INDUSTRIES CAN'T RUN WITHOUT THEM

Delegates Say Nation Thus Is Unable to Give Bread and Work to Inhabitants—No Nation Now Wants German Emigrants.

PARIS, May 23.—The protest presented today by the German delegation to the peace conference, that Germany had grown from an agricultural to an industrial state, and that the world's peace, made by their living by foreign trade and navigation, or by their raw material from foreign countries. Under the peace treaty it was asserted, Germany would lose its entire territory equivalent to the loss of 25 per cent of her total crop of corn and potatoes, she would lose three-quarters of her industrial output, and three-fifths of her pig production and in addition would be compelled to deliver enormous quantities of coal to other nations.

JOHNSONVILLE, Pa., May 23.—Michael McNight, an octogenarian gas burner, was killed in an unusual manner recently. He was turning a hole in a piece of steel plate which he rested on an oxygen tank carrying 1500 pounds pressure. The flame of the burner not only cut through the plate but also struck the tank. The intense pressure blew the plate into the man's face, causing instant death.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

LESSON FOR MAY 25. REPENTANCE.

LEVIN YETUS—Josh 1:8-10, Luke 11: 14-15.

THE TOPIC—The People of Nineveh.

THE INTERMEDIATE TOPIC—Turning from Sin to God.

THE IMMEDIATE TOPIC—The Nature and Fruit of Repentance.

1. The Repentance of the People of Nineveh (1:8-10). The following steps are noted in their conversion:

1. Hearing the Word of the Lord (v. 1-4).

The Lord commanded Jonah to go to Nineveh, a great and wicked city, and there "preach the preaching that he himself proclaimed." The king of Nineveh that it required three days to compass it; that is, to visit its very centers of activity. Jonah, coming from the south, had just entered the city from the south, and during an entire day going from center to center, "for forty days Nineveh shall be overthrown" (v. 4). Since the king's palace seems to have been in the north part of the city, Jonah's first sermon found its way into the very people would preach what God bids him, there would be more cities turning to God.

2. Believing (v. 8). They not only believed God would deliver them from the evil they were in, but they put their trust in him for mercy and salvation.

3. Repented (v. 10). They were shown in (1) proclaiming a fast and putting on sackcloth (v. 6-7). These marks of mourning were not to be worn by the king or his throne to the most humble man. (2) Great humility to God (v. 8). In the midst of their humiliation they cried out in tears to God: "O Turned from their evil ways (v. 8). The final test of repentance is turning from evil to doing good. When a man is not in having, his lady come to quit it.

4. Accepted by God (v. 10). When the Ninevites turned from their evil ways, God forgave them and spared them upon them. It averaged judgment. God is unchangeable—He will not turn from their sins his wrath is repented unto. This is what is meant by God's repentance.

5. The Necessity of Repentance (Luke 13:1-5).

Repentance is necessary on the part of all sinners. "The wages of sin is death" (Rom. 6:23). While God is unalterably opposed to sin in his nature, he is infinitely merciful in his nature, and he will not punish him who repents. It is not a question of how great a sinner one is that determines the need for repentance, since God cannot look upon evil: "For thou art of purer eyes than to behold evil, and canst not look upon iniquity" (Hab. 1:13). No man can ever see his sin in peace unless he turns from his sin. God commands men to repent (Acts 17:30).

(II)—The Blessed Results of Repentance (Acts 2:37-38).

1. Remission of sins. Remit means to send away. The one who repents is rid forever of his sins, for he is a new man in Christ.

2. Gift of the Holy Spirit. When one is regenerated he not only is rid of his sin, but God, the Holy Spirit, takes up his abode in him. "As his nature compels him to cause judgment to fall upon those who will not turn from their sins to serve him, his patience is not merely a matter of privilege, but of absolute necessity if one would escape the wrath of God, repentance is his only door of escape from perdition. It is not a question of how great a sinner one is that determines the need for repentance, since God cannot look upon evil: "For thou art of purer eyes than to behold evil, and canst not look upon iniquity" (Hab. 1:13). No man can ever see his sin in peace unless he turns from his sin. God commands men to repent (Acts 17:30).

GERMANY NOW REALIZES SHE'S LOST WAR

Ever since the signing of the armistice more than six months ago, there has been a feeling in America that the war stopped too soon. Now the German realization of her defeat is becoming more and more apparent.

Immediately after the terms were given to the delegates, a storm of protest and threats developed. The Germans said they would not sign; that such an action meant national suicide; that its self-respecting nature would consent thus to throw away its national freedom and enter slavery, both economic and political.

Peelers were put out to the allied and associated governments to see if newly accredited delegates of the German republic, in the persons of independent socialists, would be permitted to sign.

Whatever may be the aftermath of the war, whatever may be the intrigues within the German nation, that the treaty will be signed by somebody purporting to represent the German nation is almost a certainty.

The most urgent insistence that Germany sign comes from that element of the German political world which has preached social revolution for years and which now holds hope for a consummation of its idealistic dream—revolution—undoubtedly after the fatal step is taken.

OWN YOUR OWN HOME IS GOOD SLOGAN

Inability of new-comers to Twin Falls to find a place to live should encourage residents here to build homes to rent or to sell on terms to suit purchasers.

A permanent residence in the home-grown town has the development of a higher type of citizenship, for the home owners have a stake in the community.

