Note From Weimar Carries Momentous News to Paris

DENIES REQUEST FOR MORE TIME

Less Than 150 Words Enough to Give German Final Decision of Conference

PARIS, June 22.—The German government has today officially notified the Allies that it has accepted the peace terms proposed by the Allies. The note, which is only 150 words long, is the shortest in the history of the peace negotiations. It contains no promises, no threats, and no excuses. It is a simple statement of fact.

The note is addressed to the Allied plenipotentiaries in Paris. It begins with the words: "The German government has accepted the peace terms proposed by the Allies." It then goes on to say that the German government has no further requests to make, and that it is ready to sign the peace treaty as soon as the Allies are ready to do so.

CONGRESS IS PREPARING FOR PROHIBITION

Tornado Wipes Out Business Section of Fergus Falls, Minn.—Many Killed

FARGO, N. D., June 22.—Fergus Falls, Minn., has today been reduced to a pile of rubble. A powerful tornado struck the city at 10 o'clock this morning, and in less than five minutes it had destroyed the business section of the city. The water cut a path seven blocks wide through the center of the city, and many lives were lost.

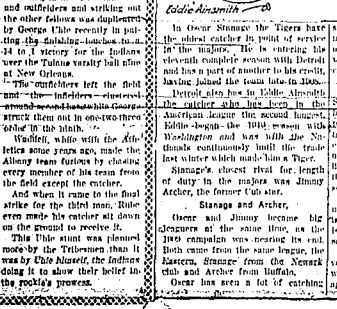
