Heads of Labor Organization At Salinas, Fearing Attack During Meeting, Appeal to Attorney General

By The Associated Press. SALINAS, Calif., Sept. 18.—Union leaders, fearing they had been informed that striking lettuce workers were to be attacked during a meeting tonight, appealed to State Attorney General U. S. Webb late today for "protection."

As a result of the appeal Deputy Attorney General Frank J. Moran announced that Sheriff Carl Abbott here is being asked to furnish protection for the union leaders.

Reports of the attack plan came to light amid the circulation of unfounded reports that steps were being taken for negotiating a peaceful settlement of the strike.

The organizer said information represented to him that the attack was to be "bloodless" in the nature of a "protection" of the union leaders.

Terrific Blast Deals Death In Fortress

More Than Half Of 1,700 Persons Within Alcazar Believed Killed Or Maimed

(Copyright, 1934, By The Associated Press) TOLEDO, Spain, Sept. 18.—More than half of the 1,700 men, women and children within the Alcazar fortress were believed tonight to have been blown to bits or maimed by the explosion of two mines, each lapped with a ton of TNT.

Two similar mines tonight were set to explode at the wish of the government leaders who postponed further action to occupy the fortress and offer other chances to evacuate the women and children within.

The terrific blast of the two mines set off today tipped the whole south-west tower from its base, the massive stone blocks of the fortress plunging into heaps.

Officials said the Toledo cathedral was not damaged by the explosion but the fortress, except for a few broken windows.

Nominee Declares 'Present Administration Apparently Believes That There Is No Hope for Country'

WAR HERO DIES

Major General McAlexander, 'Rock of the Marne', Taken Suddenly

POSTLAND, Ore., Sept. 17 (AP)—Major General William H. Alexander, 47, who became known as the "rock of the Marne" for his heroic stand during the World war, died unexpectedly at his apartment home here today.

The retired officer became a military hero in July, 1918, when his regiment, the 38th United States Infantry, was called to fight in the battle during the second battle of the Marne.

His performance was described by Major General Hunter Liggett as "a heroic deed which only a few other men have ever done. I am certain that a colonel, was awarded the distinguished service cross and other military honors.

He was born on a farm near Dundas, Kentucky, August 10, 1864. In 1887 he was graduated from West Point and served in the States Army in the United States. He participated in many battles of the war from August, 1917, to the end and was decorated.

After retiring from the army he unsuccessfully sought the Republican nomination for governor of Oregon in 1934.

He was married twice, his second wife being Mrs. H. H. McAlexander of Washington, D. C. survivor.

# Jelly Making Time for Hobbying Husband

When husbands turn housewives something is seriously wrong. On second thought, maybe he has just found an interesting pastime simple enough for a babe to understand. That was the case of a middle western man who surprised his vacationing wife by creating grape jelly and jam in her absence. As the secret of his success he ascribes these clear cut methods of jelling with fruit pectin.

**Grape Jelly**  
4½ cups (9½ pounds) prepared fruit  
7 cups (14 pounds) sugar  
½ bottle fruit pectin

To prepare jelly, stem about 3 pounds fully ripe grapes and crush thoroughly. Add ½ cup water, bring to a boil, cover and simmer 10 minutes. Place fruit in a colander to drain and squeeze out juice. (Concord grapes give best color and flavor. If you use Staggas or other light colored grapes use only 3½ cups grape juice and add juice of 2 medium lemons.)

Measure sugar and juice into large kettle, mix well, and bring to a full rolling boil over hottest fire. Stir constantly while boiling. Boil hard 15 minutes. Remove seeds by straining. Chop grapes and add to pulp. Concord grapes give best color and flavor. If you use Staggas or other light colored grapes use only 3½ cups grape juice and add juice of 2 medium lemons.)

# DESSERTS TO TEMPT AUTUMN APPETITE

If you have been serving the same dessert for a long time, you are doubtless tired of preparing them and your family just a bit bored with the "same old, thing." Why not branch out a bit and try some of these desserts? They are varied and among them you should find several to fit your mood and purse.

**Raisin Sherbats**  
3 cups sifted flour  
3 cups water  
½ cup raisins  
2 tbs. cornstarch  
1 tbs. lemon juice  
1 tbs. butter

Boil raisins, water and lemon rind 30 minutes. Mix sugar with cornstarch, sprinkle with a little raisin juice and add to raisins. Stir constantly until the mixture boils and is clear, about a minute. Add lemon juice, butter and keep hot. Serve on hot rich baking powder biscuits with a garnish of whipped cream.

**Banana, Caramel Pie**  
1½ can sweetened condensed milk  
1 can evaporated milk  
1 cup water  
1 cup brown sugar  
1 cup whipping cream  
Baked 8-inch pie shell

To caramelize sweetened condensed milk place unopened can in boiling water and keep at boiling point for 3 hours. Be sure to keep the can well covered with water. Blend the caramelized milk with hot water, heating until smooth. Cool. Pour into baked pie shell. One hour before serving slice bananas on top and cranked and cover with whipped cream with a few sprigs of water chest.

**California Sandwiches**  
One cup cucumber, chopped, one cup tomato, chopped, two tablespoons mayonnaise.

Combine ingredients and let drain for few minutes. Spread on thin, buttered slices of white bread. Cut in desired shapes. Makes one cup filling. This unusual combination of "all opportunity" distinctive sandwich for parties.

