



STEPHAN PRESSES SALES TAX ISSUE

Republican Vibes at Opponent's 'Straddling' Tactics... FOGATELLO, Idaho, Oct. 21 (AP) Assailing the Democratic gubernatorial candidate, Barzilla Clark, for asserted straddling-the-fence tactics on the sales tax question, Frank Stephan, Republican candidate for governor, in an address here tonight stated that the ordinary citizen would be hit by the sales tax, not large corporations.

Asking the question, "Do I sound like a large corporation and the 150,000 when I go around the state demanding the repeal of the sales tax?" Mr. Stephan pointed out that the tax benefited the large corporations and asked why his Democratic opponent didn't favor his favor of repealing the sales tax.

"I have, upon several occasions, made it plain that I have the repeal of the sales tax in mind and that this question is coming up for the vote of the people at a referendum on election day and here we need no partition clear upon this question with the hope that the people will vote, as I believe they will, in favor of repealing the sales tax," he said.

"My Democratic opponent has merely said that the people will vote on it this fall, and that is all the interest that he has in this subject. He points out that the sales tax is a common people, and I would ask the question, Who pays the sales tax? The people of the state of Idaho pay it on everything they purchase."

"The only people who are really opposed to the repeal of the sales tax are the large corporations and utilities, because it does not affect them but they purchase the commodities they use at wholesale outside the state. But because of the income from the sales tax, their property taxes are reduced by hundreds of thousands of dollars."

"It is a known fact that the sales tax adds the large corporations. Then why isn't Mr. Clark consistently He has made statements attacking the large corporations, but at the same time he has said that he favors the repeal of the sales tax," he concluded.

# HUGE PRODUCTION ON CAMAS PRAIRIE

Summary of Farming Activities Records Marked Improvement

**FAIRFIELD, Oct. 21** — Agricultural conditions on Camas prairie show a bigger production than in former years and are without the damage wrought by unseasonable frosts and rains in many other sections.

Wheat, that formed the great bulk of the county's crops, was not affected by frost as in outside tracts, but the greater loss came through floods this past spring. The hay crops were unusually good, many growers expecting to feed stock in the valley this winter rather than take them to the outside, or conserve the surplus for short years.

Garden produce held a leading place in farm crops in the valley this season despite a late spring and frost in September. Such vegetables as corn, beans, peas, cabbage, carrots and beets flourished in nearly every garden.

Prospects Good

Prospects for the 1932 wheat crop are unusually good. Fall plantings have been made and moisture has been sufficient to germinate seed. Warm weather for the past month, has made fields green and many farmers are now pasturing their same acreage.

A summary of the wheat harvest for the 1932 season shows that approximately 400,000 bushels has been marketed exclusive of that retained by growers for feeding purposes, seed, and stock which has not yet been sold.

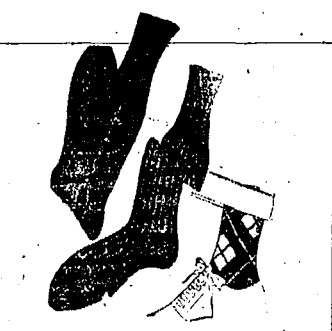
