EPISCOPALIANS OF IDAHO MEET HERE

Rt. Rev. F. B. Bartlett Brings Long Record of Service to Convocation

The Rt. Rev. F. B. Bartlett, bishop of the missionary district of Idaho, arrived today for the first convocation of the missionary district since he became its bishop.

Bishop Bartlett came to Idaho with a wide experience behind him. Although he was a native of Connecticut, he has spent many years in Oregon after being graduated from Trinity college and the Episcopal Theological school at Cambridge, Massachusetts.

In Oregon he was called at regular intervals to ride a 1000-mile circuit. After this work he returned to Oregon where he took his master's degree. Then his work took him to the waterfront in Brooklyn, New York, where for two years he was engaged in the work of the church much of it taking on the nature of social service work.

Returning to the mid-west he became the pastor of the Episcopal church of dean of the northern convocation in charge of mission in the northwestern states. In 1924 he was rector of St. Mark's Episcopal church, Aberdeen, and later became director of field work in the Episcopal church in the northwestern states. In 1927 he went to the diocese of Missouri as rector of the church of St. Philip, St. Louis, and in 1929 he became dean of Calvary Cathedral, director of field work in the diocese, and in 1932 he became chairman of the diocesan commission on the nation wide campaign, director of the department of church relations and service of the executive council, and a member of the diocesan council.

After three years he was an associate and general secretary of the field department of the national council of the Episcopal church, with his home in Berkeley, California.

In this field department work Bishop Bartlett traveled all over the eighth province of the Episcopal church which covers California, Arizona, Utah, Nevada and Idaho.

In 1931 he was elected bishop of the missionary district of North Dakota, which position he held until he was transferred to the Episcopacy of the missionary district of Idaho in November, 1935. He is effective December 1, 1935.

In December, 1933, Bishop Bartlett was elected executive secretary for domestic missions of the Episcopal church, in the entire United States. He has held this position together with the Episcopacy of North Dakota and Idaho since that time.

About 40 delegates from all parts of the missionary district of Idaho are expected to be in Twin Falls for the convocation on October 2. Everyone is invited to attend the sessions of this meeting.

Junior Red Cross Project Brings African Exhibits to Twin Falls

On display in the window of Cio Book Store is an exhibition of work from a boys school in Tunisia, North Africa, received by the pupils of the Washington school. This exhibit exemplifies one of the objectives of the Junior Red Cross, that of world friendship.

Junior Red Cross promotes intimate knowledge and understanding of peoples of other lands by its program of correspondence between children of different nations. Letters, booklets, and gifts are exchanged through the medium of the Junior Red Cross.

In March, 1935, a booklet comprised of letters and specimens of art work came to the sixth grade class at the Washington school from the pupils of the Rue Hoche school in French Tunisia, describing the country and giving its history. The Washington pupils forwarded a similar booklet of Idaho to the Tunisian school in reply. A "thank you" booklet for the Tunisian booklet has just been received by the local school. TAXES ESTIMATED ON SUNKEN GOLD

Government's Claim Totals More Than Million Dollars

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3 (AP)—Treasury officials estimated today the government might claim more than \$1,000,000 of a legendary treasure which salvagers hope to take from a British warship sunk 150 years ago off the east shore of Manhattan Island.

Search for the \$4,800,000 of gold and silver reputed to be in the anti-choked hull of the British frigate Hussar is being pressed by British Lt. 70-year-old Connecticut submarine inventor.

Treasury attaches said they already had made a bargain with Lake for dividing the spoils — if they ever are fished from the bottom of the East river.

Although the nation has legal rights in "wrecked or abandoned property," treasury experts said, it is not clear how the government will recover it.

Variable Factors A substantial income tax would be collectible, however, on the \$1,200,000 the Lake Submarine Salvage corporation hopes to recover for its stockholders.

Accurate estimates are impossible until the amount actually recovered, the expense of the search, the company's dividend policy, the several other factors are determined, but treasury employees said a tax of more than \$500,000 was "not improvable."

