U.S. Blocks Russian Move To Upset Money Stability Landon Terms New Deal Social Security Act 'Cruel Hoax On Worker'

Republican Declares For Old Age Pension, Aid To Job Insurance

Present Measure Branded 'Glaring Example Of Bungling And Waste In Attempt To Fulfill Benevolent Purpose'

(By The Associated Press) MILWAUKEE, Sept. 26.—Contending the new deal has endangered "the whole cause of social security," Governor Alf M. Landon tonight pledged support to a "pay-as-you-go" old age pension system as a matter of social justice.

The administration security program, the Republican presidential nominee told a cheering audience, was a "cruel hoax" and "a fraud on the working man."

"In my judgment—and I have examined it carefully," the Kansas governor said, "this law is unjust, unwarranted, stupidly drafted and wastefully financed."

He stood on a stage facing a throng that overflowed the 6,000 seats of the city auditorium into the nearby halls with loud speaking arrangements. A two-minute standing ovation from the crowd greeted his arrival after a drive from his hotel through the rain.

Republican leader Reading his speech on economic security slowly and with emphasis into microphones, he said the Republican party would enact a pension plan for the aged which would provide for every American citizen over 65 the supplementary payment necessary to give a minimum income sufficient to protect him or her from want.

Landon constantly used his right hand, either with clenched fist or with fingers extended, for a gesture of emphasis. Several times murmurs of comment ran through the crowd as the governor hit his words to stress phrases.

"Declaring 'do dreams do not pay pensions' he said the present law was "every probability" that cash paid in on compulsory old age insurance would be used to pay for old age pension for the aged.

"I believe that as a nation, we can afford old age pensions that in a highly industrialized country are necessary. I believe in them as a matter of social justice."

"The present law," he said, "is a plain example of the bungling and wastefulness of the present administration's attempts to fulfill its benevolent purpose. It endangers the welfare of the aged in this country, in my own judgment, by this law in unjust, unwarranted, stupidly drafted and wastefully financed."

Japanese Destroyers Steam To Shanghai

Apprehension Heightened Over Possible Recurrence Of Incidents In City

(By The Associated Press) SHANGHAI, Sept. 27 (Sunday)—Eight Japanese destroyers, loaded with warships, neared anxious Shanghai today.

In official circles apprehension was heightened over possible recurrence of Japanese-Chinese "incidents" in the international settlement.

The Japanese naval authorities in Shanghai abbreviated their marine patrols in foreign sections of the city, while their counterparts in the international area demanded "protection."

In reply, the Japanese naval leaders pressed for more Japanese police force—a long debated issue in Shanghai.

Japanese consular officials in Shanghai earlier renewed their protest that the killing of a Japanese and the wounding of his wife, Chinese had demonstrated that the Chinese authorities were incapable of protecting foreigners' lives.

To this the Chinese replied that "every possible" protection was being afforded by them and by the guardians of the international settlement.

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PORTUGUESE RADIO REPORTS FASCIST FORCES IN TOLEDO

Spanish City Attacked by Four Columns of Rebel Soldiers; War's First Naval Battle Imminent

(By The Associated Press) LISBON, Portugal, Sept. 27 (Sunday)—The Portuguese Radio club announced early today it had received information a Spanish fascist column had entered Toledo and rescued the insurgents and their families in the Old Alcázar fortress.

"(The Alcázar defenders had stood up against government bombardment and assaults for twenty weeks. Even dynamite blasts had not forced them out, but their numbers originally estimated at 1,700, was reported reduced to about 600.)"

The Radio club said it learned Toledo, which is about 45 miles south of Madrid, had been attacked by four columns marching along the roads from Madrid, Torroja and Moregon and that south of the Tago river.

The first naval battle of the Spanish civil war appeared imminent Sunday as naval authorities in bomb-battered Bilbao reported five government warships were steaming at full speed toward the city, blocked by fascist vessels along Spain's northern Bay of Biscay shore.

"Meanwhile the insurgent radio station at Corunna claimed fascist forces had succeeded in relieving the beleaguered Alcázar after capturing Toledo. This report conflicted, however, with a government announcement in Madrid that rebel forces were being slowly but surely forced back from Toledo."

