TOPEKA, Kas., Oct. 7.—Governor Alf M. Langdon said today President Roosevelt is "too careless with facts" and checked recently issued new deal figures.

STEPHAN OPPOSES SOUTHWARD PARDON

STEPHAN, Idaho, Oct. 7 (AP)—The application of Lydia Southard, the Idaho penitentiary on a murder charge, for clemency from the state parole board, drew a sharp attack from the board by Frank L. Stephan, Republican candidate for governor.
Lydia Southard was convicted at Twin Falls 15 years ago of poisoning her husband.
Stephan, who prosecuted Mrs. Southard, pointed out the "heinousness" of the crime, and charged it would be a "black spot" on the board's record if she were freed.
His case is due to come up before the board tomorrow.
Stephan charged that Mrs. Southard's crime of poisoning her fourth husband led to the collection of life insurance which all the requirements of a first degree murder, and there should be a second degree murder verdict.

ROOSEVELT'S TOUR WESTERN STATES

Itinerary for Campaign Trip Includes Two Major Political Speeches

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7 (AP)—A nine-day campaign trip into the western states of New York, starting tomorrow, was planned for President Roosevelt today in an ambitious drive for votes in the agrarian interior and border states.
The itinerary for the major tour, announced by a White House secretary, included two political speeches with national radio broadcasts on October 10 and 11, and October 14-16 at night.
The stopping tour will take the chief executive into Kansas, home state of the Republican opponent of the president, Governor Alf M. Langdon. Besides more than a score of "rest" performances, appearances will include a radio broadcast on October 12 and at Detroit late afternoon of October 12.
All of the ten states on the western schedule—Louis, Missouri, Nebraska, Wyoming, Colorado, Kansas, Oklahoma and Idaho—and Ohio—went for Roosevelt in 1932.

Bjorkvall Forced Down in Atlantic Off Irish Coast; 1000 Miles Short Of Goal

"VALSERTIA, Ireland, Oct. 7.—Forced down in the Atlantic on an attempted direct flight from New York to Stockholm, a Swedish flier was rescued tonight by the trawler Imbrick off Ireland's western-most point.

"Although a 15 days' strike" by ship owners, mariners, dockworkers and longshoremen would not be a disaster, he said, should the strike be called, fruit farmers of the Pacific Northwest who use cold storage steamers for their shipments abroad and "Atlantic ports" will suffer.

Henry was one of the principal speakers at a conference of presidents and chief accountants of the 13 production credit corporations of the PCA.
Henry said to 20 percent of the business of the 31 production credit corporations is the production of fruit, with Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana the major sources of their loans to livestock and dairy producers.
"We are really in a bad position," he said, "both of these industries are in good condition, with high grain prices and a strong demand for wool. It is characterized by a 'boom' in the prices in the territory as 'extreme' livestock industry suffers."

FACTORY STOPS — BEET RECEIVING

Work in Fields Halted as Cars, Sheds-at-Plant Are Filled

Twin Falls factory of the Amalgamated Sugar company stopped receiving beets yesterday morning when all cars and sheds were filled to capacity. R. H. Talmann, Idaho manager for the company, announced last evening. Talmann said that approximately 6000 tons of beets are on hand at the factory at present and that receiving of beets from the fields of the district would be resumed Saturday. The factory opened for receiving of beets, September 23.

Work Suspended
Many of the crews sipping and digging beets in the district were temporarily thrown out of work when the word came out that beets were not being received at the factory, the work being discontinued. Growers who wished to have their beets in the ground as long as possible to prevent shrinkage. Estimates are that between 800 and 900 men are employed in the fields between Marsburg and Buhl, the area served by the Twin Falls factory.

Talmann estimated that 160,000 tons of beets would be processed at the factory this year, producing an average yield of 16½ tons per acre. Several acres have already reported 20-ton yields. At the present time, Talmann said, 200 men are employed in the Twin Falls factory, with an additional 40 at work on the grounds.
