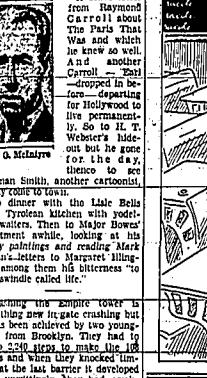

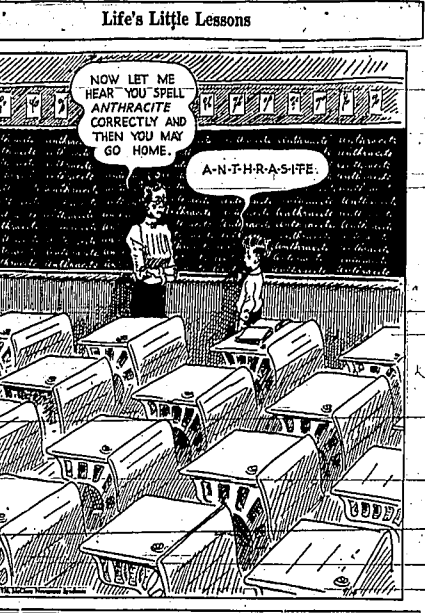

SIX DECADES BACK

By CHARLES SHIRLEY WALGAMOTT
A Series of Historical-Sketches of Early Days in Southern Idaho

Last Sunday began an incident with a friend of Mr. Walgamott, who was a young man named Gold. The teller of the story is keeping the stage station at Rock Creek.

Young Man Lucky
I think it was in the early fall of 1874 that a young man named Gold came to the Snake river and during the night made quite a winning something that, I was just a small game, with no big money in sight.

There were several trappers in camp near the Snake river, and a sprinkling of cowboys from the range; all of which contributed to the excitement of the night. The game ended considerable propositions and finally was taken over by the young man named Gold.

The morning sun was just peering over Mount Harrison when the last cards were dealt; the young man in possession of the little winnings arose, stretched his legs, and with considerable self-satisfaction he turned to the bar for a drink. Then he walked briskly to the freighers camp, which was not far from the Snake river. There he placed them in his abouider, and returned to the Snake river where he placed the money in his abouider, and expressed himself as being well pleased with the hospitality that had been extended to him, stating that he had left the railroad intending to swap through to Boise City, but he could see no use in going further.

Winning Strik Hold
He came to the station eating-room for his money. He was a jovial, likeable fellow, and it was really remarkable the amount of interest and enthusiasm that was shown in the game. It was a young man named Gold, and it seemed impossible for him to lose at the end of the game. The money would come out ahead. It finally became hard for him to get a game unless he played some other than the Snake river game, and in those days more often than times.

So later if sometimes occurred that he had a chance to play the game, he was compelled to come to me for a little stake when he was a chance to play the game. He invariably paid his board promptly, and it seemed as though he was a young man of the permanent settler. He spread his blankets in a shed back of the stage, and came to the station for his meals.

One night when the stage from Boise arrived some time between eleven o'clock, there were four or five passengers aboard; among them was a young man about twenty-seven or twenty-eight years of age who showed both by his looks and his accent that he was a Jew. Being that I was the landlady, I approached me and asked if it would be possible to get a drink at that time. I said, "Sitting in my room, travel and sorry he was worn down."

Jewish Traveler Interested
I told him that we had no liquor in the house, but if it was a case of need, I could open up a little. He declared that if I could do that I would be making a good business of it. He then followed me to the store, unlocked the door, and passing through the door, he entered the room. He threw up his hands and said, "Mine Gott, you play cards here!"

I told him that sometimes the boys came and played a little. He said, "In the middle of the table, he required what it was for. I told him that in still, pocket, a chip was dropped in the box for each player, which went to the house as a percentage."

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However, would be impossible. The Jew said, "I will take my own life so to do it, that she can't help blaming herself as the cause of my death, but know that she is going to die. I hope you or someone will teach me to play the game, for one card is a matter of life and death."

Wants to Learn Skill
We walked to the station. Everything was dark, and I put my Jew's light to bed. Then I thought that he had better go and see how the swapper was resting. When I reached the shed I called to him, "Are you asleep?" He replied that he was not, and I told him about the Jew, his roll of bills, and his intention to kill himself in Salt Lake City, and I told Swampy of the Jew's desire to learn his little game.

Swampy replied that he would be over in the morning and asked to see him in a minute, and I went to bed. The next morning the Jew followed me to show for an early breakfast, but Swampy was on hand, and after the meal he went to the store with me. I gave him a card, and he put it in his pocket, and some thirty minutes later when the Jew came to the store, he had a good night's rest, and an appetizing breakfast. And that he was one round to play cards with him and teach him the new game.