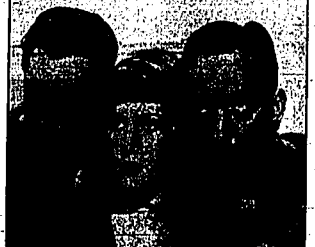

# KNOX STRIKES AT PRESIDENT'S CLAIM

## Nominee Declares President 'Doesn't Know How' to Balance Budget

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Oct. 6 (AP)—Denying President Roosevelt aimed at a revolution, Colonel Frank Knox, Republican vice-presidential candidate, charged last night "the only revolution that ever menaced us was the one the false prophets of the New Deal have nourished and promoted."

It was the second attack the Chicago publisher made in one day of campaign travels against the president's campaign speeches. The first was in Akron, Ohio, where he hit at Mr. Roosevelt's Pittsburgh address Thursday night by declaring the president "doesn't know how" to balance the budget.

**Attack Opening Speech**  
In the address he prepared for delivery in this city, Knox aimed at the president's opening campaign speech, delivered on September 29 in Syracuse, N. Y., and the very first of the campaign argument consisted of two claims, that his administration "saved the country from revolution" and brought recovery, Knox declared:

"These two propositions do violence to the facts. These two contentions are as hollow as a sound. The people of this country were never in the verge of revolution. The danger of revolution developed after March 4, 1933.

"On that date, the government was taken over by a group of fanatics and experimenters, men who thought the American system a failure, men who did not believe in the American Constitution, men who liked the Russian system. They preached a gospel of class hatred, a 'red' and 'black' propaganda of 'Only the people has prevented open class war."

**Weight on Business**  
To the extent that the Roosevelt administration brought recovery, Knox replied that the New Deal was a "bad and chain" on business improvement.

"With the election of Alfred M. Deussen last month," he declared, "it will burst forth in the most significant era of employment and production and good business this country has ever known."

He called the administration "blundering, wretched and fanatical." It was his scathing to overflow crowd in an Akron hotel (the Mayflower ballroom today) that Knox criticized in the president's Philadelphia speech. He chastised the president's statement that "we had to balance the budgets of the American people before we could balance the budget of the national government."

"In that single sentence," Knox commented, "the president unconsciously disclosed the whole animus of the administration. What business is it of his whether you or I balance the budget? His job was to balance the budget of the United States, and he promised to do it."

"His new day," a voice called down from the balcony.

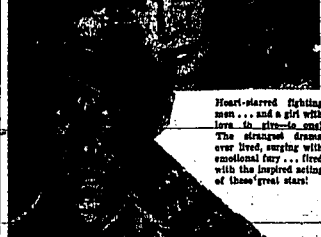

Although Washington looked anything but content for the Pacific coast conference championship in the first half, manufacturing only one first down, its attack was convincing enough in the last two periods.

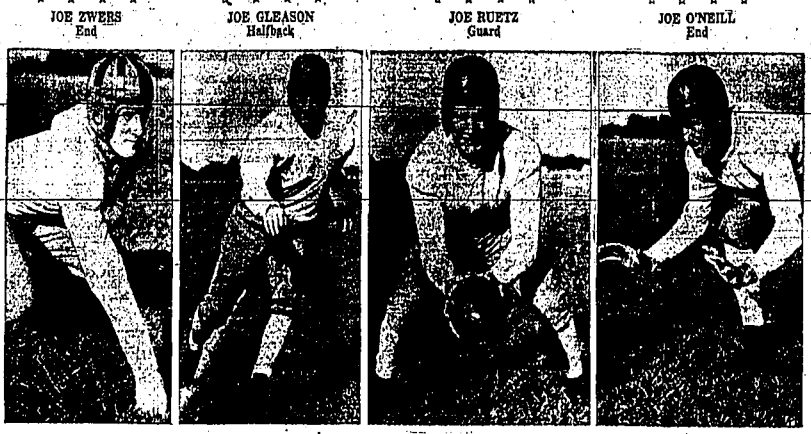
After the rest stanza Idaho had possession of the ball only seven times, once to give Washington a safety.
