MEMORIAL DAY IN FRANCE

Yesterday was the second time in history that the hands and of the United States were joined in celebrating the American Memorial day and in doing honor to the American dead who sleep on the battlefields of France.

Yesterday was a day of tears and joy as the souls of the dead and the thanksgiving that the war was done.

Old men, women and little children—French civilians grateful to cry for her aid in the war—had brought flowers with which to adorn the American graves; a couple of army chaplains and a platoon of Salvation Army workers stood by and were mingling their words with those of the fighting men who were the principal cause in sight.

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That was the war time picture. Today the government which acted its shell fire and bombs against the burial places of our dead comrades, and the representatives of those who would bring order of the class into which the policy of ruthlessness plunged Germany have been staying at the historic Versailles "to settle the account," not on their own terms, but on terms directed by the allied and associated powers.

There are more American graves in France this year than there were last year, but the reward of this sacrifice has come in the debt of gratitude. For weeks past representative American men and women, have given their time and money to see that each of the 300 American heroes buried in France shall not be forgotten.

IT DEPENDS UPON THE POINT OF VIEW

Many sincere workers for universal suffrage in the United States can regard the present status of the suffrage amendment to a federal constitution with satisfaction. It seems altogether likely that the amendment will be submitted to the states by the present extraordinary session of the Sixty-sixth congress.

But there are some other suffrage workers who will view the situation with alarm, unless they have put off their hypotheses and come more in line with their present position. The last time suffrage came up at the final test of strength in the senate of the United States it lost by a very narrow margin. Interest was intense. In a certain suffrage state of which Salt Lake City is the capital, at that time was professional suffragette, working assiduously among the women, urging them what they should do for their sisters in other states which did not grant the right to vote to the fair sex. The women were ardently interested. They had "committees appointed" and were holding meetings where they adopted "resolutions" and were doing "everything" to promote the work of "votes for women." They were very real enthusiastic, under the potent spell of the foresaid professional suffragette.

Then the election came. The amendment failed in the senate. It gloomed to the women, but the enthusiastic workers for universal suffrage in the United States can regard the present status of the suffrage amendment to a federal constitution with satisfaction.

"Oh, gandy!" she exclaimed. "Two more years for Florence." By the failure of congress to pass the resolution submitting the proposition to the states, she was assured two more years of professional suffragette and that was her only interest in the matter. So the present position of the suffrage amendment may be viewed with alarm, or pointed to with pride. It all depends upon the point of view.
