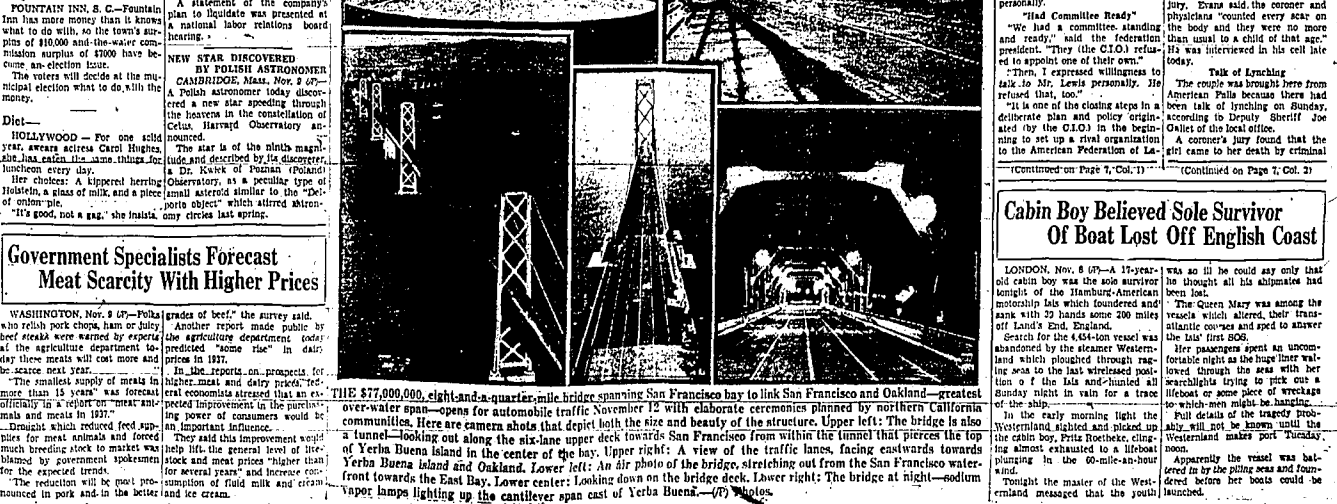

NEW PROSECUTOR CONSIDERS PROBE

Carroll Zapp Seeks Counsel Regarding Grand Jury Investigation

BOISE, Nov. 9 (AP)—Carroll Zapp, Ada County prosecuting attorney, said today he will confer with county officials next week relative to the proposed calling of a grand jury to investigate charges of irregularities in state government.

The charges were made recently by Earl Evans, director of the state bureau of public accounts, an appointee of Governor Ross, a Democrat.

Willis Moffatt, prosecuting attorney, instructed Evans to prepare detailed information.

Zapp will take office in January. Moffatt explained he wished to confer with Zapp, because the latter might be called on to assist in the hearing if it is set by the district court next year.

Zapp, a Democrat and attorney of the state-insurance fund, deflected Moffatt, a Republican in Zapp's election.

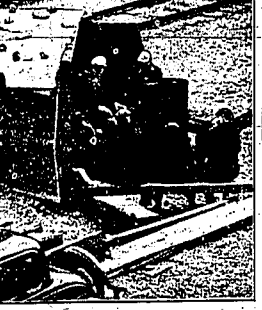

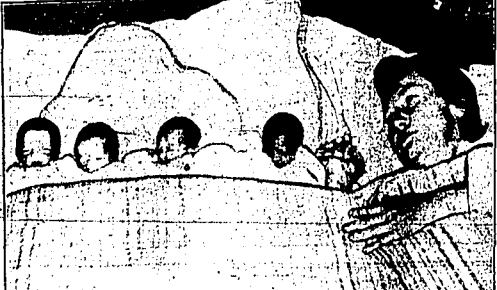
