Parliament Might Be King For Day If Edward Quit Throne To Marry

NEW YORK (AP)—Public speculation as to whether King Edward VIII might go to the extreme of abdicating the British throne to marry America's fascinating Mrs. Wallis Simpson has led legal experts to ponder over the unprecedented position which would be created.

Presumably Edward could abdicate if he wished, and presumably his brother, the Duke of York, would come to the throne as next in line of succession, with little Prince Elizabeth of York as heir. However, there appears to be no written provision which would guide in such a contingency. The thing would have to be worked out when the abdication was proposed.

(Shortly to do this, and could do it again, has been in debate ever since Edward VIII decided to abdicate—and here the speculation is being carried rather far since he has given no indication of such a move. The procedure would be something like this:

The question of succession would have to be dealt with by parliament, as the king would not be dead and



IN LINE FOR THRONE

The Duke of York, whose daughter is being shown, for the moment, probably would be named king if Edward should abdicate.

The Royal Highness, Prince Arthur, Duke of York, is 41 years old, and has the reputation of being a very solid and capable individual. Those who know him say he holds the claims and foretold personality of King Edward but he is a fine type of gentleman and the people like him.

The Duke's very lovely daughter, Elizabeth, has always been a great favorite with the public. She was a so-called "commoner," not having a title of her own, although she is daughter of the Earl and Countess of Strathmore. King George gave her the dignity of "Princess" the day before she married his son.

Daughter is Darling
The darling of the empire, however, is small Princess Elizabeth, daughter of the Duke and Duchess and, after her father, is next in line of succession to the throne. This princess and exceedingly bright 10-year-old girl may easily be Queen Elizabeth in her own right one of these days and England has indicated that it would be delighted if this happened.

Because of the probability that she would come to the throne, if King Edward has no children, Princess Elizabeth is being tutored for queen-ship. She does not go to school with other children, and her grandmother, Queen Mary, is taking a large hand in her training. The little girl wishes wistfully that she could do as other small folk, but she has a sweet disposition and has accepted the inevitable gracefully.

Should a son be born to the Duke and Duchess of York, he would take precedence over Elizabeth and would be heir to the throne, after this father.

If King Edward VIII should abdicate to marry Mrs. Wallis Simpson, then Princess Elizabeth, daughter of the Duke and Duchess of York, would move a step nearer the throne.

The Duke of York would not automatically come to the throne. Only the king can call parliament, and therefore Edward would have to do this.

The procedure explained
The monarch would then make known his desire to abdicate, and would recommend his successor—probably the Duke of York. Parliament would accept the abdication and make York king-emperor.

First Coyote Roundup Beats Rodeo Thrills

ENINGO, N. M., Nov. 13 (AP)—Rodeo thrills and spills from Ballinas to Madison Square Garden faded into insignificance here today as the boys told how Bill Bourne took off from a careening "go-by-bury" to win the world's first "coyote-dogging" championship.

Bourne donned his corral in 23 minutes in the Armistice day running of what at first glance appears to be something of a cross between a motorized fox and hounds chase and the billdogging event of the western rodeo.

Two men conferred by the Empero post of the American Legion, was Bourne's because he was the only entrant to make his "critter cast." The 22 minutes was measured from the time Bourne and his driver took off in pursuit of the coyote across the mesa until the animal was winded and then plined to the ground.

Commander E. L. Hinton, who claims for the Empero post the honor for discovering the new sport, said the only difference between "coyote-dogging" and the orthodox hunting was that a stripped-down automobile was used instead of a horse and a coyote instead of a bull.

Casualties of the day were listed as three coyotes, seven jackrabbits and a number of broken automobile springs. All agreed, however, that one of the most impressive was about the coyote population hereabouts.

Government Watches Stock Market Rise

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13 (AP)—Government financial authorities said today they were keeping a close watch on the upward trend of the stock market, but asserted there were no present indications of any "unusually" condition which might necessitate the exercise of federal control powers.

Security commission and federal reserve board officials described their vigilance over the market as being merely in line with their regular duties, but added that should any "harmful" influence enter into the situation some action to curb it might come.

Chairman Marriner B. Eccles of the federal reserve board told reporters after a White House visit today that neither banks nor brokerage houses were "reporting" the present market upward, but declined to say whether the rise was "sensible."

