

# PEACE WILL COME TO EARTH BY END OF JUNE

## Wilson Will Speak to Joint Session

WASHINGTON, May 10.—President Wilson will address a joint session of congress on the international situation as soon as he returns to Washington. This was officially announced at the White House today, following the receipt of advice from Paris. The president will be expected to return, but it is known that he has been planning to sail on a special fast day—less possible and as far as was known, there have been no developments that would be likely to force a change in his plans. The fact that the president will address congress in person on the international situation, led to the conclusion that the president's message to congress, when it comes, will be a "special" session on May 28, will deal only with routine matters, such as the supply and appropriation bills that members will be required to take up.

## SECOND LEG OF ATLANTIC TRIP IS COMPLETED WITH SUCCESS

Two airplanes safe at Trepanay; ready for big hop to Azores if weather permits.

ABOARD H. B. S. PRINCE, THE PERRY, N. F. May 10.—Two of America's first aeroplanes having completed their second leg of the Atlantic trip with the Azores the next stop.

The two craft, the Hispania NC-1 and NC-2, arrived here from Halifax late today. Their sister plane, the NC-4, was still at Chatham, where, where she put in Thursday night the first leg of the voyage from Rockaway Beach, N. J., after developing motor trouble.

Despite the fact that she was forced to touch a 35-mile head wind in the last hour of her trip, the NC-2 made the 350 nautical miles from Halifax in the last average of 70.5 miles an hour. It touched down at 11:30 a. m. (American eastern time) and arrived at 2:45, her longest time being 2 hours and 45 minutes.

The NC-2 took the 100-mile hop about 45 minutes after the NC-1 this morning but was forced to put back soon after to be refueled with a new propeller, which her second hop was completed at 8:02 P. M. Her elapsed time was eight hours, and 23 minutes and her average 62.5 miles an hour.

The NC-1, which left the base of the Hudson river at 11:30 a. m. after leaving the NC-4 for her record in the first leg, it was hoped, she would reach Trepanay by 7:30. When that hour passed, a search of the sky was made, but the plane was still unaccounted for.

For Spring Brides

Ribbons and lace play a big part in the part in undergarments, neckties, jackets, and all the trimmings of dresses that need to be exquisite and dainty. APPLE KEEPS WELL UNTIL LATE SPRING

Delicious Variety Developed by J. A. Waters by Cultivation and Top Grafting Is Little Short of Wonder

All apples are good—but some are better than others. In the spring of the year almost any apple is good, for there are indeed few varieties that will keep until May. Among these few varieties is the Delcoletto.

A. Waters, who lives about a mile north of the Washington school is one of the best-known horticulturists of the Twin Falls tract. He has made a special study of apples, and has done much toward the development of the Delcoletto variety, which he says is especially adapted to the climate of southern Idaho.

"I don't want to boast about something that I can't back up," said Mr. Waters yesterday, and he produced two apples, as sound as ordinary apples are in the fall. "Just try these apples, and if you can't get any more of them as you ever saw in May, just hand 'em back."

The samples were small and juicy and true to their name. "Delicious," Mr. Waters is certain that no other variety will keep so well. It has been many years a resident of the Twin Falls tract, devoting much time to the development of this apple. He has not only worked over his own orchards, but has worked over the trees of others by top grafting. The country is indeed fortunate to have a horticulturist who works not only with his own orchard, but is willing to lend assistance to others in their efforts to make fruit growing on the Twin Falls tract a profitable work.

"I am satisfied that Twin Falls apples are as good as those of any other part of the country. The trouble is that the proper variety has not been cultivated. It is not necessary to feel an economic apple which will vary. It can be done by top grafting. There are a lot of profitable orchards here that can be turned into Delcoletto orchards by grafting and made profitable. People in the fruit business ought to look up the good qualities of this apple."

The economic proposals of the Germans are intended to mitigate the economic conditions imposed by the peace treaty terms.

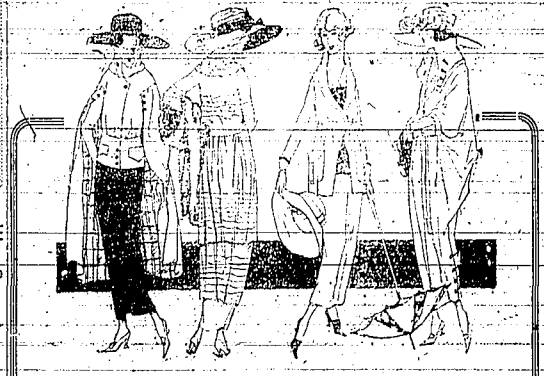

## Overland Breaks World's Record

Remarkable automobile performance is not as frequent these days as they were four or five years ago, the American automobile manufacturer has attained so very high a standard of product. That explains why so much unusual attention has been attracted when the last few days to a new world's performance record made by an Overland stock car, Model 90.

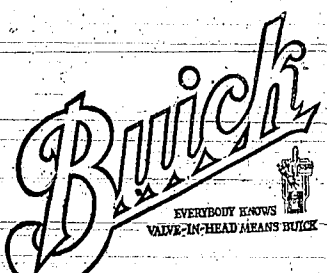

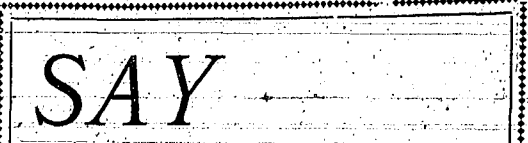
