Alaska Fears Famine With Food Supplies Dwindling and Roundup at New Orleans

(By The Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 4.—Hopes for negotiating peace in the steel-making district strike reached a new low level today and particularly vulnerable areas exhibited more concern over prospective food shortages.

Striking seamen claimed more ship crews on the Albatross and the Pacific. The strike on the Pacific coast was paralyzed.

Major B. Davis Wilson resigned his post as chief of the Philadelphia and gave three unions permission to picket lines.

Joseph Curran, head of the striking seamen there, asserted 40 ships were tied up in New York harbor.

The threat of an immediate food shortage in New York was averted today when a conference between municipal and state representatives resulted in an agreement to release perishable foods and vegetables in city warehouses.

U. S. Ignores Italy's Conquest Of Ethiopia

New Ambassador's Credentials Make No Reference To King's Second Title

(By The Associated Press) ROME, Nov. 4.—The United States, through Ambassador William Phillips, abstained from formal recognition today of Italy's annexation of Ethiopia.

Phillips presented his credentials, addressed only to the emperor, Emperor Haile Selassie of the Ethiopian empire. The official documents did not mention the ruler's second title, "Emperor of Ethiopia," acquired after conquest of the last African kingdom last spring.

In full evening dress, the ambassador and his entourage were driven to the palace in the picturesque "berlins" or royal carriages.

The Italian government agreed to the American credentials addressed only to the "king" although it has informed other embassies that the ruler's second title, "Emperor of Ethiopia," should be used to address the documents to both the "king and emperor."

Phillips, formerly under-secretary of state at Washington, replaced a British ambassador, Lord Curzon, who served in the United States capital.

The high diplomatic exchange has been a reversal of negotiations for a reciprocal trade agreement between the two nations.

DEFENDERS OF MADRID FIGHT

Spanish Socialist Gunners Pour Shells Into Fascist Forces Now Within Seven Miles of Capital City

(By The Associated Press) MADRID, Nov. 5.—(Thursday)—Frenzied Socialist gunners poured shells early this morning into Fascist forces who advanced within seven miles of the capital.

The insurgents held Leganes, 7 miles south of Madrid, and Getafe, 8 miles south, in the newly re-organized Socialist zone.

The rear of government batteries kept Madrid's population aware in a state of confusion. Gunners rained shells into Getafe and Leganes from vantage points in Carabanchel.

(An insurgent broadcast in Seville earlier had claimed Fascist troops had entered the Socialist zone.)

A great explosion today, which might mean a surge of fear through the population following the aerial bombing of Carabanchel, took place near the center of the city late last night, but it was established it was merely the sound of a government field piece.

The Fascist bombs were attributed to aerial attacks to lay claim to 20 victims.

Leganes was abandoned last night. The Fascist bombers hit the roads leading to Madrid while 100-pound aerial bombs hit the mill-ponds of Carabanchel but failed to explode.

The hospital refused to take more wounded and civilians were evacuating Carabanchel by fire.

Popular Plurality In Roosevelt's Relection Passes 9,000,000 Mark

All But Two States Join Electoral Parade

(By The Associated Press) With millions of votes still untabulated, Roosevelt's popular vote plurality passed the record breaking figure of 9,000,000 early today and was still climbing.

So wide was the Roosevelt vote that it was tabulated vote teachers at 40,725 for the highest mark in history.

Roosevelt had 24,229,225 to 15,427,000 for the Republican opponent. Almost 20,000 voting districts were still unreported, indicating a possible lead of 4,000,000 appears.

The president was committed by the Democratic platform on the campaign.

Among the problems before the president in this connection were drought, dust storms, floods, minimum wages, maximum hours, child-labor and working conditions in industry, and monopolistic and unfair business practices.

Borah's Vote Exceeds Roosevelt's In Idaho

State's Election Returns Reach All-Time Peak; Democratic Margins Widen

BOISE, Nov. 4.—Idaho election returns hit an all-time peak tonight as final counting reports widened Democratic margins over every Republican on the state ticket except William E. Borah, United States senate candidate.

With less than 60 precincts still unreported in 13 of the counties, the senatorial vote today stood at 167,133—nearly 900 more than the all-time high of 161,000 recorded in 1932.

Of the states 793 precincts only 58 small and isolated voting places, with an aggregate vote estimated at not more than 1,000 were still not reported late tonight.

Leads in Every County Senator Borah's vote was 5210 greater than that of Democratic President Roosevelt, who led in 10 counties.

The vote polled 125,428, compared with 120,008 for the president. He had a majority in every county except in Boise and Lewiston.

Exchange Courtesies At least part of the bitter taste of the Roosevelt election returns had fled at each other's last work was being washed away.

