FIRST FROST HITS LATE SPUDS, BEANS

Gardens Withier When Mercury in Twin Falls Drops to 24

The season's first killing frost struck the Twin Falls country Tuesday night when temperature in Twin Falls dropped to 24 degrees above zero, withering gardens and bringing loss of late farm crops.

Estimates were made yesterday that late bean crops had been damaged around 10 per cent by the freeze. In the wake of the frost, too, considerable discoloration of late crop beans was expected necessitating picking.

Bean crops already harvested in the Twin Falls district this season have yielded from 40 to 50 bushels per acre.

Potato crops that were growing when the frost struck Monday night will make no additional tonnage, growers said.

Maturing of the apple crop will be hastened by the freeze.

Flu Epidemic's Defeat Promised In New Vaccine

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Sept. 15 (AP)—The end of the great "flu" epidemic has forecast today as the Harvard tercentenary through a new influenza vaccine which was announced to be quickly and independently developed in two of the world's foremost medical institutions, one American, the other English.

The vaccine is made from living virus, the sub-microscopic "agent" which causes flu epidemics. At Rockefeller Institute, New York City, the vaccine is already in human use with every evidence of effective operation.

At the national institute of medical research, Harpenden, England, the vaccine, made by a method fundamentally different from the American process, is being subjected to a series of tests on animals susceptible to human flu.

At the University of London, other flu discoveries were reported at the Harvard medical school tercentenary by William G. Smith, M. D., professor of public health administration at Harvard.

The flu vaccine at Rockefeller Institute is a culture of virus taken directly from human influenza patients. Flu is believed to attack through the nose. This vaccine is injected under the skin.

It is a complete protection, Dr. Smith said, for mice, ferrets and man, which causes human flu.

Autumn Arrives

General frosts throughout southern Idaho yesterday marked the definite arrival of autumn weather. Associated Press reports said. The coldest spot on the weather map was Blackfoot, where the thermometer dropped to 22 degrees above zero, lower than any other reliable gauge recorded on a heavy frost.

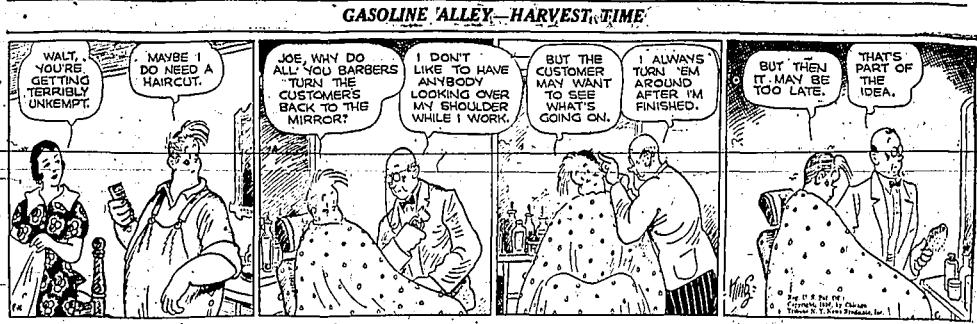

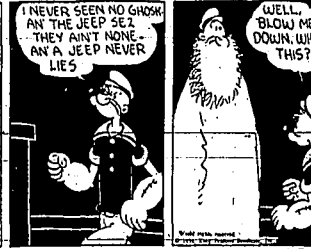

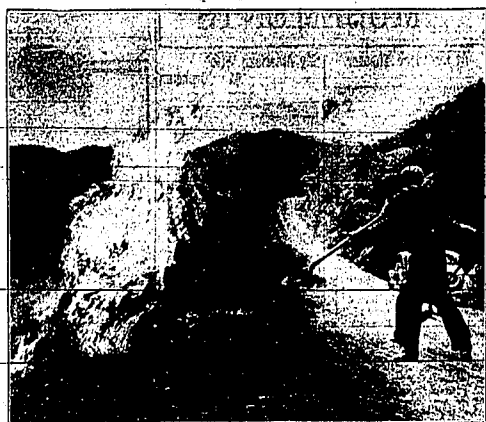

State Board Fixes 5.64 Mill Average Levy For Schools

BOISE, Sept. 14 (AP)—The Idaho State Board of Education fixed the levies for the 44 counties of the state for general school purposes at an average of 5.64 mills per county, a reduction of one mill under the 1935 levies.

