Yankees Keep Basenit Barrage To Complete Series Triumph, 13-5

Giant Crumble As American Leaguers Smash Redners

By ALAN GOULD (Associated Press Staff Editor) NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—The New York Yankees blasted their way back to the baseball heights today with a farewell salvo of basenit slugging that crushed the last lingering hopes of their neighborhood rivals, the battle-worn Olimpia, and gave a further edge to the record books.

The Olimpia crumbled under a ninth-inning barrage that produced seven runs and sent the Yankees to a lopsided conquest, 13 to 5, in the sixth and final game of the all-New York battle for the world baseball championship.

As the tumult and the shouting died, the cheering left in its wake a devastating attack as any world series has ever known. The "Bronx Bombers" emerged with a decisive victory, four games to two, in a series that set a flock of new hitting and batting records.

Claris Takes Lead Two pitchers led the hard-luck victim of the third game, but Freddy Fitzsimmons' "fizz" to check the tide was a decisive factor in this afternoon. The Olimpia got off in front and finally forced their way back to the lead in the seventh inning, but it was an uphill battle.

ELLIOTT ROOSEVELT FIGURES IN SENATE MUNITIONS INQUIRY

Son of President Signed \$500,000 Contract for Sale of Airplanes to Russia, Affidavit Asserts

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—The senate munitions committee tonight made public what it said was an affidavit by Anthony H. S. Fokker, former German airplane manufacturer, stating he had signed a contract in 1917 to give Elliott Roosevelt, son of the president, a commission of \$500,000 in connection with the sale of military airplanes to Russia.

Committee officials said the affidavit was made public by order of Chairman Hyde (R-NY) as a result of public charges that Fokker was withholding information.

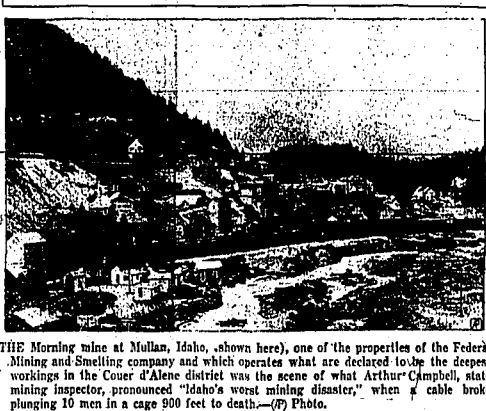

President to Open Series of Campaign — Speeches at Omaha

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6 (AP)—President Roosevelt began his drive into the West today by speaking at Omaha, Nebraska.

He said at his press conference he expected an itinerary for the western trip to be ready for announcement shortly. He indicated an attempt to take Minneapolis into the circuit was causing a bit of delay.

"Tonight, tomorrow and Thursday," the president said, "I have reserved Omaha for an forthcoming address into shape."
