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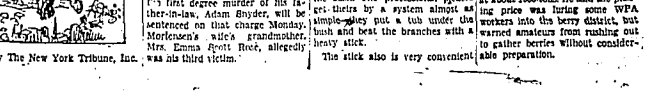
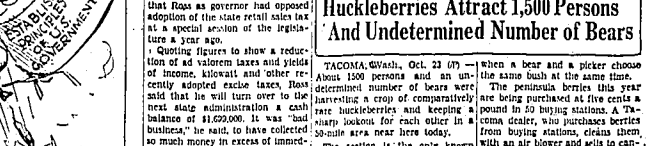
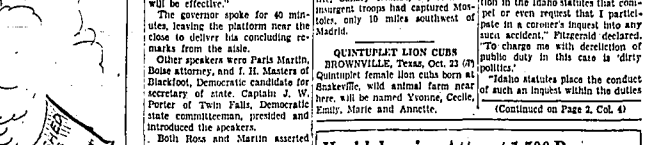
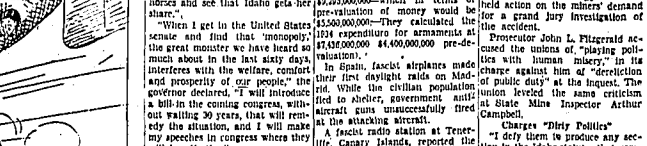
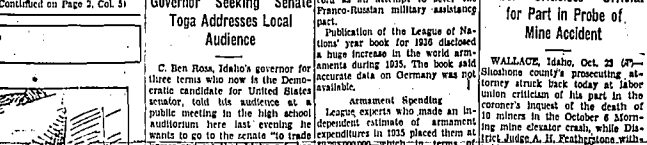
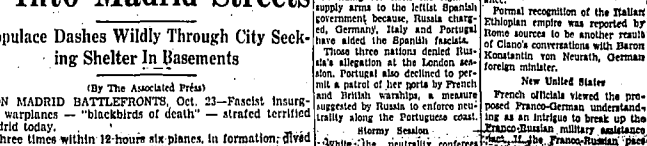
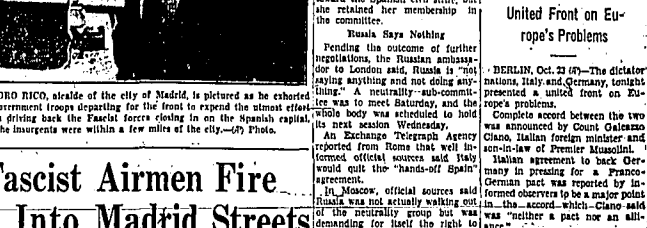
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Tables, Too, Need Hallow'en Dress

- Crash one cup parsley leaves, simmer 3 minutes in 1 1/2 cups stock. Drain. There should be 1 cup. Make sauce of 2 tablespoons butter melted, to which have been added 2 tablespoons flour stirred, until smooth, and the stock seasoned to taste. Stir until smooth and white boiling, add beaten yolk of one egg, 1/4 teaspoon lemon juice and 4 tablespoons more butter. Break canned or boiled salmon into pieces, not too small, and arrange in waffles. Cover with sauce, and surround with green peas.
- Children Pumpkin Tarts
1 cup brown sugar
3 eggs
- Two Jack O' Lantern Salads**
1 1/2 cups prepared pumpkin
1/2 cup milk
2 teaspoons cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 teaspoon allspice
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon gelatin
1/2 cup cold water
1 tablespoon orange juice
2 tablespoons granulated sugar
Baked tart shells
1/3 cup whipping cream
Cook together over boiling water until thickened, the sugar, egg yolk, slightly beaten, pumpkin, milk and seasonings.
Soften gelatin in cold water. Add orange juice and combine with first mixture. Fold in the egg whites, make stiff and dry and two tablespoons of sugar. Pour into baked pastry shells. Garnish with whipped cream if desired.

