EDEN SIDES

British Foreign Secretary Throws Commons in Up-roar With Comment on Intervention in Spain

By The Associated Press. LONDON, Nov. 19 (AP)—Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, attacked by opposition benches, heatedly but briefly defended Eden and his government today against charges that had violated the Spanish non-intervention accord.

His statement, which some members took to be a veiled threat at times, drew the usual uproar. Cheers from the government benches mingled with cries of "What a mess!" from the opposition benches.

Eden again subsequent lectures were given by the speaker, who said that the "other governments" were the ones who would not act.

Officially the British government announced it had not received details of the reported Spanish blockade of the zone.

Of Madrid Residents Shrapnel From Bombs Deals Death To Scores

MADRID, Nov. 19 (AP)—The Fascist aerial bombs struck in the heart of Madrid again today, partly wrecking the postoffice, the central bank and an ornate palace, both the home of the Marquis of Linares.

The front of the building was ripped apart, and windows shattered. There was an unconfirmed report that one of the bombs crashed through the main floor of the building.

Two street cars were jerked into the air by the force of the fearful explosions in Cibeles square, near the postoffice.

The crowded street-hangers in the cars were cut down by the shrapnel. Most of them were believed killed.

Diagonally across from the postoffice, the palace of the Marquis, was recently used as a government barracks, was partially torn down by another bomb.

A third bomb, apparently aimed at the nearby war ministry, crashed through several floors of the Central bank, formerly the Banco del Pío de Plata.

By The Associated Press. COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 19 (AP)—The National Grange later today went on record as opposing to subsidies of special privileges in any form as a permanent program.

The report of the organization's committee on special privileges, which was adopted during the closing hours of the 70th annual meeting, expressed the feeling, however, that subsidies as an emergency measure are justified to a temporary wrong or inequity.

"Farming involves all of the people indirectly and about one-fourth directly," the report said, "we should not be asked to subsidize others. When subsidies are used we believe they should be limited to emergency situations and should be for confessions or non-resident owners."

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WAR FEVER GRIPS CHINESE PATRIOTS

SIANGHAI, Nov. 19 (AP)—Chinese patriots clamored for a national day of mourning today in a campaign to raise funds for the defense of northern Szechuan province against a reported Japanese invasion.

Feeling was pitched close to wartime fervor following Chinese newspaper reports that defenders of the eastern border had taken the offensive and inflicted a severe setback to the invaders.

Although these dispatches were contradicted by other news from Kailan and Kweilin, which said the danger zone was quiet for the moment, cheering Chinese demonstrators thronged the city.

"Support Szechuan" was the cry. Organizers, comparable to American "four minute" speakers who used "liberty bells" during the World War, exhorted citizens to contribute funds for the defense and sought to stir up a national jubilation.

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### FEDERATION HAILS FEDERAL PROGRAM

#### Secretary Perkins, Mayor Berry Address Tampa Convention

TAMPA, Fla., Nov. 19 (AP)—The new Roosevelt industrial program, brought forth by the White House yesterday, drew applause from the American Federation of Labor's annual convention.

Cooperation between labor and industry was the keynote in messages delivered by Secretary Perkins and George L. Berry, president Roosevelt's coordinator for industrial corporations.

Miss Perkins also said that the Washington government contract act, regarded by labor as an NRA substitute, must be broadened in its scope so that "a strong union movement" was an essential supplement to a legislative program.

Berry declared that industrial results would lead the supreme court to an about-face in judging new deal legislation. He said his legal-union program would have a legislative program ready for congress soon.

Miss Perkins also said that the Washington government contract act, regarded by labor as an NRA substitute, must be broadened in its scope so that "a strong union movement" was an essential supplement to a legislative program.

Miss Perkins disclosed she was planning a conference with union leaders to discuss plans for legislation in which they are particularly interested. She spoke of national wage control, uniformity of income, stability and "guidance for the conservation and maximum utilization of natural resources" as a formula for progress.

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### LAWMAKERS URGE WAGE REGULATION

#### Senators Plan Campaign for Enactment of Federal Licensing System

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (AP)—A move to re-establish the government's power to fix minimum wage and labor standards gained strength today in both houses of congress.

A campaign for enactment of a federal licensing system for corporations engaged in interstate commerce was being planned by Senators O'Donoghue (D-N.Y.) and Wheeler (D-Mont.).

Their proposal would forbid any corporation to carry on interstate business until it had complied with child labor, minimum wage and maximum working hour regulations.

Opposes Price Fixing  
While supporting this plan, Wheeler said he would oppose "any scheme for fixing prices or curtailing production" along the lines of the original NRA.

Several congressmen have asked permission to sponsor his measure in the house. O'Donoghue said: "Asserting that a federal licensing system was 'the only way' to establish 'adequate labor standards.' Wheeler said 'some such plan must be worked out, if the capitalist system is to survive.'"

### LABORITE PREDICTS VICTORY FOR KING

#### Briton Declares Monarch Seeking Support of Common People

LONDON, Nov. 19 (AP) — A laborite leader of the house of commons declared today in a new interview that King Edward was seeking support of the common people for his friendship with the late "Wally" Warfield Simpson — and even marriage if he wished.

James Maxton, of the extreme socialist labor group in the commons asserted the king was rallying support to combat opposition from aristocracy to his association with Mrs. Simpson.

He made his assertions in the presence of the laborite communist member of parliament, and declared that the only reason he did not bring the subject directly before parliament was the rule of procedure banning questions directly affecting the monarch.

The king's dramatic appearance in Albert hall on Armistice night, Maxton said, "his review of the fleet and his present tour of Wales are all designed to overcome the vehement objections to the possible marriage from the ruling classes, especially their spokesmen, the archbishop of Canterbury.

"Finding himself in difficulties with the aristocracy, the king is on a campaign to consolidate his personal popularity with the masses. He will win."

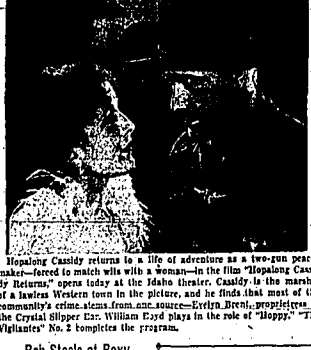
