Eight States Lashed By Tropical Hurricane Now Sweeping To Sea

Atlantic Coast Surveys Damage In Wake Of Savage Storm; Eight Known Dead, 15 Missing

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—A hurricane, swirling northeastward from the Atlantic off Massachusetts tonight, bound for oblivion at sea. The coastal states had felt its fury, but only eight persons were known to be dead. Fifteen were missing. There was heavy property damage along the shores of North Carolina, where the low pressure area struck Thursday night, Virginia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York, Connecticut and Massachusetts.

A high pressure area was moving away from the American coast. Small boats stranded by the storm were rescued by the coast guard. The small loss of life was attributed to the work of the government weather bureau, which since September 10 had watched the progress of the hurricane from the Atlantic in the West Indies. It was one of the best publicized hurricanes in history with everything along its path well-warned.

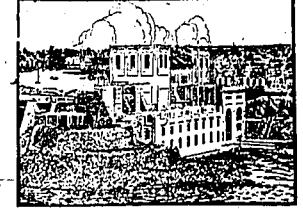

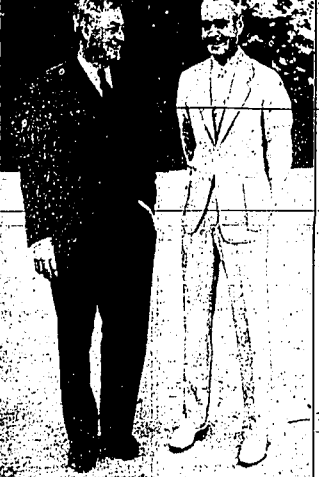

## NEW TAX LEVIES FIXED FOR COUNTY

### Commissioners Trim Nickel Off Current Expense For Poor Fund

Twin Falls county commissioners have fixed a tax for the year amounting to \$23,500 for the county's property valuation to meet the state 1936 bill for education.

Reflecting a gradual decline in the state's tax against property following the imposition of a number of new laws, the levy which the commissioners fixed yesterday for fiscal 1936 is the lowest in the history of the state's property tax.

The general school levy was reduced by the state board of education from 75 cents last year to 73 cents this year.

In addition to fixing of state and county tax levies, commissioners approved levies certified by cities, school and highway districts within the county.

## GROWERS PROTEST NEW POTATO GRADE

### Producers Balk at Regulation for Benefit of Traders

Idaho Vegetable Producers, Incorporated, has registered a vigorous protest against a new potato grade to be established by the U. S. Department of Agriculture promulgated last September for the futures trading on commodity exchange, carrying a decreasing premium over the existing growers' organization, stated here last evening.

The new grade, DeLong said, will cost Idaho growers "hundreds of dollars a year" because of the immediate reaction will be the incidence of every purchase of Idaho potatoes that will be supplied with the new U. S. Extra No. 1. He pointed out that the secretary of agriculture has promised "to get together three different kinds of U. S. No. 1 potato grades."

The growers' organization has appealed to Senators Borah and Puffer and to P. Lee Johnson, state commissioner of agriculture, to contact the secretary of agriculture and "see that these grades are not back where they were and this U. S. Extra No. 1 eliminated."

DeLong made public the letters addressed to the growers' organization to Senators Borah and Puffer and also to O. W. Kitchen, chief of the federal department of agriculture bureau of agricultural economics.

## Favor to Growers

The letter to Kitchen said: "We are at a loss to understand why any bureau can take upon itself the power of change of the grade which affects at least 30,000 cars of potatoes in the state of Idaho without consulting those who produce them or even consulting the traders who use them. We have always been willing and ready to meet those requirements which our trade—those who actually use our potatoes—have desired, but we must ask you and trust that this new grade immediately be abolished and the Board of Trade in Chicago notified that if they do not want to accept the present U. S. No. 1 extra-out-of-Idaho, they will do us a favor by not trading in potatoes."

The new grade was termed by the growers' secretary as nothing short of a U. S. Fancy which should command a premium but which "he" refused to buy on the basis of the premium, with the result that it is not used.

The new grade provides that 60 percent of the bag shall be 10-cents or larger.

## MEETING OF COUNTY'S TEACHERS ANNOUNCED

Miss Doris Swindle, principal, is president of the association; Mrs. Lela Leichter of Elmwood is vice president; and Miss Faye Brecken of Poplar Hill is secretary.

## County's War On Weeds Wins Expert Praise

"The most weed-minded district in the whole country" is Twin Falls county, a word was specialties. Harold W. Juchetz, of San Francisco, told the Twin Falls county committee and J. P. Hunt, director of the county noxious weed bureau, one day last week.

Juchetz, for several years, was an expert on weeds and the inventor of a tractor-driven device for application of carbon bisulfide in weeding fields. Juchetz now is director of sales for a San Francisco concern that supplies thousands of dollars worth of the chemical.

Hunt recalled that Twin Falls county has been systematically fighting noxious weeds for nearly 20 years. "No district gives more attention than Twin Falls county to the control of noxious weeds, and none fights weeds more effectively," he said.
