PRESIDENT WILLING TO STAND CRITICISM

WASHINGTON, May 27.—President Wilson is "quite willing to stand for any criticism of his attitude in behalf of women and children."

This statement was contained in a cablegram from the president, received at the executive offices of the White House yesterday in reply to a message stating that there was considerable criticism in this country of his recent telegram to Miss Jane Adams, at the International Women's Conference in Rotterdam.

There has been a general misunderstanding with regard to the president's telegram to Miss Adams. It was stated by White House officials that the message expressing sympathy with a recommendation of the meeting was in reply to a message from Miss Adams' writing that the blockade on Germany may be modified and not, as reported, urging more lenient parole terms for German prisoners.

The belief that President Wilson's invariable note in his response to a recommendation for more lenient parole terms, as adopted by the Inter-Allied Conference, resulted in a broad-spectrum of criticism, drawing fire even from President Taft, leading to the resignation of the League of Nations.

BLAME TURKEY'S FALL ON DOGS

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 26.—The religious Turk is very much discouraged. The mosques are not as well patronized as formerly for Mehmet is blamed for the loss of that war. Home-Reading Course for Citizen-Soldiers

Under the auspices of the War Department and in accordance with the provisions of the Act of March 3, 1917, the following course of instruction is hereby prescribed for the use of the National Guard and the National Militia.

NINE SOLDIERLY QUALITIES.

The three basic qualities, Loyalty, Obedience and Physical Fitness, were outlined in the preceding lesson. There are three other qualities, which are especially required during the periods of training, marching and waiting between combats. They are:

Intelligence.

Intelligence does not necessarily mean education, but rather quick observation and willingness to learn. There is plenty of need for intelligence in modern warfare. The National Guard will be forced to adopt a more modern warfare which would ordinarily extend over a period of two or three years. Those who intend to be in the service for promotion should study thoroughly the manuals and the regulations which affect their own branch.

Circumstances.

Circumstances is important everywhere, but most of all in the army where large bodies of men are brought together. It includes not only the knowledge of your own branch, but also your mind and your actions.

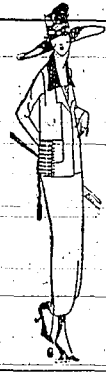

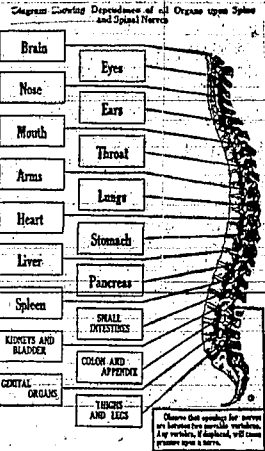