I told him that I seldom played, but that the young man at the table was an inveterate player and that he would be a good teacher. **Game Arranged**
So a little game was arranged, and to make it more interesting they decided to play for money. I brought the check-try and cards to the table and Swampy carefully threw the fifty-dollar addition on the table and asked for twenty dollars worth of checks. The Jew was a little slow in pulling up, but finally took a twenty from his roll and was paid in checks. Swampy started slowly, taking a great deal of time in instructing the Jew, who handed the cards accordingly.

Swampy kept asking more and more checks to his side, and he became necessary, the Jew brought more checks and placed a twenty dollar bill on the table. The swapper was to become a player in ten minutes and the Jew was dealing when I noticed that there was quite a number of cards in his hand. It was just before the last draw; Swampy had bet and finally the Jew put the money. The Jew said, "The Jew and I will Swampy bet." The Jew looked, then called him, and asked to the full amount of Swampy's check.

Swampy called, and the cards were spread on the table; the Jew and Swampy.

Reads Either Side
Swampy looked kind of wistfully at me for more money, but the Jew asked in the clips and money and

roll shoes, and from colorwood trees found along the streams we made extra rakes. As spring approached we began breaking young stock to take the place of those worn out. This required a good number of animals as we were obliged of twenty-five or forty acres to the other end.

The alert was considered old enough to break when he was coming four years old, and was generally good for four or five seasons. When he was young or soon learned to jump against the yoke, and in three or four days was given the service of the older one.

Boy Given Team
I look great variety in this work and became very handy in making and getting on ox shoes, and by seeing had become so proficient in the handling of oxen that I was given a team on the road. Late Rose, The Bull-whacker
Late in the fall, a bullwhacker, a raw waterer, schoolboy in the variety of hard knocks; a student and graduate of the thoroughness; and he had become so proficient in the handling of oxen that I was given a team on the road.

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to work. He is even better in muddy roads than the mule or horse, and is not subject to many ailments. He can't stand the heat like the horse or mule, and his work must be finished before the heat of the day.

"Oxen require very little night feeding, as they become very busy on grass until their pastures are full and then lie down and chew their cud. At daylight or a little before they are usually found near their headman.

"Our outfit consisted of three drivers and a swapper whose duty it was to cook. Each ox had his particular place in the team and was known by the individual name, and was usually so obedient on account of some characteristic peculiarity, size, action, and so on. I have known many hundred oxen, or bulls as they were usually called in those days, to be named Brigham in honor of Brigham Young, the Big Chief. We had three Oxen in our outfit, designated as Big Brigham, Little Brigham, and the Oxen who was the best of the Oxen in the outfit, and was usually so obedient on account of some characteristic peculiarity, size, action, and so on.

"We were able to put these teams to work in all one hundred and twenty head, by the yoke and by the harness and start three-horse teams. Our road crossed a junction with the Oregon Trail at Bricker's stop. The ox is a very faithful animal

on Rock creek one hundred miles northwest from Kelton, and which was a great place for them to congregate and feed and dry salmon.

"It was late in the day, and we pulled into camp some distance from the Indians when we could see several large salmon, reporting that there were ten or twelve Indians in all and that they had large quantities of salmon on the rocks drying, and that the salmon were jumping in great numbers."

Cold-Blooded Massacre
"Nothing unusual happened until just about dark when two white men on foot, whom I took to be miners, came into our camp. They made themselves agreeable, and a little later two men on horseback were seen at our camp fire. The men held a secret conversation with each other, then confided with my driver's confidence. I could not understand at that time, did not take into their confidence."

"Soon several other horsemen arrived; then the swapper told me that there were ten or twelve Indians in all and that they had large quantities of salmon on the rocks drying, and that the salmon were jumping in great numbers."

"Note: The sad thing about this story is that since our meeting, and since late Rose saw me this story he passed away. We buried him in the peaceful Ingleside cemetery, C. B. W."

before daylight, when I was awakened by the report of gunfire in the direction of the Indian camp. I followed the instructions of the swapper and tried not to say any attention to it. Finally all was quiet again except for the cutting of sagebrush as the swapper was preparing our breakfast.

"I kicked out of my blankets, and as I prepared to eat breakfast I inquiringly peered into the faces of my companions, finding however, no sign as to the happenings of the night. Instead I detected a glance that forbade inquisitiveness, and I could see that the Indian camp was gone."

"It was two or three days later that the swapper told me that the entire Indian camp had been destroyed and all evidence thrown into the river."

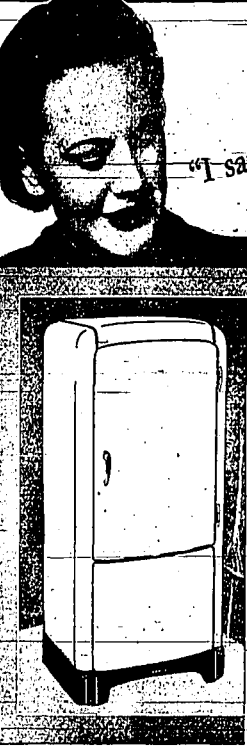
