WASHINGTON, May 31.—America's navy is not to be reduced to the equal of any other navy, it is declared in a statement of the Secretary of the Navy, Mr. Joseph Daniels.

Mr. Daniels' statement is a direct answer to a question asked by the House of Representatives, whether the navy should be reduced to the level of the British navy.

Mr. Daniels said that the navy is essential to the national safety and that any reduction would be a danger to the country.

He also mentioned that the navy is the backbone of the nation's defense and that it must be maintained at a high level.

Mr. Daniels' statement is a clear indication of the government's policy on the navy and that it will not be reduced.

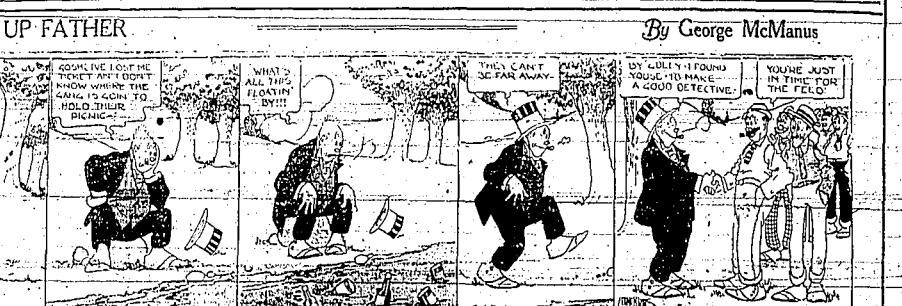
