Opening today's program will be the pulling contest for horses at 11:30 p. m., to be followed by the afternoon racing program. The rodeo will end under way at 8 p. m. and Old Timer's rodeo champion night rider, will go through his act at 8:30 p. m. and again at 10 p. m.

The rodeo, directed by Leo J. Greener, Shawmut, Montana, showman and owner of the rodeo stock used in the performance, last night attracted more than a hectic first-night engagement and presented what probably was the most enthusiastic demonstration of the sport which ever demonstrated in the county.

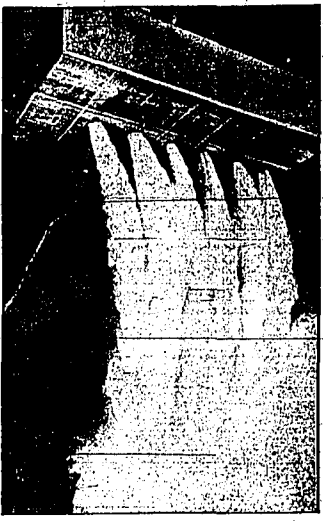

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F. D. R. ADDRESSES 30,000 AT 'GREEN PASTURES' RALLY

Roosevelt's Speech Built Around Biblical Lyric And Theme of Greater Prosperity for Nation

(By The Associated Press) - CHARLOTTE, N. C., Sept. 10 - A cheering, sopping wet audience from the heart of the southland heard President Roosevelt assert today the nation has rounded the corner toward prosperity, that individual liberties have not been removed, and inherent rights of the sovereign states have not been violated.

The president, himself soaked by a heavy downpour, spoke to thousands of persons assembled from 16 states at the "Green Pastures" rally in Charlotte's municipal stadium.

A clubstart earlier in the afternoon had delayed the president nearly an hour outside from Asheville, N. C., before getting down again as the Roosevelt cavalcade of cars wound through packed Charlotte streets.

Through the deluge here the president sat in his open car, without even a raincoat for protection but smiling broadly and waving his hat unceasingly.

The sun came out and a rainbow streaked the eastern sky as he left his auto and stepped into the speaker's platform.

Rally officials estimated 30,000 persons were jammed into the WPA-built booth.

Biblical Theme - The president built his address around the biblical lyric of the "Green Pastures" and "Still Waters" of the twenty-third psalm and concluded with the words: "The Lord is good, whose mercy is everlasting."

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U. S. Withdraws Warships From Spanish Waters As Big Guns Shatter Truce

Unofficial 48-Hour Armistice Ends With Renewal Of Attack When San Sebastian Refuses To Surrender

(By The Associated Press) - The United States ordered warships to withdraw from Spanish waters last night as Fascist rebels renewed bombardment of San Sebastian.

The northern Spanish city on the Bay of Biscay refused to surrender unconditionally after the rebel bombardment began after an unofficial 48-hour truce.

Within San Sebastian the defenders fought amongst themselves, Anarchists urging the city be fired while nationalists sought to prevent unnecessary damage.

James was convicted of torturing his wife by sending her to the bites of rattlesnakes while she was tied to a table and then drowning her in a bathtub.

James showed no emotion when the death sentence was pronounced by the court.

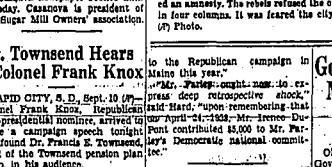
KANSAN LEAVES TOPKA WITH SPOON PREPARED FOR EASTERN CAMPAIGN



HERE is a close copy of the northeast corner of Spain where bitter fighting has raged between the loyal and rebel forces in the Spanish civil war.



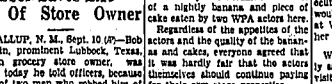

RAIN-FALL REVIVES LATE CORN CROP

Weather Bureau Reports Improvement From Iowa Eastward

CHICAGO, Sept. 10 (AP)—Revival of the late corn crop as a result of recent rains in the droughty burned grain belt was reported today by the weather bureau.

The improvement extended from Iowa and Missouri eastward, the bureau's weekly survey of farm conditions said.

The report made no estimate of the percentage of the crop which could be saved, pointing out that the bulk had been ruined before the rains came.

A large part of the corn was already being cut, the federal crop men asserted.

Crops in general fared even better than corn in the wake of the rains, which reached "heavy to excessive" proportions during the last week in parts of 13 states: Missouri, Iowa, Illinois, Kentucky, Ohio, Michigan, Kansas, Nebraska, Minnesota and North Dakota.

Alfalfa and soy beans showed "marked improvement" and pastures were reported "well stocked." Other benefits of the rains were listed as:

Improvement of the food and fiber situation for livestock, except in parts of the plains states. Stock movements continued, however, in Montana and North Dakota, and water remained scarce in parts of the southwest. Trees and shrubbery continued to die in Oklahoma, which shared 100-degree temperatures with Kansas and Missouri during the week.

Late garden and truck crops, especially potatoes, perked up.

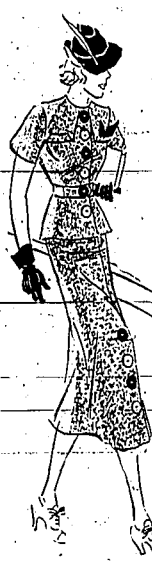

\$34,386,311 IDAHO SHARE OF RELIEF

Payroll includes 6,215 Persons on WPA Projects in Gem State

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10 (AP)—The works progress administration aid (relief) program in Idaho under the 1933 and 1935 federal emergency relief act totaled \$34,386,311 through July 31, 1936.

The WPA and August, 1936, status report, said presidential allocations to Idaho through July 31 amounted to \$3,833,084, and actual obligations, including expenditures, \$1,937,281.

Allocations to all other agencies totaled \$35,550,231. Expenditures of these agencies amounted to \$29,228,231, and their actual obligations, \$13,230,578.

Newly Organized State-Wide Association to Meet Next in Boise

A newly organized state-wide association of county commissioners and county auditors adjourned Tuesday sessions last night to convene at Boise on Tuesday, January 19, following up to submit to commissioners and auditors of all Idaho counties a record of the meeting's proceedings and suggest subjects for consideration.

Fourteen of the state's 44 counties were represented by officials in attendance at the sessions.

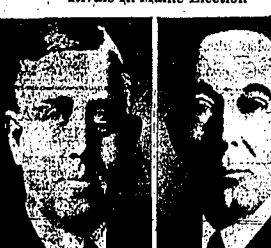

Pope Finds RFC Favorable To Continuation, Expansion of Loans

A continuance and expansion of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation program of loans for development of the mineral industries at the next session of Congress was predicted here last evening by Idaho junior-senator James P. Pope.

"I have conferred with a number of officials of the RFC," Pope said, "and all of them find extremely beneficial results from the loans to mines which have been made. An official of the mining division of the RFC visited Twin Falls today after an official inspection trip extending throughout the west. It was his opinion that development of the mineral industries resulting from credit extensions have done as much as any other measure to bring about prosperous conditions."

On Basis of Results

"I feel reasonably certain that the results obtained thus far in Idaho and other mining states will cause congress to extend the program and make even more liberal credit provisions."

"The bureau of public roads and interested members of congress are looking on a continuance of the mine-to-roads road program inaugurated during the last two years. It is almost essential to the progress of the west that the program be continued."

"Regardless of the result of the election, the RFC is giving me assistance to the mining industry that will be maintained. The increased flow of gold and silver to the treasury is being met by one of the most satisfactory policies yet adopted. It is profitable to the government, profitable to the individual engaged in the industry, and helpful to the national credit."
