ALCAZAR RECEIVES FINAL ULTIMATUM

Government Leaders Postpone Decision to Set Off Explosives

(Copyright, 1936, By The Associated Press) MADRID, Sept. 17.—The 17,000 men and children within the beleaguered Alcazar tonight were given one last ultimatum—to surrender or be blown to bits.

The mayor of Toledo said that government leaders at the last minute had then postponed their "final decision" to set off tons of dynamite in the 100-foot tunnel connecting the Alcazar with the city.

It is not yet known whether the mayor said, the fortress will be blown up "soon."

The mayor ordered the greater part of the city's population of about 200,000 to evacuate their homes early in the morning and seek refuge in the surrounding country-side or in safe sections of the city.

Throughout the day laborers and soldiers tamped down additional charges of explosives. Each charge contained more than a ton of dynamite.

Explosive cables were connected with the explosive cables, and ran back to the office of the mayor, Dr. Alcazar.

Although 3,200 striking lettuce workers kept off the streets in Toledo, the mayor said, the strikers were "planning something" and "preparing for it."

Unofficial reports said the army's army of special deputies had reached the 1,500 mark and still were being enlarged by men recruited from nearby farms as well as from the city itself.

Salinas Force Raids Strike Headquarters

No-Weapons Found By Searchers; Sheriff Enlists 1,500 Special Deputies

(By The Associated Press) SALINAS, Calif., Sept. 17.—Sheriff Carl Abbott led a group of his recruited deputies in a raid on headquarters of the striking Fruit and Vegetable Workers' union tonight.

The raid, which came after violence in the bitter 13-day strike had abated, met with no resistance from union members.

Sheriff Abbott and one of his regular deputies said they searched the headquarters for weapons but found none.

The raid was made on a search warrant sworn to by a William Regsdale, who was not otherwise identified, before Justice of the Peace Harry King.

For the first time since the walk-out started 13 days ago non-union lettuce packers worked unobscured in the Salinas lettuce fields under guard but there was no attempt to stop it.

The Salinas building and allied trader councils met to discuss the situation. Labor leaders presented a general strike here in support of the vegetable workers was unlikely.

The Express said that "millions of American citizens are grateful for the help given the Maine campaign preceding this week's election."

Simultaneously, a letter to Ely, former Governor of Massachusetts, "of the expressions of many Maine people who met during my visit in that state last week strengthened my realization of your great help in the campaign there."

The Republican presidential nominee dispatched the letters as young Republican leaders throughout the nation converged on Toledo to get acquainted personally with the standard bearer and hear him discuss the "American issue."
