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Borah Deviates From Own Rule To Endorse Stephan For Governor

Idahoan Seeking Re-election To Senate Limits Campaign To 'National Issues,' But Praises Twin Falls Man

(By The Associated Press) SPOKANE, Oct. 9.—Senator William V. Borah, independent-Republican, today announced here today he would make no campaign speeches for any presidential candidate, but would confine himself to discussing national "issues" in Idaho addresses.

"I have no plans which will take me out of the state, Idaho is a sufficient realm. I can discuss questions here just as easily as I can in New York."

Mr. Borah said that he would stand in the national campaign. In his reelection campaign speeches he will stress across party lines the administration's record for its assistance to labor, and immediately turn to it to condemn it for permitting agricultural imports into American markets by trade agreements.

"I am not undertaking to discuss state issues," he continued. "There are others more capable of dealing with them. But I stand on them. I think that is both fair and honorable."

FEDERAL BOARD'S ESTIMATES SHOW HARVEST INCREASE

Average for All Crops Improves Nearly Two Per Cent as Result of Rain During Past Month

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Improvement of nearly two per cent in the prospective 1938 harvest—averaged for all crops—was said today by the federal government's board of wheat and other grain inspectors.

The estimated yield of this year's corn crop was put up at 51,000,000 bushels above the September 1 forecast. The indicated crop for October was 52,000,000 bushels, which would lift the 1938 yield out of its threatened rank as the earliest crop in more than half a century.

Below Average Another big gain for September was a 10,000,000 bushel increase for the wheat crop. The indicated crop for October was 2,222,000,000 bushels, which would lift the 1938 yield out of its threatened rank as the earliest crop in more than half a century.

Wheat Production Drops Total wheat production this year was raised downward to 67,200,000 bushels, compared with 69,254,000 a month earlier. The 1938 yield is 67,200,000 bushels, while the five-year average was 69,254,000 bushels.

Other crops which production this year was raised upward to 102,500,000 bushels, while the five-year average was 101,200,000 bushels.

IDAHO'S FEDERAL TAXES INCREASE

1935-36 Collections Top Previous Year's Total by 11 Per Cent

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9 (AP)—Uncle Sam collected \$70,879,694 in federal revenue taxes from Idaho residents during the fiscal year ended June 30.

The internal revenue bureau reported today 1935-36 collections topped the total of \$63,269,129 in the 1934-35 year by 11 per cent despite a heavy reduction in agricultural adjustment taxes.

Corporate income tax collections increased from \$10,631,021 to \$17,151,841, individual income tax collections from \$30,829,120 to \$30,129,120.

With 9.37 per cent of the nation's population, Idaho internal revenue taxes amounting to 9.8 per cent of the total collections for the United States, the bureau said. Corporate and individual income tax collections amounted to 6.0 per cent of the national total.

Coast Guard Boats Remove Crew Members From Doomed Freighter

GENERAL FRANCISCO, Oct. 9 (AP)—Sausalito, San Francisco, Oct. 9 (AP)—rescued on a cliff overlooking the Golden Gate.

Meal-In-One Recipes Based On Split Peas

What could be better these cool busy days than one of those delightful "meal in one" dishes? Just a few minutes to mix them, pop them into the oven and, presto, about them until nearly time for lunch. Of course, if the dish is to serve as practically an entire meal, it must be a nourishing, satisfying dish, with a good balance of the essential food values. The recipes given below, using split peas as their base, are delicious, yet inexpensive dishes, and each one is practically an entire luncheon in itself. Split peas are high in protein content, high in energy value, and contain vitamins "A," "B" and "C" and "thiamine" of our important minerals. Try this combination casserole.

Split Pea Casserole
1 cup green split peas
1/2 cup dried raw carrots
1/2 cup diced ham or leftover meat
1/2 cup diced onion
1/2 cup diced celery
1/2 cup minced green peppers
1 cup tomatoes
1 1/2 tsp. salt
Water to cover
Mix and put in baking dish. Cover and bake until done, about one hour. Serve.
This dish is delicious with biscuits on top, and if you wish to serve it this way, the peas are just tender, remove from oven, remove cover of casserole, place biscuits on top and put back in oven until biscuits are done and a golden brown. Serve.

Baked Peas
1 cup yellow split peas
1 tsp. salt
Dash of pepper
1 tsp. sugar
1 onion, cut in pieces
1/2 cup bean of salt pork, diced

2 egg yolks, 2 tablespoons butter, 1/2 cup water
Mix ingredients and shape into roll two inches thick, place in shallow baking pan, add 1/2 inch water and cover. Bake 30 minutes in moderate oven. Add vegetables. Six peeled carrots, 6 peeled potatoes, 1 cup lima beans, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1/2 cup water.
Mix ingredients and arrange around meat loaf. Bake 50 minutes, basting frequently.

ute. Mix sugar and 1 cup cold water and bring to boiling point. Add gelatin and stir till beginning to set. Beat till frothy and quite firm. Mold and chill.

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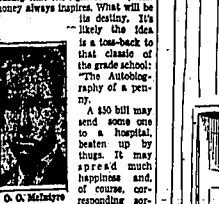

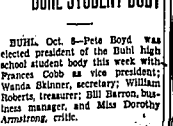

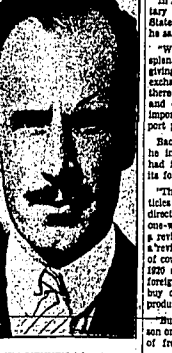
