(By The Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 26.—Representatives of 37,000 coast maritime workers announced today a strike would be called Wednesday midnight unless "fundamental issues" were settled.

Both employers and unions criticized the United States maritime commission which opened a quickly adjourned investigation.

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TWO FASCIST STATES LASH RED REGIME

Nazi Envoy Coups Attack on Soviet With 'Blatant' Anglo-German Friendship; Portugal Charges Plot

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, Oct. 26.—Communism—described by the Nazi envoy as "the most terrible of diseases"—drew a "double-barreled assault" from two Fascist European states tonight.

Almost before his train stopped at Victoria station, Joachim von Ribbentrop, "personal ambassador" for Reich Chancellor Adolf Hitler, launched upon a blistering assault against the Soviet Union, coupled with a renewed plea for Anglo-German friendship.

The Russian government, the only real danger for Europe and the British empire as well as the spread of Communism, he told a top-hatted welcoming committee.

The second blow came from Portugal, allied with Germany and Italy in the recent accusations of alleged aid to Spanish insurgents, which charged Soviet agitators with being responsible for the Spanish revolution.

Russia, the Portuguese declared in a note to the international relations committee, attempted to carry out a plan to overthrow the entire Iberian peninsula, including Portugal.

ITALY ANNOUNCES JAPAN'S SUPPORT

Nations 'See Eye to Eye' Against Communism, Officials Declare

ROME, Oct. 26 (AP)—Japan and Italy "see eye to eye" against Communism, officials of the Japanese government officials said tonight.

These officials, however, denied reports that Japan would support a pact against Germany and Italy against Russia and Bohemia in Europe and Asia.

Italy, which had no official indication had entered the accord already announced between Germany and Italy against Bohemia.

Officials of the Japanese government, who frequently echo the views of Mussolini, wrote that "Pan-Asianism" is the only basis for cooperation, and that Japan "adheres to their position."

Idaho Chief Justice Gives Addresses Building and Loan League

BOISE, Oct. 26 (AP)—Chief Justice Raymond L. Owens of the Idaho supreme court asserted today in an address Saturday night that the "opportunities of our frontiers are not gone."

"Geographical frontiers have been reached, but there are innumerable yet undiscovered frontiers in the multitudinous phases of our life and man activities," he told a banquet meeting at the close of the twelfth annual convention of the Idaho building and loan league.

Grant Rebeck of Boise was elected vice president and Miss Lucy M. Higgins of Boise, secretary-treasurer.

Next year's meeting will be in Boise.

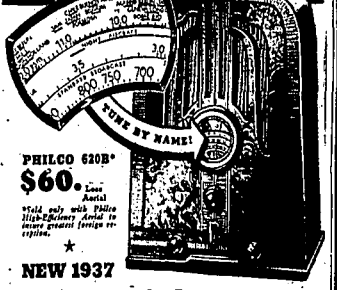
Too Proud To Beg, Youth Starves Self

NEW YORK, Oct. 26 (AP)—Northwestern's wildcats, according to expert analysts, have been playing the toughest "big league" schedule in college football since 1933. As if to corroborate this distinction, they challenge the all-conquering Minnesota Gophers Saturday.

A three-year study of performances, figured on the basis of consensus national rating lists for 1933-35, contributes at least a partial answer to the recurrent question: "Which colleges play the hardest schedules?" Here are some of the things that the study discloses in the analysis disclosed:

1. Ranking next to Northwestern, in "meeting the toughest competition," are the Southern California and Texas in that order.
2. Among Big Ten teams, Minnesota and Ohio State, co-champions last year, were in the top 25 of the calibre of opposition tackled over the three-year period.
3. Pittsburgh plays the toughest schedule of any eastern team (contrary to popular belief) places only 14th nationally. Carnegie and Navy are next in the schedule, with Yale taking on the hardest opposition of any team in the "big league."

Southern teams led by Texas, Southern Methodist and Rice, have made the most rapid strides in toughening their schedules. Where only three were in the top 25 in 1933, in the calibre of opposition encountered, seven moved into the first 15 in following years.
