

GOVERNOR-ELECT CHARTS POLICIES

Clark Begins Intensive Study of State's Problems

BOULDER, Nov. 3 (AP)—Governor-elect Harold W. Clark said tonight he will choose or name his cabinet and will devote his first week to a study of the state's problems.

Clark said he will spend the next three hours today acquainting himself with the local conditions in the state and the problems which will become his headquarters on January 4 when Governor O'Connell leaves at the end of his term.

"I've been sitting up the most of the night," Clark said after his four days in the capital.

"I plan to spend most of my time from now on studying the problems of the state."

So People May Know

"One thing is a certainty, the people will be kept well informed of the financial and other affairs of the state during the coming two years."

Clark believes factual publicity is an essential of good government.

"Bearing in mind the political opposition's expression for a reduction in governmental expenses, I shall devote my energies in that direction, and I believe it can make some fine showing."

"I shall see to it that the tax dollar is spent right."

Clark will meet Monday night with Democratic leaders and the state's administrative and legislative officials to discuss the state's problems.

"I plan to include in my message to the legislature recommendations that existing laws be revised to the end that municipalities and counties in developing their own power affairs can do so free from the red tape that now makes it almost impossible for them to do so."

Clark's message to the legislature will include a good deal of information on his new cabinet.

"Education, character and example will enter into law enforcement programs."

"I am not too strong for capital punishment, but I believe that all persons who are guilty of capital crimes are not too young."

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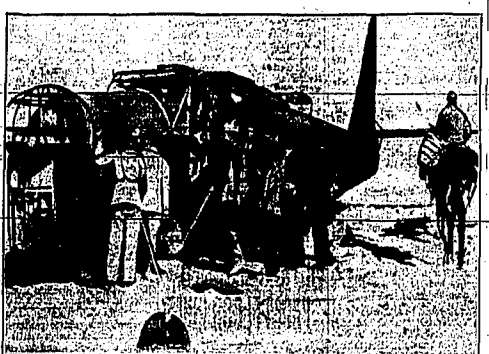
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Labor Corps Off To 'Civilize' Ethiopia

Local Store To Show and Serve Big Pumpkin Pie

Starting off the holiday season in a big way, the Drive-In market at 220 Shoshone street, is serving a pumpkin pie measuring 26 inches in diameter to Saturday patrons beginning at 2 o'clock.

The pie was baked by the Schweickhardt's bakery in a tin built especially for the purpose. Nearly all the products are from Twin Falls county. The pie measures 2 inches in depth and will be topped by whipped cream.

Ingredients were measured in dozens and pounds rather than the usual cup and teaspoon and included four dozen eggs, a dozen cans of condensed milk, a dozen full cans of cooked pumpkin, six pounds of shortening, eight pounds of flour, 2 pounds of sugar and 8 ounces of spice. Alac, ginger, cinnamon and nutmeg were used.

Stuff, Truss and Roast Mr. Turkey

Stuff, truss, roast! Important things in dealing with the king of the day—Mr. Turkey. Here are some suggestions for all three that a master chef has listed:

To stuff:
Slit the bird over open flame, remove pin feathers. Wash and dry; neck is thoroughly cleaned; inside; drain water off. Then first place stuffing through opening in neck, and push up under skin in front of breast. This gives a plump, round appearance to the bird. Remainder of stuffing is placed inside of bird. Sew opening carefully, using "in and over lace stitch" with large needle and fine string. Opening must be tightly closed to prevent hot fat running into stuffing while cooking.

To truss:
Pull neck under back and sew skin at end of neck onto center of back. Place wings snugly at sides, and pass wire skewer through the wing to the body of the bird, and the fine string from skewer in one wing to skewer in other wing, under the bird. BEN ROSS EYES COMEBACK TRAIL

Idaho's Governor, Delected by Borah, Still Interested in Politics

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 20.—Gov. C. Benn Ross, whose administration of political affairs was snapped by Senator William E. Borah, admitted today he is eyeing the comeback trail.

The gaunt ex-governor did not disclose details of his plans after the loss of his political office. He said he had been thinking of going back there. But he said: "I get back my former health, I will continue to be active in politics."

Neuville told him August 12, the day after Idaho Democratic primary voters made the election of Idaho State senate against the potato states No. 1 national personality.

"I have nobody to blame but C. Benn Ross," said the governor who never knew political defeat before. "Borah is one of the brightest men in America. He is one of the world's greatest political geniuses."

What Ross plans for the political future is a subject of speculation. He has said before he mentioned his name for high national political appointment.

Ross will in time make another try for the United States senate.

His health comes first. He spends only a little time in his capital office where visitors are surprised to see a man who walks, talks and eats like a young man.

During the winter and spring he usually goes himself to Idaho.

One year ago he was in the state capital when he was mayor before running for governor. The other is near Parma, the southwestern Idaho town where he was born about 55 years ago.

75,000 POUNDS OF TURKEY MARKET

GOODNOE, Nov. 20.—Following the close of the Thanksgiving marketing period here this week, approximately 75,000 pounds of turkeys, totaling 15,000 pounds, started on their way to market.

According to Mink, local manager, the Idaho Egg Producers agents for the Northwest Turkey Buyers' association purchased two carcasses of turkeys, one sold an advance price of 14 cents a pound for one, 14 cents a pound for two, and eight cents a pound for commercial grades.

C. G. Thompson, independent buyer, purchased about five birds of good turkeys, and states that the birds he bought ran 60 per cent one, six per cent medium and ten per cent two. These percentages are exceptionally good for Thanksgiving when the birds are not usually as good as they are later in the season, he said.

Totally turkey crop in Goodnoe county is reported to be larger than last year. The county boasts two large flocks, J. E. Arkood has a flock of 100 birds, and J. G. Greenham farms about six miles north of Goodnoe. E. O. Cummings has a flock of several thousand.

Buying for the Christmas market in Goodnoe will start the first week in December. Local buyers report.

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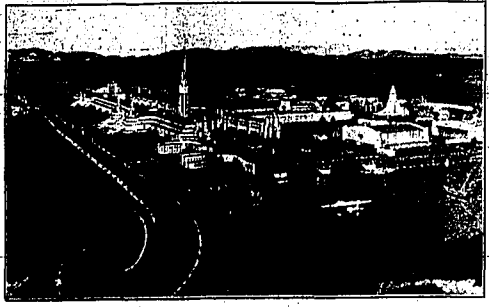
