### Chest Provides Assistance for Children's Home

Twin Falls Community Chest in the past has been of great assistance to the Children's Home. Fredrick and Aid Society of Idaho carry on one of the most worthwhile projects in the city. Miss Opal Billington, field representative of the society, said here last week:

The home, located at Boise, cares daily for an average of 200 children in the home and 100 that have been placed in foster homes where close supervision is given.

Although contrary to general belief, Miss Billington said that the home is not a state institution although it receives small appropriations from state and county. However, 41 per cent of its maintenance is derived from charity. The society is an anti-charitable and non-political organization.

Primary service rendered by the home is that of providing food, shelter, clothing and medical care, but also entering into the program of the training of individual children in such as behavior and adjustment.

Although in many cases the home cares for children that have been taken from their parents by the courts over half of the institution's work is of a temporary nature where children are taken from poverty-stricken homes or from those where the sickness prohibits keeping of children.

At the present time 16 children from Twin Falls and vicinity are being cared for either in the home or in foster homes.

### 175 Twin Falls Girls Belong to Camp Fire Group

"Camp Fire Girls, a service organization which benefits from Twin Falls Community Chest, has a growing membership and at present includes approximately 175 Twin Falls girls between the ages of 10 and 18, according to organization officials.

Camp Fire Girls is primarily a service group with an aim to help the members to a better life and citizenship and to render assistance in community service projects.

Next annual event of the Camp Fire Girls is the summer outing camp, held at Easley hot springs. Camp expenses are kept to a minimum and 150 girls attended last year.

The general session will be held in the afternoon. The keynote address will be given by Dr. Nielson. The business session will be held in the morning.

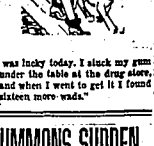

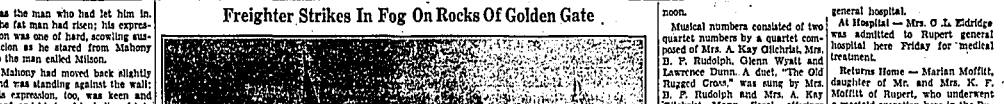

The favorite's time for the distance was four hours, 32 minutes and 44.94 seconds, an average speed of 65.998 miles per hour. That gave a final circuit in a lead of 11.1 minutes and 47 seconds over Jean Wilmite of France, who finished second.

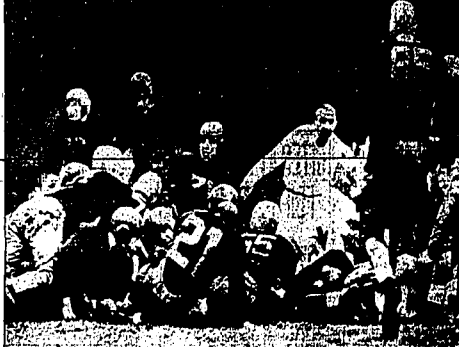

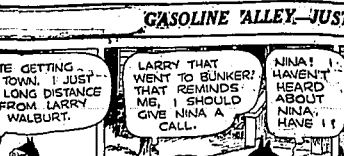

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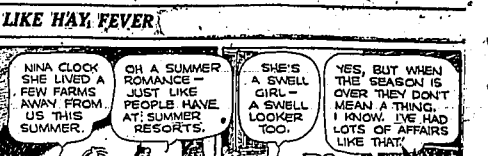
