Dived Into Garbage And Ate Raw Flour

PORTLAND, Ore., June 21.—Diving into garbage barrels and sipping dirty flour from the deck of a ship was the search in which starving Germans went while the steamer Wenzel was enroute into Hamburg recently.

This is the word brought here by Prescott Cowry, professional painter and expert rickman of the Pacific coast, navigating officer of the West Wauwauk.

The vessel carried 7,000 tons of flour for the Poles. They went to Portland, England, thence to Plymouth, and were proceeding to Danzig when orders were wirelessly there to pull in at Hamburg instead because of fighting at Danzig.

The Germans at Hamburg had figured to the last responsible item which they got of the 7,000 tons, said Cowry. "At any time or under any circumstances," he had described the league of nations as a partisan question.

Cowry added that he considered the league of nations an American issue.

HALE EXPLODES BOMB FOR ANTIS

Is Against Present Covenant, But Is Afraid to Throw Principle Overboard

WASHINGTON, June 21.—The refusal to do anything at all to make peace, says probable would bring into better appreciation to the many might be the world to justify the waste in killing the whole plan of a league of nations, Senator Hale declared today.

"Let us go ahead, then, with the idea that we shall adopt in the future some form of a league of nations and then let us formulate a peace that will not betray our country," Hale continued.

"Because President Wilson and the peace conference has put up to us a large covenant that is hostile to the interests of our country, does not mean that we should give up the whole plan."

Coming at the climax of an attack by him on President Wilson and the league covenant as new inter-views with the league treaty, the declaration of the Maine senator for a league of nations means as a bomb-throw to those out and anti-league members who are opposed to the entry of the United States into any kind of a league on the ground that the American people should be "committed to any form of extending foreign alliances."

Hale attacked the president after offering an amendment to the league resolution which provided for the creation of international tribunals for the settlement of questions involving international law.

The Hale resolution was referred without debate to the senate foreign relations committee.

Senator Thomas, Democrat of Colorado, read a telegram from Democratic National Chairman Homer D. Camp, in which the latter stated that "at any time or under any circumstances," he had described the league of nations as a partisan question.

Cowry added that he considered the league of nations an American issue.

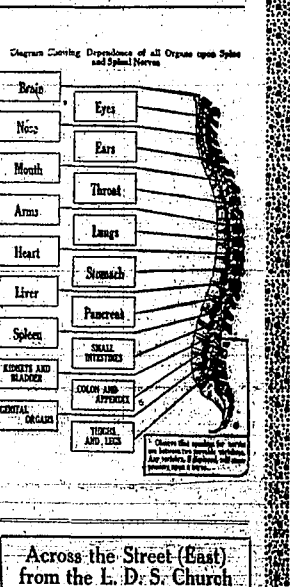
