ARMENIANS DYING BY HUNDREDS CHILDREN EATING HUMAN FLESH MANY TOO WEAK TO BURY DEAD

LONDON, June 8.—Terrible and gruesome confirmation of the awful conditions existing in Armenia are given in the report submitted to the United States by Mr. Neville Chamberlain, a member of the American Red Cross, in Constantinople. Chamberlain has made a recent trip to the Trans-Caucasus and reports on the conditions he found on a journey from Yerevan to Eriwan.

He reports that by hundreds people are dying from lack of food. Many children reduced to such extreme weakness that they cannot walk, and a little girl called her dead brother's arm a little child of seven years in order to attract the attention of her father. The father, however, who was in a state of despair and grief, refused to take her to her brother's grave, and she was forced to remain in the town as having taken place during the past few months.

In the Yedig district (Republic of Erivan), 1,500 persons died from the railroad, there are also ten towns and villages with respective populations of from 1,000 to 5,000. These people are preferentially Armenian and a few Kurds, a mixture of Armenian and Turkish. The population of from 1,000 to 5,000 is now being reduced to a skeleton of 100 or 200 persons, and many are dying from lack of food.

In March 100,000 refugees died daily and the Armenians and non-refugee population shows a total loss of from 100,000 to 200,000.

Most of the Armenians are being fed by the American committee. The committee has been informed that it has been found that many of the refugees were people who were originally in the district there are only forty-two doctors, mostly graduates of Russian universities, and less than 100 nurses, and that is a slight knowledge of nursing.

According to Chamberlain, one great fault is that the Armenian government has refused to depend too greatly upon the Armenians, but rather to depend upon the Turks, and that instead of forcing their own wealthy class to contribute to the support of the refugees they are depending upon the Turks for assistance for all the establishments.

ARMENIANS DYING BY HUNDREDS CHILDREN EATING HUMAN FLESH MANY TOO WEAK TO BURY DEAD

LONDON, June 8.—Terrible and after burial and often the half-rotten corpses lie stozzled in the gravest. The American committee manager informs us that the death lists of these corpses by day—and that the starvation has been known to do the most ghastly things. At Karabagh, between Etchmiadzin and Alexandropol, a dead girl's breast and lungs were eaten. Dying children by the hundreds per day; children reduced to such extreme thinness that a case in the hospital of a little girl called her dead brother's name. A little child of seven years died of hunger because he was unable to enter the narrow, and corpses being discarded and used for human consumption are mentioned by the reports that children were found as having taken place during the past few months. In the Yedig district (Republic of Erivan), lying some thirty miles from the railroad, there are also or other towns and villages with regular population of from 1,000 to 1,500. These people are predominantly Armenian with a few cases, a mixture of Armenian and Assyrian. The conditions here are shocking. As a result of starvation the people here are weak they are incapable of moving from the houses and cannot even properly dig graves. At Yedig, twenty-five men were removed from the town in one day and of a certain family of twelve persons all were dead while a work.

In the town of Igdir there was little or no work. There were two orphan asylums, crowded with little children of three, four and under, some of whom were wrapped in blankets because of lack of clothing. The atmosphere in the sick room of one of these orphanages was most offensive and it was informed by the superintendent here—Armenian—that they had rather medical supplies nor disinfectants. At the other orphanage, I saw some forty children perishing of their male daily meal of a small quantity of boiled rice. They were fed on this in one day and of a certain family of twelve persons all were dead while a work.

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Woman were seen in the unfinished fields in this region digging for roots of food, which they sold for five cents for each pound. It was noted that while villages of Tavris were intruding with the Armenians, the fields of the former were in a good condition, while those of the Armenians had been plowed up and despoiled, showing that the practice of forcing these people to work the soil is not a real solution.

The remaining Turks made a thorough sweep of all Armenian villages, agricultural implements and livestock belonging to the Armenians. LEAGUE OF NATIONS MAY SUBSTITUTE BIO NAVY

When Secretary Danforth first recommended last winter, a new naval building plan calling for the expenditure of \$600,000,000 of additional money in three years, he himself did not clearly explain the purpose of the proposal, but there were two explanations suggested. One was that the United States would have to possess a navy as strong as any other in the world if the plan for a peace league and general disarmament came to nothing.

This explanation, at any rate, seems defensible from Secretary Danforth's recent action in withdrawing his recommendation and returning to the comparatively modest building plan laid down before the war. His action suggests that the administration, at least, is satisfied that the league of nations can go through, and that it will be an adequate substitute for big naval armament in our future system of defense.

Whatever anyone may think of that, there is no question as to the force of the appeal made just now by the prospect of saving \$600,000,000 at one stroke. The nation is getting rather weary of war bills, and the prospect of diminished armament by sea and land is one of the most telling arguments in behalf of the league of nations.

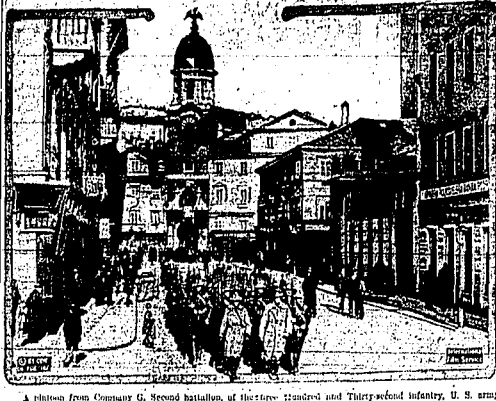

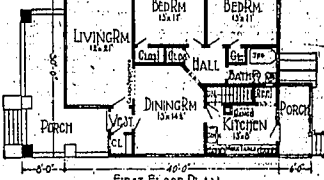

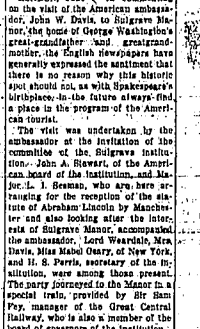
