Leftists of France Charge Reich With Meddling In Affairs

Claiming Communist Had 'Insulted' Adolf Hitler, German Files Official Protest At Paris

(By The Associated Press)
 PARIS, Oct. 13—Germany's official protest that a French communist-leader had "insulted" Adolf Hitler tonight brought counter charges from French leftists that the Reich was "insulted" in French internal affairs.
 The communist party called Germany's action an "intolerable intrusion," and announced it would publish the full text of the speech by the party's secretary-general, Maurice Thorez, which German officials said contained the remarks derogatory to Hitler.

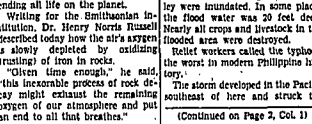

COURT REFUSES TO REVIEW DECISION ON WOMEN'S WAGE

Six Disputes Involving New Deal Legislation Set for Hearing; Declines to Pass on Labor Act

(By The Associated Press) — (WASHINGTON, Oct. 12) — Its first business session of the year, the supreme court stood pat on its invalidation of the New York minimum wage law for women and declined to review an appeal from a decision holding a similar statute in the state of Washington unconstitutional.

In all, the court acted on 200 appeals Monday, concerning 100 cases. It refused to review legislation and declined to pass on three others. In addition, it took action on the appeal in the New York case, but also declined to reconsider its five-to-four ruling last May holding the constitutionality of the New York act.

Chief Justice Brandeis, in a dissenting opinion, said that the New York state was unconstitutional because it had imposed the presidential campaign.

It was this decision last June that prevented the government from making a statement of the state government could act.

GOLD AGREEMENT'S INFLUENCE WIDENS

Three Nations With Virtual Monopoly Take Lead for Stabilization. WASHINGTON, Oct. 12 (AP)—Formation of a "gold bloc" by America, France and Britain will widen the monopoly of the world gold supply, was described in financial quarters here today.

Washington officials said that the tri-power coalition of gold might be used to force other nations into a "gold bloc" which they expected other governments to join.

Effective terms of the agreement, financial powers pledged themselves to sell gold only to countries with a strong international credit position.

Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau made it plain, in announcing the agreement, that "the door is not closed to other nations which might want to join. Although no other government had announced its intention to join, it was known to be under close study by financial authorities in foreign capital."

CLARK OUTLINES 5-POINT PROGRAM

Idaho Falls Welcomes Democratic Candidate for Governor

IDAHO FALLS, Oct. 13 (AP)—Barbara W. Clark, Democratic candidate for governor, issued a statement last night outlining a five-point program emphasizing his views relative to the development and conservation of the state's natural resources.

The five points were:

1. Development of a permanent arterial highway system from boundary to boundary, the program will include farm-to-market and mine-to-market roads. The north and south highway would be rushed to completion.
2. Conservation of water for irrigation through building of dams and reservoirs with federal aid to provide farmers with more than adequate water.
3. Cooperation with the federal government in obtaining the greatest possible assistance for the up-building of a great Idaho.
4. Conservation and development of recreational areas and endowment lands contiguous to lake shores and other scenic areas.
5. Development of the phosphate beds in southeastern Idaho to provide the chief source for farm lands and employment.

Welcomed Home
Idaho Falls turned out to welcome Clark back to his home city following a campaign through Idaho. Two other state Democratic candidates appeared on the platform: Harry C. Parsons, incumbent auditor, and J. W. Taylor, candidate for attorney general.

Parsons outlined ten years of Republican state administration with six years under that of the Democrats.

He said that at the end of ten years "Republican administration had succeeded in jacking up the state taxes to the all time high of \$3,350,000 per year, the state debt to the highest peak in state history of more than eight million dollars, the utter requirements to the all time high of \$17,000,000 per year, the cost of state administration the highest ever before or since and then handed the state government over to the Democrats in 1931 with a deficit in the state general fund of \$250,000."

Since 1931, he added, the Democrats reduced the state tax for general purposes to \$1,000,000 which is the lowest since the Alexander administration in 1917.

The state debt has been reduced from eight millions to two million and the interest requirement from \$770,000 per year to about \$70,000 per year.

QUARANTINE REVISION EASES CROWDER'S LOAD

An alfalfa weevil quarantine which has cost Idaho potato growers thousands of dollars during the past several years, probably will be lifted this season, Carl L. DeLong, executive secretary for the Idaho Vegetable Producers, Incorporated, said last evening he had been advised by W. H. Wicka, director of the state bureau of plant industry. Present methods of harvesting and handling potatoes eliminates the possibility of weevil being carried in potato shipments, DeLong said, and led to the recommendation adopted by representatives of the Idaho Potato Producers, Incorporated, at a meeting of the Western Plant Quarantine board at Boise last June for elimination of the necessity for official certification of screening.
