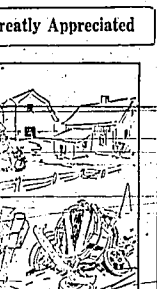

Officials of the yards look for good receipts on the opening day of the auction method of course, that the succeeding sales will outnumber the opening sale in numbers of cattle consigned.

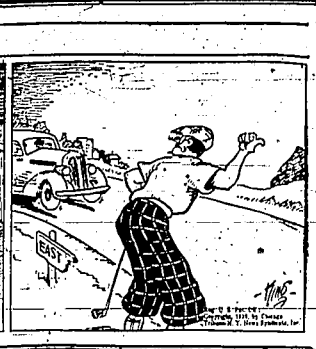
