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Roosevelt Named By Landon In Charges Of Waste And Graft

Kansan Renews Contentment That President Conceals Facts In Order To Make Over American Form of Government

(By The Associated Press) ABOARD LONDON TRAIN ENROUTE TO OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 22—Governor Alf Landon said tonight that he was "astonished" to find "resources through waste, graft and incompetence" and using public money "directly and indirectly to secure his re-election." As his campaign speech cut across the Texas panhandle on a personal bid for Oldham's eleven presidential elector votes and a conference with William H. (Alfalfa Bill) Murray, former Democratic governor, the Republican nominee issued a statement commending the Roosevelt-Worster, Mass., speech last night saying: "The president would conceal the facts in order to defame his program of making over our American form of government. Once more I challenge the lie to be made up by American people. Let them know just what he intends to do. It is the only honest thing he has done."

Former AAA Chief Hits Trade Pacts

Early Winter Storm Leaves Six-Inch Snow Blanket in New Mexico

At Erick, in southwestern Oklahoma, the snowfall came earlier than in any season in the past 33 years. The mercury dropped to 12 above at Okemah, Wyo., and freezing temperatures were reported overnight in the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles. Cold, cloudy weather prevailed over most of Colorado, Wyoming, and Utah with light snow reported in eastern and northern northwestern Wyoming, and southern Colorado. New Mexico reported a light snowfall in the northern and western Texas meted at El Paso. Most of the snow in Oklahoma and western Texas melted as the cold wave moved on. # ROSS DEEMS OWN ELECTION CERTAIN

## Governor Predicts He Will Defeat Senator Borah; Tells Program

MERIDIAN, Idaho, Oct. 22 (AP)—Governor C. Ben Ross predicted in a political address here tonight that he will defeat Senator William E. Borah, Republican, at the polls November 3 and outlined a program for the betterment of Idaho.

Governor Ross returned today from a week in Idaho where he has spent a week campaigning; earlier today he spoke, briefly, at the dedication of the new \$150,000 railway subway atampa.

"When I am United States senator I'm going to do things for this state, not for foreign countries," Ross declared.

"I want to make Idaho the kind of state our fathers wanted so hard to make, and when the next six years roll around, I'll be back to tell you about the fruits of my effort."

Ross predicted further reductions in the county and state tax levies if Democratic candidates are elected.

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### PROFIT OBJECTIVE FOR KIDNAP, HOAX

#### Federal Indictment Accuses Alleged Plotters in Lindbergh Case

TRENTON, N. J., Oct. 22 (AP)—The federal indictment against five persons in the Paul H. Wendel kidnaping, made public here today, charged the alleged conspirators hoped to reap large profits through publication of a book on the "solution" of the Lindbergh crime, and to enhance the reputation of Chief of Detectives Ellis Parker of Burlington county.

Parker and his son, Ellis, Jr., among the five indicted, have been released on bail. U. S. Attorney John J. Quinn revealed that the three others accused are Martin Scholman, Harry Weiss and Murray Bleeck, all of Trenton.

All five also are under indictment in Brooklyn in the Wendel case, growing out of the former Trenton lawyer's charge that he was abducted and tortured into making a false confession to the Lindbergh kidnaping.

The federal indictment, returned in Newark on Monday, also charged that the Wendel confession was obtained for the purpose of showing it to the governor of New Jersey and members of the court of pardons.

The confession resulted in a three-day delay of Drump Richard Hauptmann's execution for the Lindbergh crime.

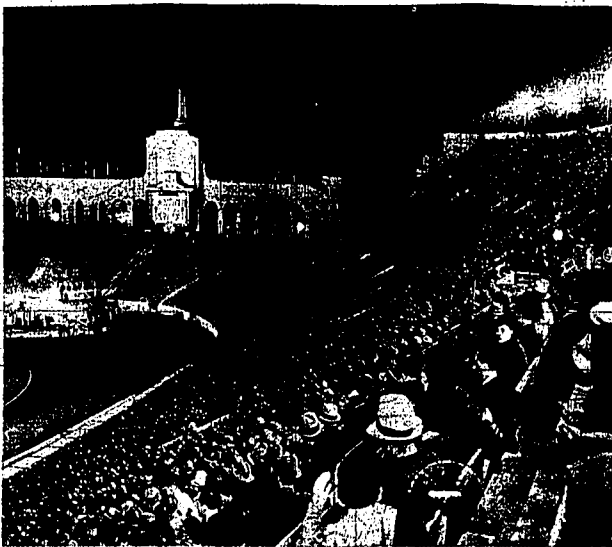


