SINN FEINER RESOLUTION UP TO WILSON

President May or May Not Present Senate Resolution to Peace Conference

PARIS, June 11.—The situation again took a prominent place in public interest today as a result of the scheduled interview between the two Irish American delegates—Frank P. Walsh and Edward Deane—and President Wilson at the White House. The American declaration is apparently of the unanimous opinion that the senate resolution requires representation of the Sinn Féiners at the peace conference in entirety up to the president. There are conflicting views, however, as to what course will be followed.

One delegate expressed belief that the president would probably insist on resolution as coming direct from the senate, thus relieving the delegation of responsibility and the possible stirring up of international complications.

On the other hand, it is pointed out that, if the president saw fit, he could resolve the situation by resolution to the conference at all. Referring to continued criticism of American senators regarding the "great task" American officials pointed out that there has never been a case in history where the president submitted the text of a treaty which was subject to resolution before it had actually been revised and ready for signature.