Popcorn Balls (18)
4 quarts popped corn
1 cup molasses
1 cup sugar
1 cup water
2 tablespoons vinegar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon soda
Carefully inspect corn and remove all kernels. Place corn in large bowl or pan. Mix rest of ingredients, excluding soda. Roll gently and without stirring until "click" ball forms when portion sprays is tested in 1/2 cup cold water. Add soda and while "floating" pour over corn, mixing thoroughly with long handled spoon. Allow the mixture to cool a little. Take portions in hands spread with butter and press into 2 1/2 inch balls. Arrange on platter or wrap in red waxed paper.
Spray these balls in dry place, dampen with clear water to separate.

Spiced Cider
(Serve Hot or Chilled)
2 quart cider
8 whole cloves
2 tablespoons crushed bark cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons lemon juice
1/2 cup orange juice
1/2 cup sugar
Mix cider, spices and salt. Cover and simmer 15 minutes, strain and add rest of ingredients. Heat or serve chilled.

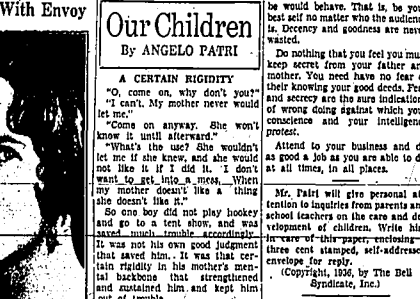
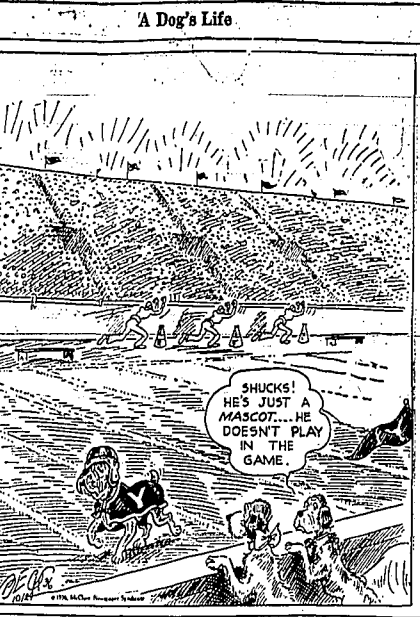

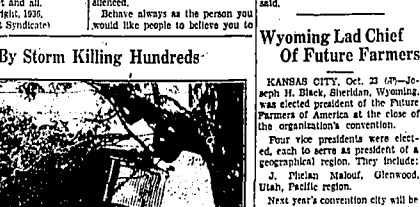

BUNL BRIDE-TO-BE FETTERED AT PARTIES

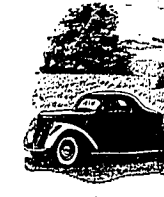

SHORT-LINE OPENS TWIN FALLS SHOPS

Mechanical Force Stationed at Round House Here to Overhaul Equipment

Opening of the Oregon Short Line's round house at Twin Falls, with a nine-man mechanical crew in charge to inspect and make repairs on locomotives and cars, this week marked a new step in Twin Falls development as a railroad center.

The round-house, which was built when the Twin Falls-Wells line was completed nearly 15 years ago, had stood unoccupied until six months ago when it was put in commission as a shelter for locomotives in Twin Falls.

More trains are moving through Twin Falls now than for a long time. F. H. Mack, general superintendent here said last evening, "Payroll grows."

Three switch-cars working 24 hours a day, he said, account for employment of 15 men; two local trains out of Twin Falls daily, one to and one from Twin Falls-Wells train, 10, and a local train, 5.

During the preceding two days, Mr. Mack said, three stock trains carrying 80 carsloads of cattle from Victor, in the Jackson Hole country to Twin Falls, passed through Twin Falls.

In many instances coal trains loaded with fuel for Twin Falls stock yards.

The mechanical force which began work at the round house this week includes a boiler maker, machinists and car men. A. Mullen, mechanical foreman, who has been stationed here since the round house was opened six months ago, is in charge.

Inspection of locomotives operating on Twin Falls, North Side, Oakley and Wells lines, is to be made every 20 days at the Twin Falls round house, under the new arrangement.

In addition, minor repairs of locomotives and cars are to be made here.
