GRANGE SPEAKER URGES PROGRESS

Editor Attacks Philosophy of 'Adjustment and Defeat'

COLUMBIA, O., Nov. 17 (AP)—The Grange here, urged farmers Monday to continue the agricultural conquest of America, rather than to fall in with the philosophy of "adjustment and defeat."

Editor McMillan, making his appeal before the 70th annual meeting of the National Grange, declared the conflict between the philosophies of "adjustment and defeat" would be settled by agriculture, industrial and farming.

Referring to adjustment, Mr. McMillan termed it a "philosophy which assumes that the expansion of wealth by American agriculture is finished, which assumes that because we are abundant, and that because we sometimes grow products in excess of profitable demand, we should conclude that no further progress can be made.

"This fearful and trembling philosophy would have agriculture freeze in its tracks. It would erect barriers and limitations."

Increase Seen In Gem State's Farm Tenancy

BOISE, Nov. 17 (AP)—David Bush, Idaho rural resettlement administration director, said today that 25 percent of 22 farm families in the state in the past four years "threatens to create a serious problem."

A large percentage of farm families from drought areas is destined to become tenant farmers on marginal lands due to lack of finance, he said.

To meet the tenancy problem, Bush proposed:

1. Long-time rehabilitation loans for purchase and development of farm units by present tenants.
2. Federal or state long-time financing of land clearing and reclamation programs to make new farm units available.
3. Expansion of present debt adjustment and planned settlement activities.

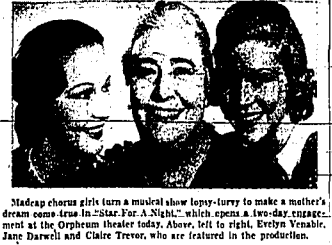
