Other resolutions attacking government monopolies, amended pensions, and other matters were adopted. The resolutions also called for the release of all soldiers and sailors from civilian organizations, the withdrawal of all troops from the navy yards, a strike of the navy yards, and the withdrawal of all troops from the navy yards.