Patriotic impulse prompts the desire to own a home, and patriotic duty calls for the building of homes now. Apparently not much is to be gained by waiting for a decline in prices of building materials.

John article more than a column long, the official organ of the Republican organization expounds and encourages the attempt which Representative McAdoo of Pennsylvania, has announced will be made to repeal the act under which farm loan banks have been established.

Repeating the statements of a former Republican congressman, the organ characterizing the farm loan act as "class legislation," asserts that it does not promote home building or the buying of farms.

Herbert Kitch, member of the farm loan board, has already pointed out that the attack on the farm loan banks is inspired by the covetous which have made millions in lending money to farmers at excessive interest.

When it is remembered that the federal land banks have out-standing about \$180,000,000 of loans to farmers, the paying to the latter in interest, compared with the rates they would have to pay to private lenders, will be seen to be a vast amount.

JAZZ AND BOOZE

The relation of alcohol to intemperate may not have been fully appreciated. There may be a subtle connection between booze and jazz.

Mr. Kern attributes the present craze for jazz shows and jazz music in general to abnormal hilarity superinduced by alcohol.

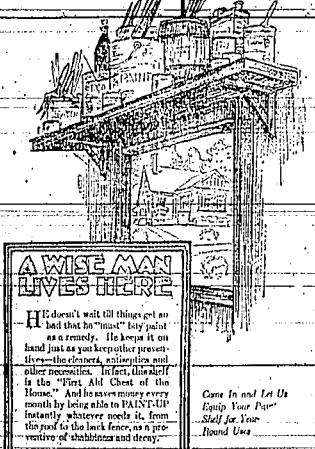

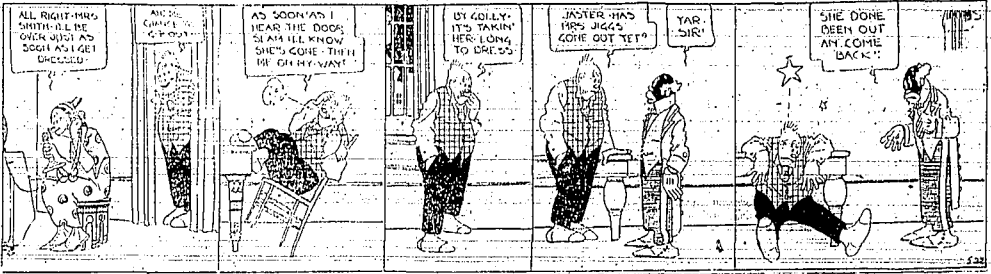

SHIPPING NEEDS TOLD BY HURLEY AT CONFERENCE

Chairman Did Not Touch on How Government Should Dispose of Its Merchant Ships

WASHINGTON, May 22.—There are great needs which the American merchant marine should be equipped to fill in addition to the transportation of freight, are outlined today by Chairman Edward S. Hurley, of the United States shipping board, before a conference of representatives of American shippers, importers and exporters, chambers of commerce, farm organizations, manufacturers, retailers of farm products, manufacturers, ship builders and investors.

Mr. Hurley said, in part: "The establishment and maintenance of an American ocean mail service capable of covering the world. Centrally controlled wireless telegraph service for promoting the safety of life and property at sea, and for giving to American shipping and business the advantage of continental commercial information. Adequate provision for the training of an officer personnel capable of making sure that other ships will always go to sea in charge of American citizens. Mr. Hurley did not touch upon the question of how the government should dispose of its ships. This was

INSECT ENEMIES, GARDEN AND FARM

Grasshopper plagues date back to biblical days. In India the grasshoppers attack and eat up the crops and in China, the laboring people attack and eat up the grasshoppers. As this is an appetite that we have not yet destroyed we need to attack and destroy these pests by other means. Mr. H. Miller, director of the Malaya Technical Institute, suggested the most practical and successful method of combating grasshoppers by broadcasting the following: bean meal cake in the morning before sunrise, especially along the ditch banks and fence rows: Guarano bran, 20-25 lbs. Cheap molasses, 2 quarts. White arsenic, 1 lb. Orange or lemon, 2 lbs. Water, 2½ gallons.

When the grasshoppers are in the field, throw fruit up line or run through dry and add to the liquid. Add gradually the liquid mixture to the dry mixture, stirring thoroughly. The consistency of the mash should be such that it can be readily broadcasted, but there should be no large chunks. When the young grasshoppers are first noticed, do not delay in broadcasting your poison cake, as it is much easier to poison them before they are able to fly. A second broadcasting is advisable a week to ten days after the first. Grasshoppers lay their eggs about one inch below the surface of the ground, along neglected fence rows.

LOSES RACE WITH DEATH

Mr. Tolle, an Evansville mailer who served with the American Expeditionary forces in France, had a recent death from "air sickness" while in France. His wife, for whom doctors held no hope, begged for "air sickness" medicine. Her husband, mid at last permission was obtained for Tolle to leave his organization and come here. attacking the leaves of other plants, as turnips, beets, etc. eliminated. To handle large patches, spray before the leaves curl with "Black-leaf 40," using one part to 1000 parts of water. This same spray will kill aphids (plant lice) attacking the leaves and shoots of fiber plants. If both cabbage worms and aphids are present, mix the lead arsenate spray and the "Black-leaf 40" spray and apply at the same time.