Correspondents from the Toledo front said trained fascist legionnaires prepared to launch a dawn attack Sunday on government-held Toledo.

"Buena Vista reports said an assault on the Alcázar," was standing by for the fall of Spanish President Manuel Azana if he should decide to flee.

Stock Market Meets Devaluation Calmly

NEW YORK, Sept. 26 (AP)—In dramatic contrast with the frenzied and fearful selling which greeted the first British step toward devaluation five years ago, the New York stock exchange today greeted France's decision to pursue the same course, calmly and cheerfully with prices advancing.

While the decision of the Bank of England to suspend gold payments five years ago represented one of the first of a series of major operations upon an ailing world economy, economists explained that readjusting the value of the franc represented a relatively minor operation upon a patient that has been improving for several years.

Trading was active in the New York stock exchange, with 900,700 shares traded, the largest for a Saturday since April 4. Price advances of \$1 to \$3 were numerous. What the new level of the franc will be remained undecided. Premier Blum's plan calls for a devaluation of between about a quarter and a third. In unofficial dealings in New York the French unit was said to have traded between 5 and 5.12 cents, compared with Friday's close of 6.25, its recent parity 6.6 cents, and a parity of 39 cents before the United States devalued.

Major Clashes Open College Grid Season Unprecedented 136 Time Games Feature Start Of Big Football Campaign

(Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, Sept. 26 (AP)—College football's unchecked Gophers and Ducks' Southern conference champions, the nation's college football teams formally opened the 1936 campaign today with an unprecedented array of big time games and the usual scattering of surprise finishes.

Minnesota, undefeated through last fall season, and rated by many experts the country's greatest team last season, turned back Washington's formidable Huskies, Pacific Coast conference favorite, in a 10-0 victory in a conventional battle fought at Seattle before a capacity crowd of 37,000.

While the "Durham-Duke" played Oglethorpe's Red Raiders by a wide margin although Eric Tipton's touchdown plunge at the end of the first quarter in the game at Connecticut State 27-0, and Lafayette was beaten by Muhlenberg, 19-0, in a former year in crushing Oregon State, 35-7.

The increasing power of Idaho's Red Vanders was demonstrated at the first winter football game, topped by Virginia Poly's veteran team, 20-0 North Carolina beat Wake Forest, 14-7, and Virginia Military outpointed South Carolina, 21-7, Oregon had a hard fight before subduing Mercer, 15-0, and Tennessee, 17-0.

Also on the program, William Leake, Coughlin-backed Union Party candidate for the presidency, today delivered President Roosevelt's "I am an American" speech at the University of Washington, 47-0 as Cecil Bledsoe scored four touchdowns.

"In simplest possible terms," said the newspaper, which was founded by Joseph Pulitzer, "the overhauling of the constitution is a matter of the American tradition and past in the face of the plain fact of the constitution as it now stands, a government with vast and centralized authority over the economic life of the nation."

"On that issue the Post-Dispatch believes as it does in an economy of free enterprise, under the political forms of our federal system, the government cannot support Mr. Roosevelt for reelection to the presidency."

"While the names of the candidates of Mr. Roosevelt, we give him full credit for the courage he displayed in making the speech, we do not believe that the full credit for his mission as leader to improve lot of common."

"In advocating the defeat of Mr. Roosevelt, the Post-Dispatch does not put its eyes on the prize of the presidency. It is a matter of principle, not of expediency."

FIRE SPREAD IN CALIFORNIA FOREST

Timber and Brush Blazes Destroy Property and Menace Lives

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 26 (AP)—Forest and brush fires cast a black pall of destruction over Northern California today as the state's crushed emergency forces to battle the spreading flames in a dozen hot spots.

# SIX DECADES BACK

A Series of Historical Sketches of Early Days in Southern Idaho

### WILD HERDS OF THE GOOSE CREEK MOUNTAINS

The origin of the wild horse in this region is not definitely known, but from all known indications we take it that it had its origin in the domestic horse gene, wild and tame, which were introduced by the Spaniards from the Indian camp. The Indians were known to have had horses as early as 1700, and possibly before.