ENGINEER NAMES FOUR FILM STARS

Crosby, Arthur, Powell and Brook Credited With Perfect Voice

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 4.—Four of the most popular and successful engineers and film stars are only four names—Blondie Crosby, Jean Arthur, Powell and China Claybrook—who have perfect voices.

"They have all the essential elements," said John Lavary, chief sound engineer at Columbia studio, "and their voices all fall within what we call the vital range."

"That range is between 50 and 4,000 cycles. For very high voices, we can shoot up to 10,000 cycles. But the best range is the lower one."

"Crosby's voice ranges from 90 to 3,000 cycles. Miss Arthur's is from 200 to 4,000."

Lavary said that the perfect voice has to be "perfect in all mediums. It has to record perfectly, during the making of a record, and it must project perfectly during the screening of the picture."

He said he believed the qualities in Crosby's voice that made him so popular were three.

"His upper and lower registers are matched exactly," Lavary said. "This allows him to go from one register to another without a break and gives him a seemingly effortless projection in regard to range as well as in loud and soft singing."

"The second element is a well controlled vibrato. That's what gives him the heart appeal. Exaggerated, the vibrato becomes a tremolo, and that, in a singer of Crosby's type, would be fatal. It would make audiences laugh at him."

"And finally his voice is free of crotones. It is complete in its tonal qualities and therefore rich."

Eas departed, well satisfied with her evening's work. Soon after she had gone, Lawson had another visitor.

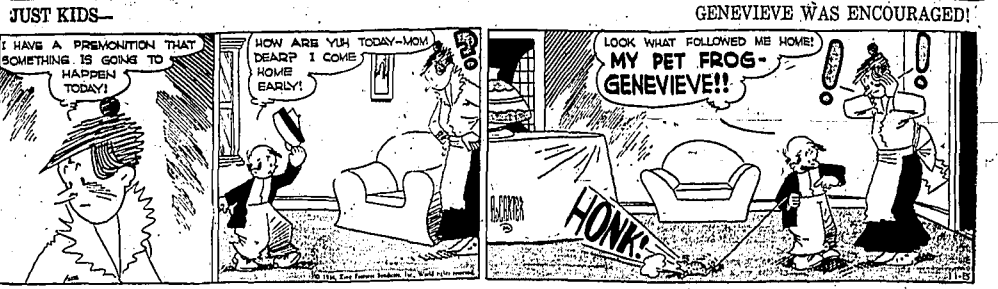
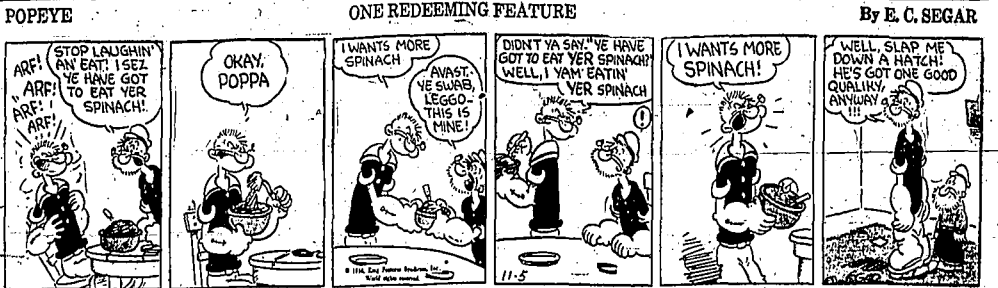

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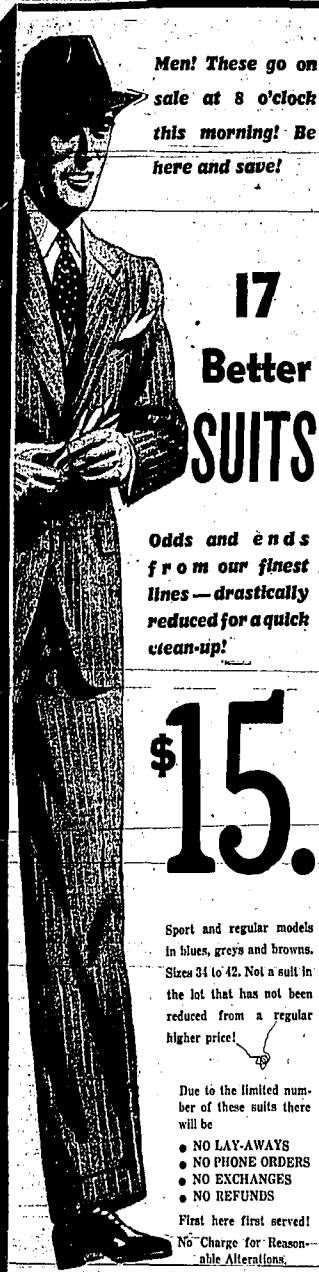
