

President Repudiates Communists' Support In Campaign Address

Roosevelt Opens Drive For Votes With Assault On Present And Past Republican Leaderships

By The Associated Press
SYRACUSE, Sept. 29.—President Roosevelt opened his campaign for another new deal victory at the November election with a repudiation tonight of communist support and an assault on present and past Republican leaderships.

Voicing opposition to the results of the campaign, Mr. Roosevelt led delegates to the New York state Democratic convention packed into every corner of the national guard armory that the Republican leadership would "never comprehend the need for a program of social justice."

"I am telling you tonight that the present Republican leadership is incapable of meeting the needs of our people."

On the platform as the president spoke Mrs. Roosevelt, Governor Lehman, renominated for another term in Albany earlier in the day, Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins, Senator Wagner of New York, convention keynote and Amelia Earhart, the aviator.

Calling communists a "false issue" in the campaign, the president told the convention that "the present national administration had encouraged conditions that fostered communism."

The Democratic party, he added, was realistic enough to face "this menace."

The president remained at another point that there was no difference between the major parties as to what they think about communism but there was a "very great difference" in what they do about it.

Voices Confidence
Scarcely had he sent his voice ringing through the packed hall and over the national radio broadcast than Mr. Roosevelt asserted a confidence in the outcome of the election.

"I thought," he said, "you and I know that we are going to win. We are not going to lose. There was never any doubt in my mind that we were going to win. We were going to win. We were going to win."