ODDEN, Utah, Nov. 12 (AP)—Detective H. O. Allred said today Della De Haven, 11, had confessed that her statement yesterday about seeing a masked man with a headless body in his car was a hoax to escape parental discipline.

The child told police last night a man lifted a girl's head from the rear of his sedan and told her, "I'll kill you later if I just killed this girl." Then he chased her with a curved butcher knife, she said.

Allred said she said Sergeant O. H. Taylor questioned the girl at length today, and she finally told him she had invented the story to avoid being reprimanded for returning home late.

A piece of blood-stained paper she said she found near the sedan was discolored with blood from a hog her father had slaughtered. Allred quitted her as a slayer.

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AMERICAN SHARES AWARD IN PHYSICS

Dr. Carl David Anderson of Pasadena Receives Recognition

PASADENA, Calif., Nov. 13 (AP)—The son of a chef who failed in an attempt to become a high jumper and went to college to become an electrical engineer today at the age of 31 found himself among the world's greatest physicists. Dr. Carl David Anderson, Nobel laureate.

The Academy of Science at Stockholm, Sweden, gave him this distinction today of dividing the annual Nobel award in physics between Dr. V. F. Hess, of Innsbruck university, Austria.

The modest, pleasant young bachelor, when he received this news he called his mother and his sister in California. He had been in Pasadena for a few days before he was notified that he had won the prize.

He gave his associates here credit for the work which earned his distinction. It was the discovery four years ago of one of the finest particles in nature, the positron or positive electron, a particle of the atom.

"It was no one man job," he pointed out, "but the discovery, giving the matter which was the key to Dr. Robert A. Millikan, Nobel laureate physicist, and his laboratory associate, Dr. S. H. Neddermeyer."

Bean Crop Estimate

BOISE, Nov. 12 — The preliminary estimate of dry bean production in the United States this year is set at 10,500,000 bags, according to the federal bureau of agricultural economics November 3 estimate. The United States total production is just slightly higher than was forecast on October 1, though conditions in several important producing states changed materially since October.

Bean crop prospects in Michigan declined from 2,600,000 bags on October 1 to 2,250,000 bags on November 1. Declining prospects were also indicated in Colorado and New Mexico. On the other hand, improved prospects were reported in Idaho, Nebraska, Montana, Wyoming and California.

The Idaho crop is now estimated at 1,460,000 bags, an increase of 73,000 bags since October 1. Harvesting begins here have averaged higher than expected following September killing frosts, though the proportion of marketable beans in the important Twin Falls-Jerome areas may be considerably lighter.

"We must submit a more rational plan."

"Our president says today that security for the aged and needy shall be one of the first objectives of his new administration. I say God bless him — if he means it."

Discussing the affairs within the Townsend organization, the able, elderly physician declared:

"We're going to put one on and maybe two men in Washington to check up on the men elected on our program. We're going to keep tab on them to see if they're doing anything."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12 (AP)—Banking on an enlarged bloc of northern Democrats to demand a hand at the helm of the House, Representative Bitter today entered his fellow New York state, Representative Mead, in the contest for Democratic floor leader.

In announcing this action, Bitter expressed belief that so many committee chairmanships and other strategic positions in the chamber now are held by southerners that a majority of the members would want a northerner for floor leader.

Mead's candidacy for the leadership made the gathering contest one of the most important post-four-congress affairs.

Representative Rankin (D-Miss.), predicted Bitter would be elected, one of the trio predicted that the race would be hard fought.

He said he had received "encouraging responses" from a number of liberal representatives in reply to his plea to support legislation in the interests of cheap electric power, rural electrification and lower rail rates for southern and western states.

The others already in the race are Representative Dayburn (D-Tex.) and O'Connor (D-Vt.), acting floor leader in the closing weeks of the last session.

Happy Chandler directed the Democratic speakers' bureau during the presidential campaign, has opened a campaign office in Washington and is expected to plunge into the fight Monday when he returns from a vacation in Georgia.

House attaches predicted at least two other candidates — Representative Wagoner (D-Okla.) and Gresham (D-Ill.) — will announce for the key office before congress convenes January 3.

DRAMATIST WINS LITERATURE PRIZE

Eugene O'Neill Surprised, Happy Over \$45,000—Nobel Award

—STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Nov. 12 (AP)—Eugene O'Neill, noted American dramatist, was awarded the Nobel prize in literature today.

