peace treaty, but in his determination to put the opponents of the administration on record as really opposed, and not straddling the question. The last precious pronouncement before that of yesterday was that the senator from Idaho was determined to fight against ratification—even if he had to "fight alone." But he has tired of his utter loneliness, and seeks now to have the Republican leaders, who are not progressive, go on record. He doesn't care whether they are with him or against him. They must go on record. The senator is quite spectacular in his statement, referring to his brother Republicans who lack progressiveness as "white-livered satelites" who would go "skulking" through such a fight without opinion, or without sufficient backbone to express them. The senator has expressed his opinion, has got in had with 70 per cent of his constituents, and now wants company.

His Republican brothers in opposition should have the courage of their convictions. Certainly they are opposed to the treaty of peace, the league of nations and everything else that has been done by the administration. That's what they hold as their right in the minority in the senate. Sure they hold a "minority" in the senate, but that distinguished body they should assert their "rights" and save the country from the errors of the Democracy. They would do this, if their previous attempts to embarrass and discredit President Wilson had met with any success.

The reaction which followed senatorial attacks on the league of nations gave the brave avenger a shock and a fright. They are sorry they spoke, and they are now trying to forget that they did speak. They are backing away from the subject. The wisest of them are silent. Senator Simons said the other day that the treaty would be ratified because the "slim Republican majority" could not muster enough strength to defeat it. Senator Borah is the only one to stand pat in his opposition stand. The signers of the treaty, cabin, are going to forget this.

Just as they are getting into a proper mental attitude, here comes up Senator Borah, and demands that they go on record. So the old guard is up a tree. The situation is disquieting to them. If they oppose the president their opposition will bring down upon them the condemnation of 90 per cent of the people; if they fall in line and support the president, the radical Borah alone and unaided will carry the fight to their corner.

Altogether the situation is so fraught with difficulties to the senatorial leaders that most of their attention will have to be devoted to extricating themselves from the entanglements, thus leaving the administration to put through the measures so vitally necessary to the welfare of the country, and then sit back and chin all the credit for the good work.

Meanwhile Borah upon his high pinnacle of loneliness may reflect that he would rather be right than be president, and be comforted by the thought that he will seldom be one and never the other.

THE VICTORY LOAN

Today is the last day of the victory loan drive. Today the nation will determine if the patriotism is more than a surface manifestation, or whether it is really a deep-rooted sentiment. When the war was on, and the shores of the home of the brave were threatened by invading submarines, when a conquered France and Great Britain meant a long conflict between America and Germany, the people step up their money in support of the government in the biggest task ever undertaken by an American administration. Now that the war is over, shall we attempt to "pass the buck" or "let George finish the job"? Tonight the story will be told in figures compiled at Washington.

But the nation's success will not raise the same thrill of patriotism as the people of Twin Falls city and county if they fail to deliver. Besides, the bills have got to be paid. That is a foregone conclusion. We will pay the debts either through the bond issue or through the indirect system of taxation. Every man, woman and child who pays a shoe or a raton is going to help pay the war bill. Everybody who buys food, pays rent or goes to the movies is paying for the war—no matter how it is taxed.

Taxes will be higher if the victory loan fails, and the public conscience will not be as easy because the public has failed to do its duty if the bond issue is not subscribed.

Besides the soaring thing of higher taxes which must inevitably follow failure, there are the men who gave their lives that this nation and the world might be freed from militarism, and the million boys still over there holding the Hun banners beyond the Rhine—shall they be forgotten? Shall it be said of us that we vacillate patriotism only when the country is in danger, that we cheer the flag only when we would hide behind its comforting protection? The answer is in your own conscience regarding the victory loan and it will be given to the world tonight.

GOOD ROADS AS GAS SAVERS

One feature of improved highways that is likely to be overlooked is that of saved gasoline consumption. Twin Falls will soon have a system of highways that will not only make the roads passable throughout the year, but will cut down on the travelers and save money for the farmers who come to town in automobiles. A test was made in Ohio recently to determine the saving in gasoline from running a motor truck over a good road. The greatest pains were taken to eliminate from the test every variant except the surface and tires. Five new army standard trucks were used for the trial.

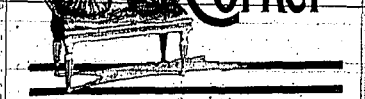
They were sent over seven different types of road surfaces on practically level ground.

The test results showed an average of 5.78 miles per gallon over a dirt road in good condition, 7.19 over fair gravel, 9.33 over gravel about the same over fair bituminous macadam and good hard roads, 11.41 over extra smooth brick and 17.28 over good concrete.

There is a gain of over six miles per gallon between the best and worst type of road with standard trucks. The trucks loaded showed that the poor road took seven times as much gasoline per mile as the good road.

This being the age of the automobile and the beginning of the auto truck as a real factor in transportation, these figures speak louder than words on the small economy of sound roads. Furthermore, into these figures enters on calculation of the wear and tear upon an expensive machine in going over rough highways, not the time lost. They are only to show that the saving in gasoline alone must be figured as going a long way toward paying for the construction of good pavements the country through.
