His announcement, after a day spent in conferring with representatives of seagoing unions, came after problems among employers and workers had frustrated peace-making efforts.

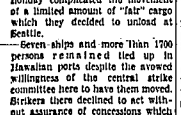

Fascists Launch Desperate Night Drive on Madrid

(Continued From Page One) general staff. Juan Valencia stated that the general labor union there ordered its members to appear for work at the rate of one man selected from each number. Columns of militia arrived daily in Valencia, the dispatch said. Plans to join the government forces defending Madrid. On Armistice Day While the rest of the world solemnly commemorated the twenty years ago of the war, the world has known, Spain's fight against the fourth day of the peace of their country's capture. Government militia, weary from six days of almost incessant fighting, plunged into the battle. Their ranks were led by 4,000 fresh Catalan troops. 40 Blocks Bombing With 40 blocks of the city still unoccupied from incendiary bombardment the day before, insurgent gunners renewed their shelling of the city. An apartment building in the residential area near the Republic bridge was fired by one shell during the day; another struck within yards of the same works. On the western side from the suburban government forces held off repeated enemy assaults, observing the defense work of the day by their performance under fire. The fight was now up to the infantry. Colonel Jose Milla, defense counsel, declared, because many of the Madrid artillery batteries had been blasted into silence by the accuracy of Fascist gunners and war plane pilots. The military leaders received additional cheering news from Valencia, new seat of government, where tank forces were being sent to the Madrid front as fast as they could be organized. Strike at Castellon Behind the advances Fascist front lines, government forces drove eastward and south in a swift flank movement which incensed the insurgent communication lines in the southern Aragon area. New warplanes were sighted during the entire day on the Madrid front, although the government announced its pilots had destroyed 12 Fascist bombers and 10 transport planes in an improvised enemy hangar at Avila, to the northeast.

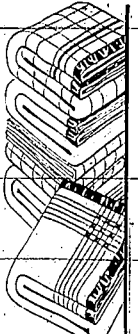

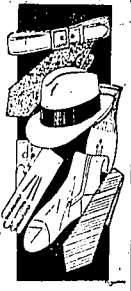

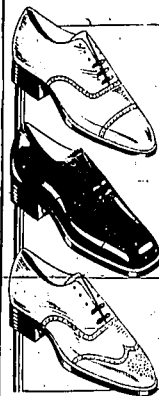

FEDERAL FORECAST FOR 5-CENT BEANS

Nation's Crop 'Considerably Short' of Five-Year Average

A need to import beans over the three-cent tariff barrier will tend to maintain prices at above the five-cent level, the federal bureau of agricultural economics asserted in its annual outlook report made public today.

The bureau's report on the outlook for the country's dry bean crop said that the 1935-37 supply of beans is considerably short of the five-year average owing to a much smaller than usual yield in the pea bean area, to a harvest of United States beans somewhat below average and to an apparent increase in consumption this year.

"Prices advanced sharply during the summer and will probably remain well above the average of recent years through the principal marketing season of the 1936 crop. The need to import beans over the 3-cent tariff barrier will tend to maintain prices at above the 5-cent level."

"Some increase in acreage in the pea bean, Great Northern, and pinto sections, along with an increase in yield in each of these sections there is a probability of overplanting."



NEW YORK, Nov. 11 (AP)—Joe Gould, manager of James J. Braddock, the heavyweight champion, said tonight he had tentatively accepted an offer for Braddock to meet Joe Louis, Detroit Brown Bomber in Atlantic City, February 22, in a 12-round no-decision bout.

Gould said Braddock was guaranteed \$400,000 by Herman (Muggsy) Taylor, Philadelphia promoter who plans to stage the bout in Atlantic City's Convention Hall which has a seating capacity of 45,000.

Braddock is under contract with Madison Square Garden for Braddock to fight—Max Schmeling the title holder—on November 20, but since the Garden seems to want to sidetrack Schmeling in favor of John Henry Lewis, Taylor is willing to go ahead and fight Joe Louis. That's too much dough to pass up.

Wooden Draw

When the New York boxing commission announced a Braddock-John Henry Lewis match, it wouldn't draw pen pals and everyone knew it.

Jimmy Johnston, Madison Square Garden promoter, was quoted in London today as saying a Braddock-John Henry Lewis fight, Lewis is retained his light heavyweight championship by postponing Lennox Lewis in London Monday.

Gould's peers with the Garden stresses about Johnston, the Garden's dope on the boxing business, from London where he had just watched John Henry Lewis, Johnson's title holder and light heavyweight champion in a 15-round bout with Lennox Lewis, Johnson's opponent. 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VETERANS STRESS PLEA FOR PEACE

Ex-Service Men Join With High Schools in Armistice Event

Veterans of American wars, and their friends, went to school in Twin Falls yesterday to celebrate the anniversary of the eighteenth anniversary of the armistice, that marked the end of World war hostilities.

Fifteen hundred students, attending and participating in the exercises at the high school auditorium, heard speakers for the veterans who urged for preservation of the peace which America has been unbroken since the World war armistice.

Delivering the Armistice day address, Matt Johnson of Rhombus, Idaho high school engineer and past American Legion Fourth district commander, reviewed the causes which impelled Americans to go to war in 1914.

"America waged war to win peace," he declared. "Our dead did not die in defense of war but in search of peace. The veterans did not start the World war—they stopped it. Our battle cry was peace, not war."

"Then the speaker outlined the veterans' threefold mission, to 'keep the peace of America,' 'to keep the peace of the world,' and 'to keep the peace of the nation.'"

"First, the establishment and maintenance of an adequate national defense.

"Second, the enforcement of stringent neutrality laws to keep out of other nations' quarrels.

"Third, the demilitarization of war to equalize the burden of conflict if it must come and to prevent a 'war' as much of the 'preparations for war' as the 'war' itself."

Officers of Twin Falls American Legion post—Burdette H. Shinn, commander; W. W. Noble, vice commander; Roy Hudson, adjutant, and Tom Babin—as a part of the exercises, read the Legion's ritualistic Armistice day service wherein the veterans' creation is given to all American questions as to how to promote peace time those virtues that are essential to a war—obedience for softness, obedience to command, self-sacrifice and courage. Wilton Peck, post chaplain, offered the invocation.