During the early Oregon trail era all were content to keep them as pack animals for their freedom, because they were out of condition, too poor to travel, or temporarily lame, rendering them unable to keep pace with the train. Some conditions existed on the California route, but the Indians as the hunters of the wild horse lay between the Oregon Trail and the California route, and it was they that both of these famous routes contributed horses to the beginning of the horse industry in this country. They made their home winter and summer on the high peaks of the Coast Range Mountains. They were employed on the rank luxurious feed during the summer, and during the deep snow season exposed ground, and they were driven away from the snow by their winter. Their horse instincts, which were great, and which enabled them by paying to secure feed when the snow was severe. They were also known to be furnished with an abundant coat of hair which enabled them to stand the rigor of the winter-winter-winter-winter.

### Horse Ties to Wild Life

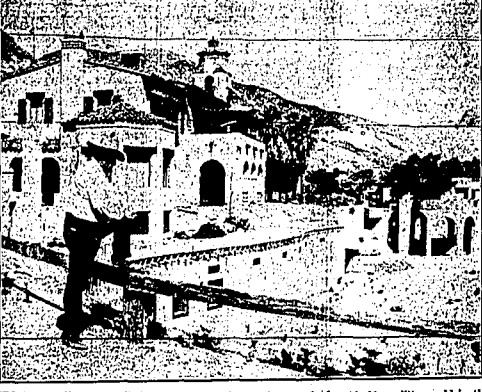

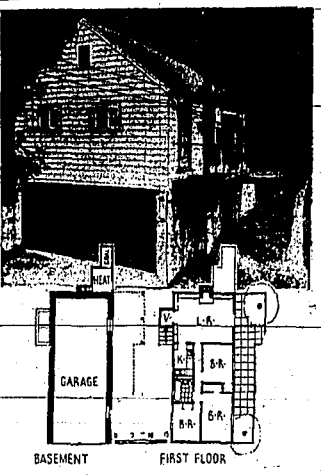

### FEDERAL MILLIONS FOR IDAHO LISTED

#### State Receives \$27,000,000 and Has \$8,000,000 More to Spend

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26 (AP) — Idaho received \$27,000,000 through June 30 from the 1935 federal emergency relief fund and the potato state still has \$8,000,000 more to spend.

The national emergency council reported today that Idaho expenditures under the \$4,000,000,000 emergency relief act of 1933 exceed \$7 million.

Presidential allocations to the state up to and including June 30 amounted to \$35,412,329, and obligations incurred totaled \$33,086,729, including the unexpended balance. The difference between total actual expenditures and allocations — is \$8,000,379. Expenditures by general types of work:

Highways, roads and streets, \$2,911,974; public buildings, \$481,001; relief, \$3,832,691; housing facilities, \$405,580; public recreational facilities, \$154,720; conservation work, including the civilian conservation corps, \$11,811,548; electricity, water and sewer systems, \$306,530; transportation facilities, \$177,164; agricultural projects, \$392,071; miscellaneous projects, \$298,860; rural resettlement programs, \$1,178,185; administrative expense, \$102,328.

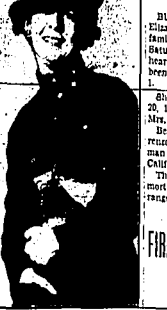

Clark ruled last Thursday that the filing deadline was Wednesday at 5 p. m., and the Union party was barred from appearing on the November 3 general election ballot.

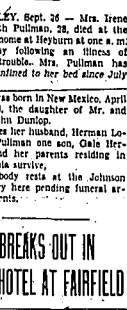

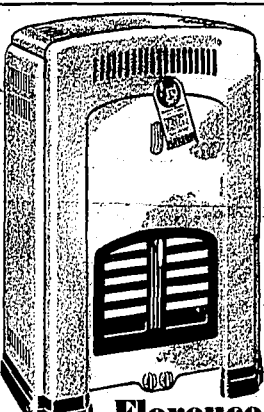

## Moscow Meat Packer Sues for \$225,000 Damages; Grower Acquitted

BOISE, Sept. 26 (AP)—A suit for \$225,000 damages was started in United States district court here today when a jury was acquitted Frank K. Hogue, Fayette fruit grower and defendant, on a criminal charge of violating the pure food law.

