

BADE ONLY BATTLE LEFT

Hun Plot to Destroy Moved With Clocklike Precision

Nine Dreadnaughts, Five Battle Cruisers, Five Light Cruisers, Twenty-eight Destroyers Sunk

ALL VESSELS STARTED DOWN AT SAME TIME

CREWS OPENED COCKS AND STARTED ASHORE

Small Numbers of Germans Killed When They Refused to Halt and Were Fired Upon—Rear Admiral and Most of Crews Are Aboard British Vessels Awaiting Act of Admiralty.

LONDON, June 21—All the German battleships and battle cruisers in the Baltic Sea were sunk by their crews today, according to the British Admiralty announced tonight. The Bismarck will float.

The German rear admiral and most of the Germans are in custody aboard our ships. Some of the boats from the ships refused to halt when ordered to do so and were fired upon, small numbers of Germans being killed or wounded.

In accordance with the armistice, the ships were interned with whole crews and with no British guards on board. The admiral's statement follows: According to reports, all German battleships and battle cruisers were sunk except the Bismarck, which is still afloat. Five light cruisers were sunk and the other three have been beached.

Small numbers of Germans were killed and wounded. The British ships published in the terms of their surrender no mention was made of the Bismarck.

The British Admiralty's statement did not say specifically how many German ships were sunk. At the time of their internment it was said there were also dreadnaughts, five battle cruisers and 80 destroyers.

It is just the way our boys would have done under similar circumstances, many officers being killed and the crews were bitter against the Germans and declared the enemy's manner should be executed. There was great indignation and the form of punishment that will be meted out to the Germans.

The belief was general that the British will not exercise the same leniency as the result of the sinking.
