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### RED CROSS CHARTS ANNUAL CAMPAIGN

#### Relief Organization Reviews Activities in Idaho During Past Year

BOISE, Oct. 5 (AP)—American Red Cross officials planned today to launch the annual campaign in Idaho November 11 for 29,233 members.

Preparations were made at the second of a series of three district meetings to start the drive. The first meeting was at Pocatello and another will be conducted at Coeur d'Alene this week.

Parker P. Carter of Boise, chairman of Idaho relief work, said the southwestern Idaho district session here today that 1,719 families were relieved by the Red Cross in Idaho last year; that there are 180 first aid instructors in Idaho; that 4,000 adults and children were given instruction in life saving methods and that 19 highway first aid stations have been opened and that 20 more stations are to be established.

#### Idaho Farm Price Index Shows Drop

BOISE, Oct. 5 (AP)—The index of prices paid Idaho farmers for their agricultural products has declined 3 per cent in 30 days but still, federal officials reported today, is 23 per cent above a year ago.

Grains, feed crops, fruits and vegetables dropped but other crops remained the same.

Poultry products advanced 11 per cent, but the month and most animals and dairy products declined 3 and 4 per cent respectively. Other livestock products remained unchanged.

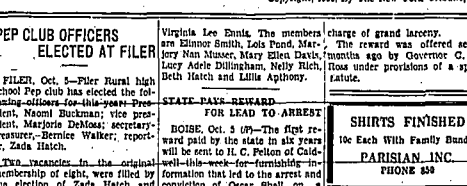
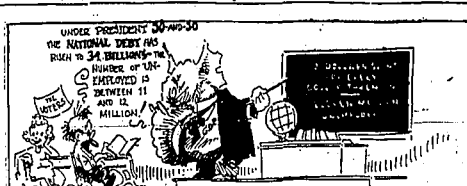

#### Girard Comments On Court Decision

BOISE, Oct. 5 (AP)—Secretary of State Franklin Girard said today the supreme court — "wisely I think" — modified its opinion of 1934 permitting the union party to file its nominating certificates.

"The language of the court should

be sufficiently clear to prevent the crowing of the most completely barbed brain," Girard declared in reply to criticism by E. A. Albee, union party secretary, related in a statement in which he referred to Girard as "a dictator."

Girard declined to accept the party's nominating petitions on the ground they were presented to him a day too late. The court instructed him to disregard the previous ruling and do so.

Albee charged him with making a ruling in favor of the Democratic party on the theory the unionists' vote would run more deeply into that party than into the Republicans.

The court ruled Girard was "justified" in following the previous opinion handed down by the court.

### WORKERS ALLIANCE OPPOSES STEPHAN

#### Organization Endorses Roosevelt; Calls for WPA Wage Boost

BOISE, Oct. 5 (AP)—The state board of the Workers' Alliance of Idaho approved a resolution today opposing election of Frank J. Stephan of Twin Falls, Republican candidate for governor, and endorsed President Roosevelt for reelection.

The board, secretary for the board said his organization has upwards of 3,000 members.

"Resolved, that we oppose Mr. Stephan's candidacy for governor, because he has been unfair to farmers and labor; that he is a corporation lawyer, and that he has a reactionary record in the state legislature."

#### Asks WPA Wage Boost

The board named a committee to urge Governor C. Ben Ross to defer appointment of a commissioner of labor, immigration and statistics until the next legislature can enact a law providing that a department be headed by three men instead of one.

Another committee was chosen to call on J. L. Hood, WPA director in Idaho, to urge him to work for a 20 per cent increase in WPA workers wages and to reduce women's work hours from 140 to 130 minutes.

A questionnaire was ordered sent to all candidates for legislative offices. It contained two questions: "1. Are you in favor of changing the constitution so that initiative measures may be passed by a majority of the voters on the subject. In case of a number of votes equal to a majority of all the votes cast for the office for governor.
