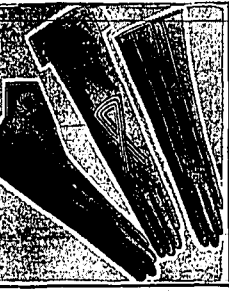

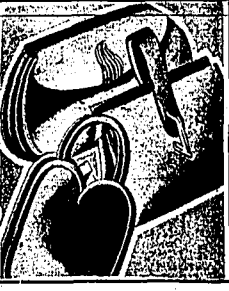

MORE AAA CHECKS FOR NORTH, EAST

Farmers' Work Sheets Indicate Distribution of Federal Subsidy

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (AP)—A survey of AAA reports indicated today that many more farmers in the northeast and north central regions would receive checks this year than last, while checks would go to fewer in the south.

National allotments of the \$470,000,000 to be distributed under this year's soil conservation-subsidy program remain about equal, but a stock of work sheets filed by farmers under the program gave a rough idea of the number expected to receive benefits in different sections.

They indicated that six times as many in the north central region "benefiting" under the program than in previous AAA programs, and more than twice as many in the northeast.

This was explained by officials as partly the result of the inclusion of dryland and small general farm-

Types of Payment
Two kinds of payments are scheduled to be made during some time this month, under the present single program, one for shifting acreage from cotton, tobacco, wheat, corn and other crops which the government classifies as "soil-depleting" to clover, alfalfa, grasses and other crops classified as "soil-conserving." The other is for "soil-building" practices, which range all the way from fertilizing and terracing to killing prairie dogs.

The number of work sheets filed by farmers under the conservation plan totaled 4,272,484, compared to 1,383,851 AAA contracts signed by farmers in 1935. Officials have estimated the number of persons actually receiving checks will be 6,000,000 in comparison with about 1,000,000 last year. Only one work sheet was filed for each farm although owners, operator, tenant and share-cropper may share in the payment.

In the north central region, work sheets were filed for 2,116,200 farms. Under the year's program compared with 863,540 last year.

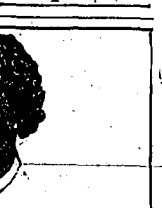

11,570 Needy Persons, 50,000 Workers on Rolls in Idaho

BOISE, Oct. 14 (AP)—Walter T. Lockwood, Idaho director of the national emergency council, estimated today that approximately 11,570 needy men, women and children, and 50,000 industrial and commercial workers in the state now are covered by the social security act.

"The estimates include those persons affected by both the public assistance and unemployment compensation provisions of the act," Lockwood said.

"Idaho is now participating in every feature of the social security act. An unemployment compensation system now is being set up to protect 50,000 workers against loss of income during temporary periods of unemployment."

Public Assistance Plans
The state has established public assistance plans to aid the needy aged, the needy blind and dependent children.

"In September 7,459 aged, 210 blind, and 2,850 dependent children received assistance under these plans at a total cost of \$23,750.

Approximately one-half the cost of aiding the aged and the blind, and one-third the cost of aiding dependent children and some of the maintenance expenses are paid by the social security board," he said.

A total of \$407,310 in federal funds has come to Idaho. Of the amount, \$4,774 was for administration of its unemployment compensation system, \$402,041 for assistance of needy aged, \$2,918 for needy blind, and \$1,577 for dependent children.

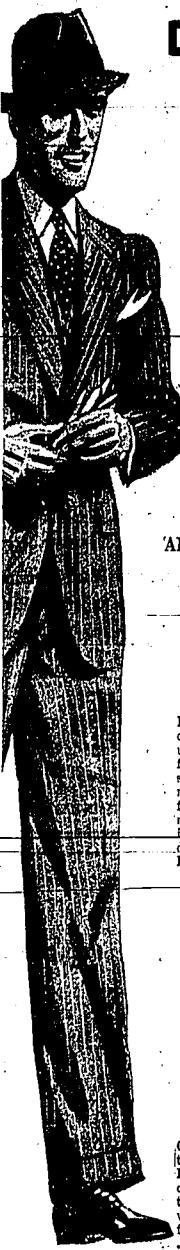

FROSTS CUT CROP YIELDS IN IDAHO

Statistician Reports State's Marketable Beans and Potatoes Reduced

BOISE, Oct. 14 (AP)—Federal crop statisticians estimated today that Idaho's marketable production of beans and potatoes was materially reduced by September frosts.

Frost caused considerable damage to unweeded beans and it is determined what part of the total production was rendered unmarketable.

Richard C. Ross, federal crop statistician, said in his report today.

"Frosts killed about 25 percent of the crop and prevented realization of yields which would have been obtained had cold weather held off a few weeks longer," he added.

**Imports of Cattle
Near Lowered Quota**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (AP)—The Customs Commission reported Monday 87.6 per cent of the quota of heavy cattle permitted to enter the United States under the Canadian trade agreement had been shipped into the country.

The commission's report showed 152,017 head of cattle weighing more than 700 pounds had been received in this country from January 1 to October 3. Canada sent 131,816 head and Mexico 20,401 head.

Only 23.4 per cent of the quota of dairy cows weighing 700 pounds or more were shipped into the country. That percentage was represented by 470 cows shipped as of October 3.

The quota on light cattle was exhausted early in August.

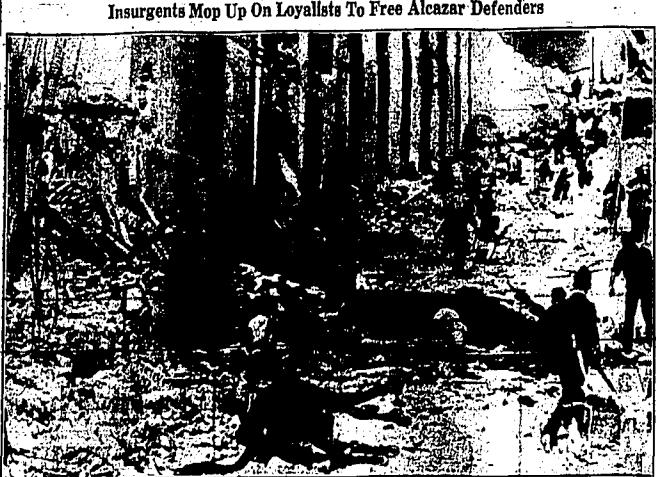
Malone's education at the present home of the Malones is in Hollywood.

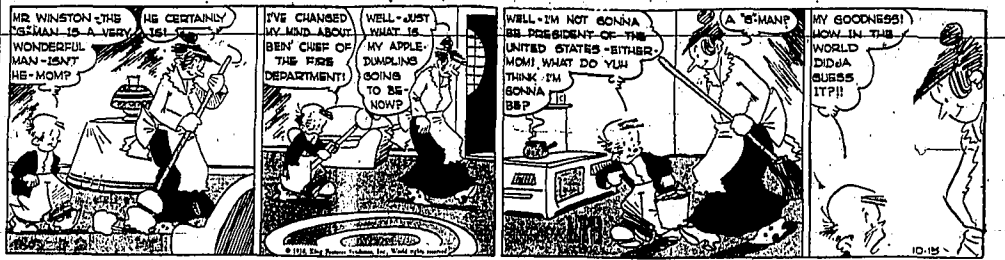

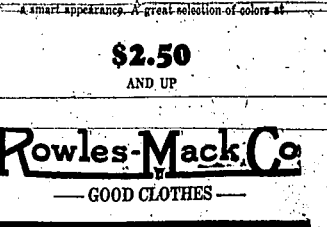