Clearwater county was the only county showing an increased levy over last year. This was due to a decrease in valuation and increased school population. It was explained.

The Clearwater county levy for the coming year was set at 5.42 mills compared with 5.37 mills for last year.

An increase of \$2,000 in the cost of the minimum program on which the levies are based, and a decrease of \$100,000 in the valuation of the county necessitated the higher levy, the board said.

The general school levy for Twin Falls county this year was fixed at 5.72 mills as against 5.64 mills last year.

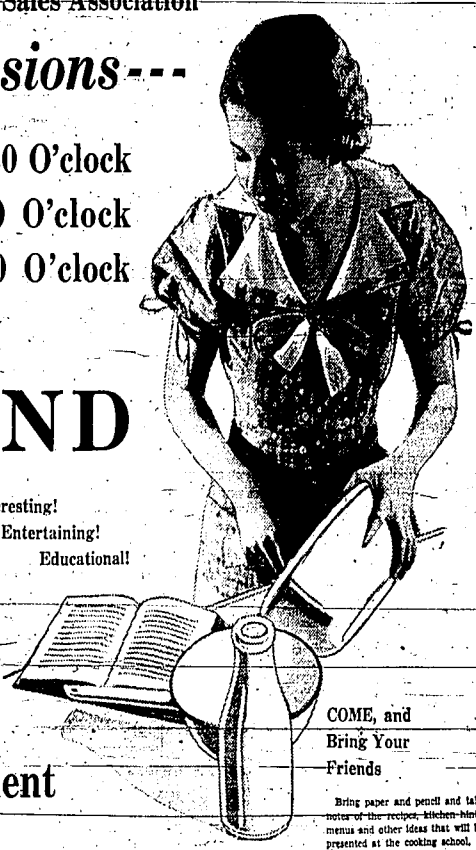

REVAMPING URGED OF WELFARE LAWS

Boise Conference Employs Attorneys to Draft Proposals

BOISE, Sept. 12 (AP)—The committee of representatives of welfare and county relief agencies throughout the state, called into session by Governor C. Don Ross, adjourned tonight without having reached a conclusion on recommendations to be drafted and presented to the coming session of the legislature.

The committee, called by the governor to review existing legislation on public welfare and old age security laws, approved the A. E. Martin and Ben Oppenheim, Boise lawyers, to draw up proposals. The committee met together for discussions when completed.

Model Programs

At today's session, Aleta Bromley of Washington, D. C., child welfare consultant for the United States department of labor, discussed "What Modern Child Welfare Programs Should Include."

Miss Bromley urged establishment of a strong central welfare committee to handle the problems of welfare agencies.

"Every county should be granted to this committee," Miss Bromley said. "The state should have a thorough survey of cases that may arise."

"Special legislation should be passed so as not to conflict with private welfare organizations for children," Dr. J. D. Dineen, director of the state public health department, discussed "The Public Health Program in Idaho" and Peter H. Cohn, director of the Idaho cooperative relief agency, talked on "The Present State Relief Agency."

State or County

One of the major questions under discussion by the group, was whether the state should finance the entire relief program, as is now being done, or ask the counties for their respective share.

It was brought out by some county officials that their counties were not able to give adequate penalties under their county's present heavy burden, however, other counties were able to give more liberally.

The majority of those in attendance favored the state to carry the entire burden of relief through some system of taxation, providing the counties be "paid" adequately for those in need they recommended for assistance.

The committee also recommended the personnel of all agencies set up in the state be trained in social welfare work.

The meeting adjourned after admonishing the two-man committee to draft a plan as simple as possible.