The Washington Water Power company of Spokane, was sued by fire allegedly started by overheated electric equipment last August 22. The suit was brought by Hogue and Cushing company, a Moscow, Idaho, meat packing company and its stockholders.

The plaintiffs charged the power company with negligence in not providing the amount of electrical energy to operate certain motors and that the overheating of them caused the fire. The insurance company paid \$5,800 to the Moscow company and seeks to recover that amount.

The company denies \$20,000 loss in plant and equipment; \$15,000 in loss business; \$10,000 in goods and \$10,000 other reasons.

The suit against Hogue was brought by the United States government. Investigation by the department of appeals alleged in violation of regulations fixing the maximum spray residue tolerance.

The potassium arsenite which used to large quantities, is injurious to the health of those consuming such fruit, government attorneys charged.

"The suit is the third of its kind brought in the federal courts," William Langlois, attorney for Hogue, said.

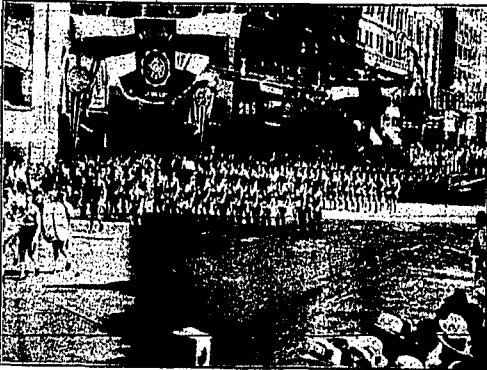
Dworshak predicted a Republican victory in southern Idaho, saying that members of the party in all towns of the section are "active and militant and determined to succeed in the November election."

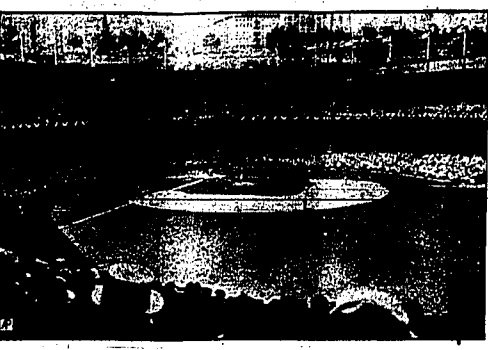

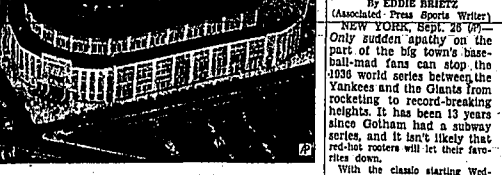

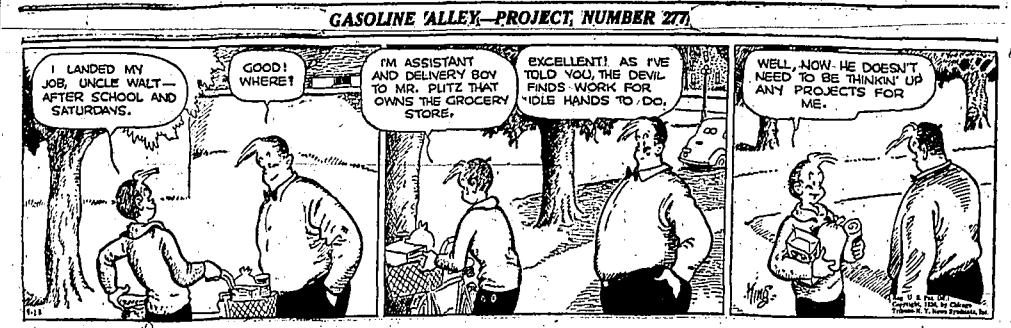
