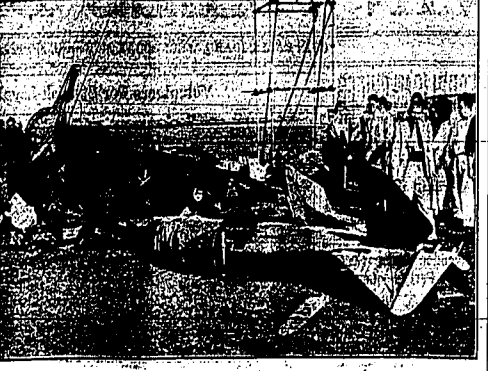

Five States' Cooperation in Advertising Program Suggested

BOISE, Sept. 9 (AP)—More than 150 business leaders from Idaho, Utah, Washington, Oregon and western Montana gathered here today for the opening session of the first annual Pacific Northwest business conference.

The meeting was called to order by C. T. Baker, conference chairman and welcoming addresses were given by R. E. Shephard of Jerome, president of the Western Chamber of Commerce, Donald L. Chapman, Boise, president of the state Junior Chamber and Walter E. York, president of the Boise Chamber of Commerce.

Cooperation of the five states in advertising their products was stressed by Ray Conway, Portland, manager of the Oregon State Motor association.

Invited to Portland Conway announced a northwest promotional conference is to be held in Portland, Oregon, sometime in November and the chairman of the senate and house of representatives highway committee also was invited to attend.

The Portland meeting will be to plan a publicly financed program for the campaign, Conway said.

Herald Jay, publicity director for the Oregon State highway association explained the recreation program being carried on by the association in Idaho and two other states of the state to the tourists' attention.

Jay estimated the tourist trade in Oregon had brought \$25,000,000 into the state, and pointed out the tourist industry had increased approximately 40 per cent over last year.