**Chese Tea Sandwiches**  
Two packages cream cheese, one-half can cucumber, chopped, two tablespoons mayonnaise.

Combine ingredients and mix thoroughly. Spread on thin white bread with wheat bread. Cut in shapes. Makes one and one-fourth cups filling.

**Apple Dumplings**  
Roll out rich pastry to ¼ inch thickness and cut in 4-inch squares. Place dried apples which have been cooked until soft but not mushy in the center. Sprinkle with brown sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg. Moisten the edges of the pastry with water and fold the four corners together on top of the fruit. Press edge firmly well. Add sifted flour. Chill. Roll out on slightly floured board to ¼ inch thickness, cut with round cutter. Put small amount of raisin butter with lines of fat. Bake on greased baking sheet in moderate oven 10 minutes.

**Raisin Filling**  
Mix ½ cup chopped raisins, 1 cup brown sugar, few grains salt, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 tablespoon lemon juice and 2 tablespoons water. Cook slowly, stirring constantly until thick and cool. If desired chopped nuts may be added.

**Malaise Walnut Squares**  
2 tablespoons butter  
1 cup granulated sugar  
1 cup chopped walnut meats

Melt butter in saucepan and add molasses and sugar. Stir until mixture starts to boil and again as it begins to thicken. Boil off mixture forms a soft ball in cold water. Add walnut meats, spriged lightly with salt. Pour into jammed well-buttered

# HOT CREAM SOUP FOR SCHOOLBOY LUNCHEONS

**Orange-Custard**  
3 tablespoons cornstarch  
1 cup sugar  
1½ cups evaporated milk

Cook for 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat and stir into the beaten egg. Return to double boiler and cook for minutes longer. Pour into well-buttered cups.

**Orange Fruit Sherbet**  
1 cup orange juice  
½ cup lemon juice  
½ cup sugar  
1 quart milk  
1 cup apricot pulp

Mix and freeze. If mixture curdles will freeze smooth again.

**Vegetable Soup**  
2 cup bone  
1 cup diced celery  
1 cup shredded carrots  
1 cup green peas  
½ teaspoon pepper  
1 cup tomatoes  
1½ cup shredded pimiento pepper  
2 cups water  
1 tablespoon salt

2½ tablespoons thyme  
Vermicelli or macaroni rings.  
Prepare vegetables. Place in kettle with soup bones and add seasoning and water and cover. Cook for 8 to 10 hours; may be cooked over night. The last hour remove soup bone, add vermicelli and crackers.

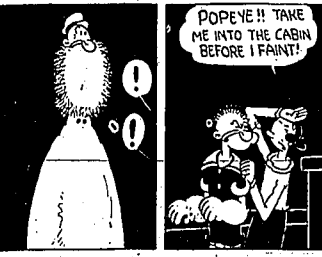

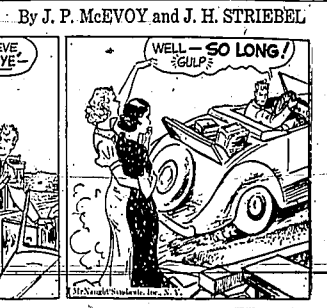

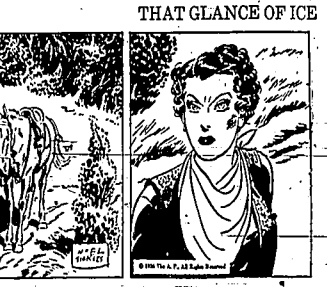

**BUSINESS FACES NEW COMPETITION**

**Boise Speaker Traces Spread of Federal Government Activities**

Boise speaker and small in practically every line of business will soon be faced with a new style of competition which will be based on stand up against it. The present trend in the direction of "consent" operations continues. This peculiar change in local business is the subject of an address by R. C. Harland, secretary of the Boise Chamber of Commerce, during the Twin Falls chamber directors and members held at the Park hotel.

According to Mr. Harland, the movement is being sponsored and encouraged by the government under the leadership of Under Secretary of Agriculture, Harold Ickes. The money is available for the establishment of interests at almost possible rates of interest. Much literature is being distributed by the government and a majority of the churches of the country are actively back of the movement.

The speaker made it clear that the movement is not directed to the cooperative movement as applied to the distribution of farm products but is aimed only at the principle involved in government financed retail outlets designed to compete with their respective credit institutions. He referred to the movement as Socialistic in principle and directed in line with similar trends in Italy, Germany, France and Russia. Such institutions would be largely exempt from farm products but would be well as gaining the advantage of cheap operating capital.

Mr. Harland referred at length to the parties store operation which has been in operation for nearly a hundred years in England and now does an appreciable percentage of the retail business of England in many lines. One cooperative chain there is said to own many thousands of acres of land in Canada upon which it raises much of the grain and other produce of the country. This movement is being moved up to a few years ago had been tried in this country only upon a very small scale. It is being grown by leaps and bounds as a result of government participation in the enterprise.

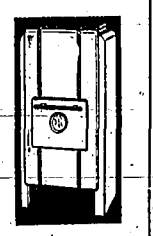
