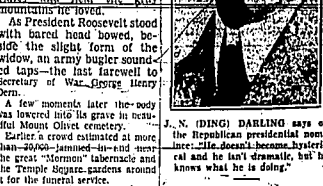

The coroner gave a verdict of suicide.

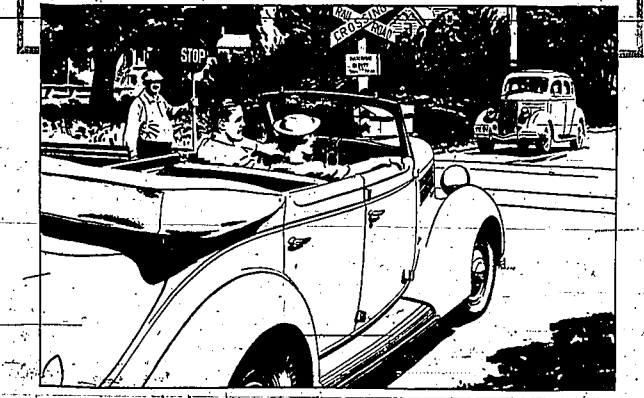