Prof. Carl David Anderson, of the California Institute of Technology, shared the prize for physics with Prof. V. O. Hess in Innsbruck university, Austria.

O'Neill — whose better known plays include "Ah, Wilderness," "Strange Interlude," and "Mourning Becomes Electra" — became the second American to win the literature prize. Sindala Lewin, novelist, received it in 1930.

O'Neill will be given the prize for 1935 and 1936, totaling about \$45,000, as no award was made last year in literature.

Anderson and Hess will receive about \$20,000 each.

Professor Anderson's award was granted for his discovery in 1932 or positrons — a positive electron — by the bombardment of atoms with high voltage currents.

Professor Hess's prize was for his research in cosmic radiation.

Tractors Again Threaten Horse, Mule On Farms

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12 (AP)—Already crowded from streets of towns and cities by the automobile and truck, "old Dobbins," the faithful work horse, and "Maude," the mule, face increasing competition from tractors on the farm.

Experts at the agriculture department predicted today that the downward trend in numbers of horses and mules on farms will continue "for the next few years" until it reaches a low point of about 15,000,000 head in 1940.

By then a recent increase in food production may offset the disappearance of old animals.

Production of work horses and mules on farms gained from 1850 to 1919, the experts said, with a steady decline following.

O'Neill Surprised

SEATTLE, Nov. 12 (AP)—Eugene O'Neill, American playwright, expressed surprise today when he learned that he had won the Nobel prize in literature.

"I'm very happy," he said, "but I feel like a horse that has just been given a blue ribbon."

The dramatist, and his wife, the former actress Carlotta Monterey, arrived ten days ago to make Seattle their home while O'Neill gathers background for his new drama series.

Slimmer, nervous, his brown eyes sparkling, O'Neill said his greatest personal pleasure from one of his own plays came from "The Great God Brown," and "The Hairy Ape."

He surmised that the Nobel award was based chiefly on "Mourning Becomes Electra."

Other artists exhibiting are Virgil Stark, Tolson Cook, Betty Dinkley, Charles Burningshouse and Blanche Grant.

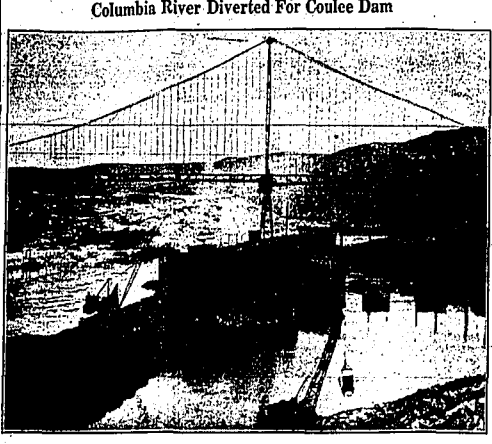

LIBRARY IN LINE FOR MORE FUNDS

State Legislature to Be Urged to appropriate \$25,000

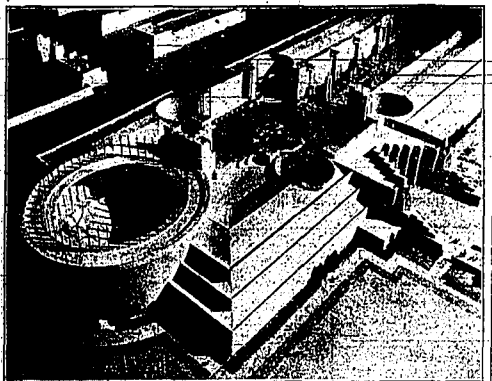
To meet the ever increasing demand for free library service in the rural districts of Idaho, the traveling library, maintained as a department of the state, will request an annual appropriation from the coming session of the legislature. The present appropriation is \$25,000 for the year.

Miss Lilla Bedford, state librarian, in explaining the enlarged appropriation request, said that the library planning board believes will be the most rapid means of extending library service into those rural districts most in need of it, and that it has been approved through resolutions from such state-wide organizations as the Democratic and Republican national committees, the state Grand, Federation of Women's Clubs, Parent-Teacher associations, Business and Professional Women, and Klwanis clubs. She stated that "although the traveling library has been in existence for more than 20 years, little progress has been made in this line toward extending the library service, particularly in the more isolated regions."
