### DIRECTOR URGED FOR CURRICULUM

#### Idaho Conference Recommends \$15,000 Appropriation for New Post

BOISE, Oct. 28 (AP)—Idaho's first conference on curriculum and teacher training approved tonight recommendations that a \$15,000 biennial appropriation be made to provide a curriculum director in the state department of education.

The director's work would be confined to the eight elementary and four high school grades.

The conference also recommended to the state board of education a minimum program for training elementary school teachers.

The conference was attended by 100 leading Idaho educators, called together by John W. Condit, state superintendent of public instruction.

The minimum program for teachers would require three years of education in an accredited institution.

The recommendation also prescribed regulations of professors engaged by teacher training institutions in the state.

Educators who have been meeting here since last June, 1935, estimated that \$15,000 for the curriculum director and program was intended to cover salaries and expenses for a two-year period.

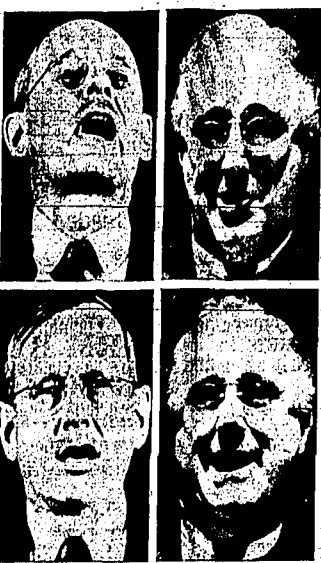

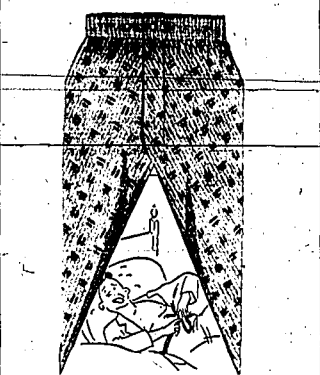

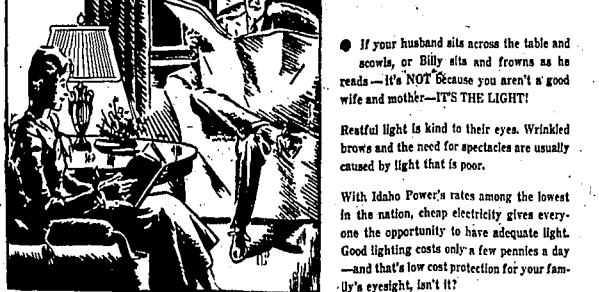

### STEPHAN DEMANDS CARE FOR INSANE

#### Republican Candidate Makes Non-Partisan Appeal for Betterment

BLACKFOOT, Idaho, Oct. 22 (AP)—The unnecessary suffering of the unfortunate at the Blackfoot state insane asylum was the subject of a speech by Frank L. Stephan, Republican candidate for governor, delivered here tonight.

He stated that if elected governor he would recommend to the legislature that it should act to alleviate the needless misery and pain suffered by the inmates because of inferior management.

Stephan, who has developed many honest differences of opinion among the people of the state of Idaho, but a man confident of his own voice in the face of the fiercest partisan politics is agreed that we have a sacred obligation to the unfortunate who, through no fault of their own, have been committed to such institutions as the state insane asylum at Blackfoot.

#### State's Obligation

That obligation involves seeing that they have the best medical care in order to return them to society, if possible, at the earliest moment. It involves providing them with comfortable and healthful living quarters. It involves giving them everything within reason designed to reduce to a minimum the mental and physical misery with which their beings are racked.

Evidence has recently been submitted through the press that the conditions at the Blackfoot asylum are deplorable, that there is no hospital in the state which treats more than 331 unfortunate, that the whole set-up of the middle ages when human suffering caused little or no concern.

Mr. Stephan demanded legislative action and pointed out that although there is forerunner of the state's responsibility, it is not sufficient. He said that the number of state employees, efficient investigation, and that deplorable conditions exist, that would recommend speedy action to remove the disgrace connected with the conducting of the Idaho state asylum.

"I do not consider this a fight between the Republican and Democratic parties," he said. "I have enough confidence in human nature to feel assured that the legislature will act to alleviate the unnecessary human suffering at Blackfoot—regardless of what its political complexion may be. The facts of the case are properly presented to it."

"I don't like your damned wine, and I'm not going to drink it," Mahony snarled.

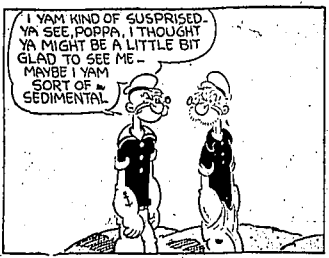
"Just as you like," he said. "There's more ways of killing cats than by drowning it in champagne."

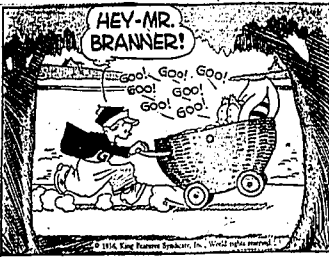

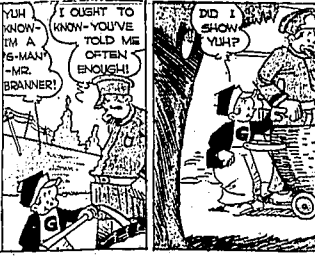

"I am getting married and I possible would like to accompany my husband on my honeymoon."

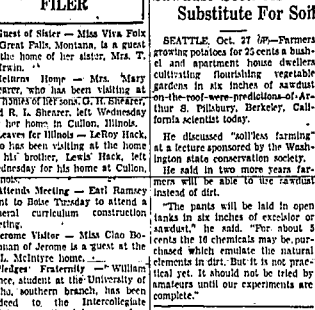
