Former President Discusses Revenue-Raising Policies in Non-Political Talk; Democrat Assails Waste

(By The Associated Press) DENVER, Sept. 30.—Abolition of all tax exemptions on government securities was advocated tonight by former President Herbert Hoover in a non-political address to the American Mining Congress.

Declaring at the outset that the committee would not deal with "political issues," the former chief executive suggested a constitutional amendment to reform the national income tax step, and proposed "intelligent reforms" for estate taxes.

PHILLIPS CONDEMNNS RECKLESS DRIVING

BURLEY, Sept. 30 — State Traffic Commissioner Phillips addressed the first aid class in the Burley high school Friday evening, September 30, on "Prevention of Accidents through Safe and Sane Driving." Phillips was introduced by D. E. Peterson.

Opening his remarks with the question, "Why Does Death Ride Our Highways?" Officer Phillips answered, "The reason is simple, it is that it is because we have 80 miles an hour cars driven by 20 mile an hour drivers on 30 mile an hour highways."

He gave twelve rules for safe driving which are as follows: 1. Be sure your car is in first class condition; drive on the right side of the road, when walking on left side of road (facing traffic); pass only when the way is clear and unobstructed; observe all traffic laws; do not overestimate your ability; never drive under the influence of liquor; never drive faster than safe for the conditions; never speed at intersections; always dim lights when approaching and passing cars; never stop on park on highway unless absolutely necessary; think only of your driving and do not have your mind on business worries.

Ten rules for improvement of highways were also given by Phillips: reduction of grades and curves; narrow bridges; eliminate railroad crossings; eliminate congested intersections by over or under passes; highways with 40 foot minimum width; suitable guard rails where necessary; any way "traffic lanes" banking on curves; sidewalks for pedestrians where necessary; civil service for state highway patrolmen.

JAPANESE LEADERS DEMAND REFORMS

Military Bloc Urges Drastic Revision of Administrative Methods

TOKYO, Sept. 30 (AP)—Joint army and navy demands that national policy be decided by a council headed within the cabinet were pressed yesterday on the government.

Influential military leaders in both branches of the services recommended sweeping revision of administrative methods, all closely affecting Japan's military set-up.

The bloc demanded, among other reforms, that the formulation of national policy be directed by a minister without portfolio and that the sweeping changes be made without discussion.

It was feared Lieutenant-General Kuniaki Doihara, minister of war, might resign, causing the fall of the cabinet, should Premier Koki Hirota reject the proposals, which called also for:

- 1—Consolidation of the foreign office with the overseas ministry.
- 2—Amalgamation of the ministries of agriculture, forestry, commerce and industry.
- 3—Consolidation of the departments of railroads and communications.

(Speakers for the Chinese (Central) government, in Nanking, asserted that they regarded an implied warning by Itacho Arima, Japanese foreign minister.

They stated a desire for China to grasp Japan's "proffered hand" and avoid a breach necessitated by mutual suspicions.

(Speakers said peaceful settlement of Sino-Japanese difficulties are "as much Japan's responsibility as China's.")

"G-DUCKS" SAVE NANKING—FROM LOCUST INVASION

NANKING, China (AP)—A flock of green-headed ducks saved Nanking, China's modern capital, from the efficient Duck Defense Corps. Mobilized by the National Government of Public Safety to wipe out an invading horde of 11-year locusts, an army of 3,000 loyal ducks made short work of the locust larvae as they emerged from a Yangtze river island near here recently.

Government experts estimate the daily capacity of the average "G-duck" as something over a pound of locusts, so the battle was won in less than three days.
