

STRIKE TES UP SOUTHEASTERN UNITED STATES

TELEGRAPHERS OUT TO GET SETTLEMENT OF OLD GRIEVANCES

General Walkout Order Issued Yesterday by International President of Telegraphers' Union - Strikers Concentrated in Atlanta Unable to Work Because Nobody Is on Other End.

ATLANTA, Ga., June 6.—The fifth day of the strike against the Southern Bell Telephone company broke today with about every Western Union wire in the southeastern States stricken by a sympathetic strike of commercial telegraphers from Richmond to Tampa and on the Mississippi river to the Atlantic coast.

Strikers of the Atlanta office were concentrated in Atlanta when the strike was called off and other administrators there said that the Atlanta Western Union office alone would be equipped with telegraphers were borne out in this morning.
