CONCERNING BROKEN POINTS

The Germans insist that the peace treaty, as worked out at Paris, falls to follow President Wilson's "fourteen points," and on breaks faith with Germany, because those points formed the basis of the understanding by which Germany agreed to lay down her arms. It is not necessary, nor wise, to ignore the accusation, or answer it with a word of contempt. The issue raised is one of fact, and should be handled by arguments based on fact.

The New York World, after a careful analysis of the treaty with relation to the fourteen points, declares that the German protest "is without substantial basis except in one specific instance." The point have all been adhered to throughout the treaty, so far as they apply to Germany, says the World, except the last one. This is the point which provides for a general association or League of Nations, "for the purpose of affording mutual guarantees of political independence and territorial integrity to great and small nations alike."

The League of Nations has been formed, as intended, but the peace conference has failed to make the specific connection between the league and Germany. Though Germany is obliged to recognize the league, she is not permitted membership in it, nor is there any invitation for her to join, nor express provision for admitting her.

Whether this omission is intrinsically serious is a debatable question. It may be urged that there is no occasion for a specific arrangement for admitting Germany to the league, because she can come in according to the general method provided, by making application and receiving an approving vote of two-thirds of the members. But Germany clearly expects something more than this.

The fact that Germany expects or expects a thing is, in itself, of little importance. But the allies cannot afford to do anything that can be interpreted as dishonorable. Neither can they afford to be shortsighted. It is likely, as the World suggests, that the allies would be safer with Germany in the league than with Germany outside of it.

ished her obligations to the world. But Germany may at least have a right to know that she is not to be permanently barred from the league and on what conditions she can make herself eligible to membership.

THOSE NAUGHTY, NAUGHTY DOUGHBOYS

Details are looking past the censor, and pretty soon the whole story will be known. But the tale carries a suggestion of something wrong, as it is told the good people of the United States might draw a wrong inference—and thus their clouds upon the characters of nine hundred and thirty-five officers and enlisted men of the Third United States Army. These men were assessed the sum of \$7,000 francs by a French railway to reimburse the railway for freight that disappeared one night soon after the Americans arrived in Yvel, included in the assessed army men were three majors, 15 captains, 52 first lieutenants, 174 second lieutenants, and 637 enlisted men.

It was a beautiful night, with stars shining and the moon's soft rays casting dreamy shadows over the landscape. Just such a night as makes naughty doughboys and lieutenants and captains and majors would choose for a frolic. When they discovered a freight car loaded with champagne, destined doubtless for some wine-bibbling French soldierly, it was more than they could bear—and they proceeded to destroy the forbidden juice of the grape.

The French railway officials insisted at the trial that the soldiers drank the champagne. How absurd! How preparatory thought that these soldiers, representing a great nation dedicated to prohibition of the rum traffic, should even taste the forbidden drink!

The railway employees reported that after the riot they found many of the bottles broken. Of course! If the employees had only some sense thoroughly they might have found that the whole shipment of 2122 bottles had been broken.

WHAT A MEMORIAL SHOULD NOT BE

In whatever discussions may come up as to what constitutes a suitable memorial for the Idaho boys who went away to fight the battle of liberty, there is certain to be differences of opinion as to what the memorial should consist of. Experts in the fine arts have a right to express an opinion on matters about which they are more conversant than laymen. Perhaps their advice will not be followed, but if their suggestions serve to eliminate that kind of memorials which are almost certain to violate artistic principles, at least local committees, not fully conversant with the subjects connected with art, will not make the errors complained of.

The national committee of fine arts has issued a warning to patriotic committees against setting up portrait statues as memorials for two reasons—first, because the subject of memorials is up-erformed in many communities, and second, because portrait statues, unless made by men of experience and artistic temperament, are likely to violate all canons of art, and prove in the end to be rather a subject of amusement than as a memorial of the great events commemorated.

"Portrait statues of individuals are rarely successful," says the circular of advice to local committees, "and yet, with committees, they are the favorite form of commemoration.—A portrait statue which is also a work of art is not an impossibility, but it is such a rarity that committees should exhaust other possibilities before setting on this one."

Community social center buildings are recommended as the first choice, and memorial bridges, which shall combine real architectural beauty with fine materials and construction to last a thousand years, are also recommended.

BOND INTEREST AND WAR SAVINGS STAMPS

Nearly a hundred million dollars was collected on collectible bonds from the United States government last Thursday by nine and a half million subscribers to the special liberty loan us semi-annual interest. The exact amount was \$22,345,040.

If all holders of second liberty loan bonds cashed their coupons and immediately bought war savings stamps, the aggregate result would reach \$20,000,000. In other words the investment of half their interest on second liberty loan bonds for 1919 in war savings stamps would net them an additional aggregate income of \$7,335,040 with out expending one cent of effort.

Money is the most prolific thing in the world. It takes figures such as these to bring the fact home. Four per cent, every one knows, means four cents on a dollar, but few realize that that is the stuff these millions are made of. It doesn't take much to make the humble four cents on a dollar look pretty big.

In the Twelfth federal reserve district alone, which is virtually the Pacific coast, 624,654 second loan subscribers had coming to them Thursday \$5,850,057 in semi-annual interest.—That averages \$9.37 for each subscriber. If one neglects to cash the coupon, the money lies dead; if one spends it, it is gone. But if one cashes the coupon and takes a minute to buy war savings stamps or war certificates, the interest goes to work at once earning four per cent compounded every three months.

The government wants everybody to reinvest liberty bond interest.

CHECKING PROSPERITY

The Bureau of War Risk Insurance mailed 1,159,622 checks during the month of March. It does things like that right along, and stands in a class pretty nearly by itself for the size of its check-making organization.

Ninety-six machines are kept busy writing plates for the checks, which are then printed on another machine. The checks have to be signed, too, with the help of labor-saving devices. Twenty checks are now signed with actual pen signatures by a single operation.

Very few people aspire to the task of making out checks in wholesale lots like this, but it certainly would be fun to have to install a labor-saving device in order to scrape writer's cramp from endorsing checks received from other people!
