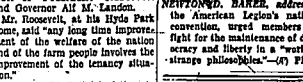

ROBBING THE HOME GROWER
Local growers of clover seed had a very good chance up to two or three weeks ago of receiving twenty-five cents or more per pound for their product.

Imports of foreign green seed are at an unusually low level. Large quantities of clover seed have been contracted abroad for Atlantic coast delivery between now and the first of the year, and this seed can be delivered in this country at sixteen cents a pound or less.

The incident serves to furnish a splendid example of the effects upon American agriculture of the policies inaugurated by Secretary of Agriculture Wallace. Apparently the Secretary believes that to import commodities of all descriptions is better thing for the country than to produce them here.

It is a question of whether the production of these same commodities by the farmers of the United States. So far from preserving the home market for home products, American production has been restricted, and the money that might otherwise have gone to the American farmer has been paid to the farmer of foreign lands.

Clover seed is not a food product but it furnished a case in point. Here are a few more: Less than half a million bushels of corn were imported in nineteen hundred thirty-two; over forty-three million bushels were brought in from abroad last year. In the next five years, one year, a little over a million pounds of butter was brought in, whereas in nineteen hundred thirty-five over twenty-two million pounds were imported. Over five times as much dried milk was imported in 1932 as in nineteen hundred thirty-two, and over nine times as much fresh beef. In addition, three times as much canned beef from abroad appeared upon the tables of American consumers as was brought in three years previously.

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Growers, Merchants Launch Campaign for Twin Falls Cannery

Utah Operator Gives Assurance Of Willing- ness To Match Local Grant Of Site With Investment In Plant

A movement to establish in Twin Falls a cannery plant to provide a broader cash market for this district's fruit and vegetable crops was launched by a group of Twin Falls merchants and producers at a meeting with William Varney, owner of the Varney Canning company of Roy, Utah, in the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce room Sunday evening. Assured by the Utah cannery owner that he would match with an initial investment of \$15,000 to \$20,000 for equipment, a reasonable grant in this heavily wooded area by local interested persons, the group took two definite steps toward securing the proposed plant.

Authorized appointment by Captain H. E. Krenge, president of the chamber, was made for the holding of opinions on suitable sites and buildings. It is expected the Utah cannery will be located on the site of the old Twin Falls cannery site, a delegation of Twin Falls merchants and growers are organized for a one-day trip to the Varney cannery plant at Roy, near Ogden, to witness the plant in operation and to interview the manager, Fred G. W. Smith, who has been in charge of the plant and vegetable crops under contract with the cannery. The arrangements provide for early Thursday morning, returning in the evening of the same day.

Under consideration of the group at Sunday evening's meeting were two possible sites for the proposed Twin Falls plant. Both are situated in the western district, one on a high stand on both sides, and it was indicated, either site could be purchased to advantage at the present time. Spokesmen for growers at the meeting included George W. Smith, executive secretary of Idaho Vegetable Producers, Incorporated, and Ralph C. Taylor, fruit grower and manager of the Idaho Fruit and Vegetable Producers Association. It was reported by the Idaho Fruit and Vegetable Producers Association that it was early Mr. Varney's idea that it would be worth while to make plans for establishing the proposed Twin Falls plant with view to making it to 20 carloads of produce which was indicated would be available this season, but he seemed favorably disposed toward the suggestion that equipment be located here as soon as possible for winter crops and beans during the coming year. He declared that the Utah plant now is carrying 12,000 bushels of beans, freight and other charges back to Idaho considerable quantities of these beans after they are canned.

George Conners, former Senator J. H. Sawyer, Twin Falls fruit grower, told of a recent visit which he made with Ralph C. Taylor of Twin Falls and George Albert of Eden, to the Varney plant at Roy. He told of seeing tomatoes being canned there at the rate of 125 cases per minute at the Varney plant, which he described as one that has "every indication of a public, successful business." He said the plant had an average annual output of 10,000 cases of canned fruits and vegetables, of which 3,000 to 3,500 cases are of tomatoes. Since 1922 he said the Varney company has spent \$40,000 for equipment for the plant at Roy. He said that the plant has several institutions to establish plants in Washington and Oregon districts where crop production has been developed in a big industry much recent years.

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SHOOTING SUSPECT ENTERS NEW PLEA

Verlin C. Clark Admits Guilt Of Assault With Deadly Weapon

Accused of shooting a Twin Falls woman the night of Sat. June 12, Verlin Chester Clark, 37, of Clark operated by Judge Adam B. Barclay in the district court here yesterday to a charge of assault with intent to murder, and to enter a plea of guilty to a charge of assault with a deadly weapon.

Clark was accused of shooting Mrs. Nell Gaidler, who with her husband, C. H. Van Gaidler, operates the City Park grocery on Sheehans street north, when also appeared at the grocery behind the steering wheel of their truck which had stalled on a country road and was being pushed by another truck.

Plea Acceptable

Prosecuting attorney indicated yesterday that Clark's guilty plea would be accepted, and the case was continued to next Friday, when it was expected, sentence will be pronounced.

The penalty for assault with a deadly weapon is imprisonment for not to exceed two years or fine not to exceed \$500 or both.

The penalty for assault with intent to murder is imprisonment for not less than one, nor more than 14 years.

Clark was accompanied by his attorney, W. L. Dunn of Twin Falls, when he entered his plea in the district court yesterday.

Driver Acquitted

During the day, which was the first for the jury called for the present court term, a six-man jury decided after brief deliberations that Luther Jones was not guilty of alleged operation of a motor vehicle last June 27 after revocation of his license.

Evidence indicated that the license was issued and revoked after Jones had been convicted of drunk driving at Buhl last March. The prosecution introduced testimony of V. S. Barron, Buhl police chief, and placed in evidence copies of state law enforcement department records. No evidence was offered in Jones' behalf, but twice during the hearing his attorney, E. L. Rayborn, urged a motion for a directed verdict in his favor.

Jury List Details

The original list of 30 jurors was drawn and during the day to 11, a number being excused on account of persons of farm work, and before adjournment Judge Barclay ordered drawing of 15 additional jurors.

Set for trial today was the case of Verlin Chester Clark, charged with a larceny charge of theft of a car, and J. A. Barnes of Twin Falls has been appointed by the court to present his defense.
